DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Coronavirus cases surpassed 450,000 worldwide, with more than 20,000 deaths.

India began a 21-day 'total lockdown' of its 1.3 billion citizens at midnight.

The U.S. Senate and the White House have reached a deal on a \$2 trillion aid package to help American workers survive the pandemic.


President Trump said he would like to reopen the U.S. economy by Easter.

The National Indian Health Board, along with its partners, is convening a second Tribal Leader Town Hall tomorrow, March 26, 12:00 – 1:30 pm EST to discuss the third phase of COVID-19 stimulus legislation that the Senate is expected to pass today.

The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) reports that 9 California IHS patients have tested positive for COVID-19.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 44,183 as reported on Tuesday 3/24/2020 to 54,453 reported today. The number of deaths increased from 544 to 737.

Public Health Laboratory Testing

As of the evening of March 24, the total number of public health laboratories (PHL) that have completed verification and are offering testing is 92. This includes one or more PHL in 50 states plus DC, Guam and Puerto Rico.

CALIFORNIA

As of March 24, 2020, 2 p.m. Pacific Daylight Time, there are a total of 2,535 positive cases and 40 deaths in California (including one non-California resident).

- 707: Community-acquired cases
- 1,828: Cases acquired through person-to-person transmission, travel (including cruise ship passengers), repatriation, or under investigation.
- o This includes 35 health care workers Ages of all confirmed positive cases:
- Age 0-17: 37 cases
- Age 18-49: 1,278 cases
- Age 50-64: 638 cases
- Age 65 and older: 562 cases
- Unknown: 20 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

Female: 1,117 casesMale: 1,389 casesUnknown: 29 cases

In order to better focus public health resources on the changing needs of California communities, beginning on March 18, the state is no longer collecting information about California travelers returning from countries that have confirmed COVID-19 outbreaks. Community transmission of COVID-19 has been identified in California since late February, and since early March, most of the confirmed cases in the state were not related to travel outside of the United States.

Twenty-two public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond,

Alameda, Contra Costa, Humboldt, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.


INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA


CONFIRMED CASES AND DEATHS BY COUNTY
