A New Grant to Implement Smokeless Tobacco Use Prevention and Cessation in AI/AN Communities

Mission

Reduce dental caries in Native American infants, toddlers and children. Provide training, technical assistance, and resources to tribal and urban dental clinics operating in California.

The Dental Support Center (DSC) in partnership with the Tobacco Education and Prevention Technical Services (TEPTS) Center at CRIHB has received funds through the Innovative Grants Program of American Legacy Foundation. The first year of this three year grant will implement a pilot project at three California tribal dental clinics to provide Registered Dental Hygienists and other healthcare professionals in these clinics with education, training (includes CEUs) and resources to implement a smokeless tobacco cessation program. Additionally the project will include culturally appropriate prevention efforts to each clinic's entire patient population. The three selected tribal programs are United Indian Health Services in Arcata, Sonoma County Indian Health Project in Santa Rosa and Central Valley Indian Health in Clovis.

You are invited!

The one-day training on Smokeless tobacco prevention and cessation will be held at the CRIHB main office in Sacramento in September 2009. Any interested healthcare professional from any tribal/urban clinic in California is eligible to attend this free training workshop. Space is limited to 30 attendees.

Scholarships for Registered Dental Hygienists:

The DSC is offering a scholarship towards travel, lodging and Per Diem to two Registered Dental Hygienists from any tribal/urban clinic in California. A lottery will choose the two winners.

CAVITY IN A CAN?

- Carbonated beverages erode tooth enamel surfaces, leading to cavities
- Carbonic, phosphoric, and citric acids in the drinks (even diet sodas) dissolve calcium, especially in the teeth of children who sip them continuously.
- Continuous sipping throughout the day allows time for resident oral bacteria to begin to break down the sugars in the drink which form more acids, hastening the development of the tooth decay.
- From a Nutrition perspective, soft drinks contribute sugar, calories, phosphorus, and water to the diet.

The amount of sugar in one 12oz can depends on the brand of soft-drink.

Some brands have more sugar in them than others.

Take a look and see how many tablespoons of sugar are in each 12oz can.

REMEMBER: 1 Tablespoon = 12 grams
