

## DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 15,219 as reported on Friday 3/20/2020 to 33,404 reported today. The number of deaths increased from 201 to 400.

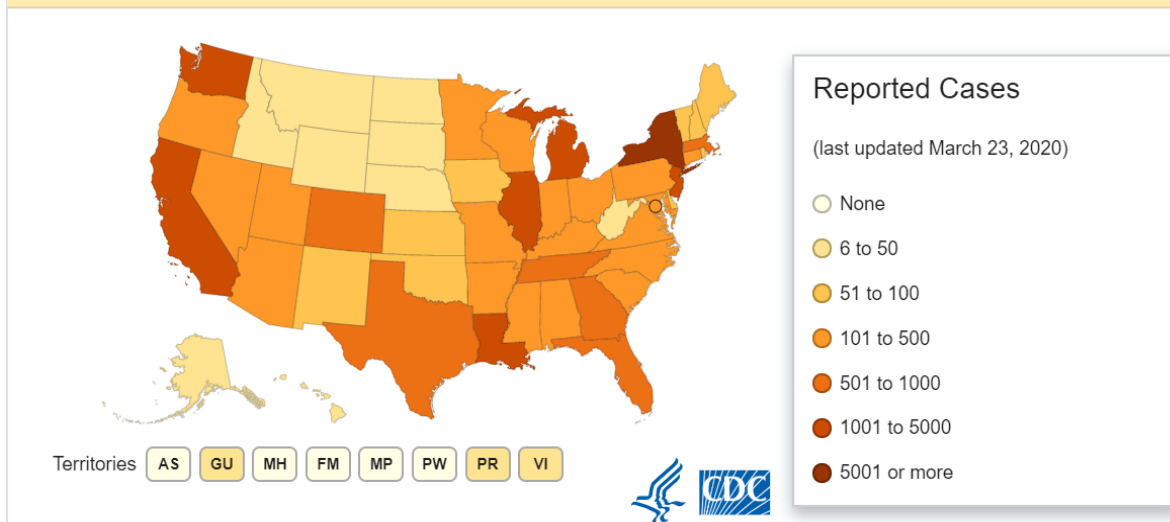
The federal government has activated the US National Guard in three of the hardest hit states -- California, Washington and New York.

Nearly half of all US cases are in New York state, making it the epicenter of the US outbreak.

California, Illinois, New York and New Jersey were already under stay at home orders over the weekend. Ohio, Louisiana and Connecticut will join them on Monday. An order goes into effect on Tuesday in Delaware.

## UNITED STATES

### COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance\*

- Total cases: 33,404
- Total deaths: 400
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 54 (50 states, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, and US Virgin Islands)

\* Data include both confirmed and presumptive positive cases of COVID-19 reported to CDC or tested at CDC since January 21, 2020, with the exception of testing results for persons repatriated to the United States from Wuhan, China and Japan. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

### Public Health Laboratory Testing

As of the evening of March 20, the total number of public health laboratories that have completed verification and are offering testing is 91. This includes one or more PHL in 50 states plus DC, Guam and Puerto Rico.

### CALIFORNIA

As of March 22, 2020, 2 p.m. Pacific Daylight Time, there are a total of 1,733 positive cases and 27 deaths in California (including one non-California resident).

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 25 cases
- Age 18-49: 837 cases
- Age 50-64: 442 cases
- Age 65 and older: 415 cases
- Unknown: 14 cases

24 – Cases of positive tests related to federal repatriation flights

1,709 – Cases not related to repatriation flights

- 120 – Travel related
- 165 – Person-to-person acquired
- 474 – Community acquired
- 950 – Under investigation

In order to better focus public health resources on the changing needs of California communities, beginning on March 18, the state is no longer collecting information about California travelers returning from countries that have confirmed COVID-19 outbreaks. Community transmission of COVID-19 has been identified in California since late February, and since early March, most of the confirmed cases in the state were not related to travel outside of the United States.

Twenty-two public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Contra Costa, Humboldt, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

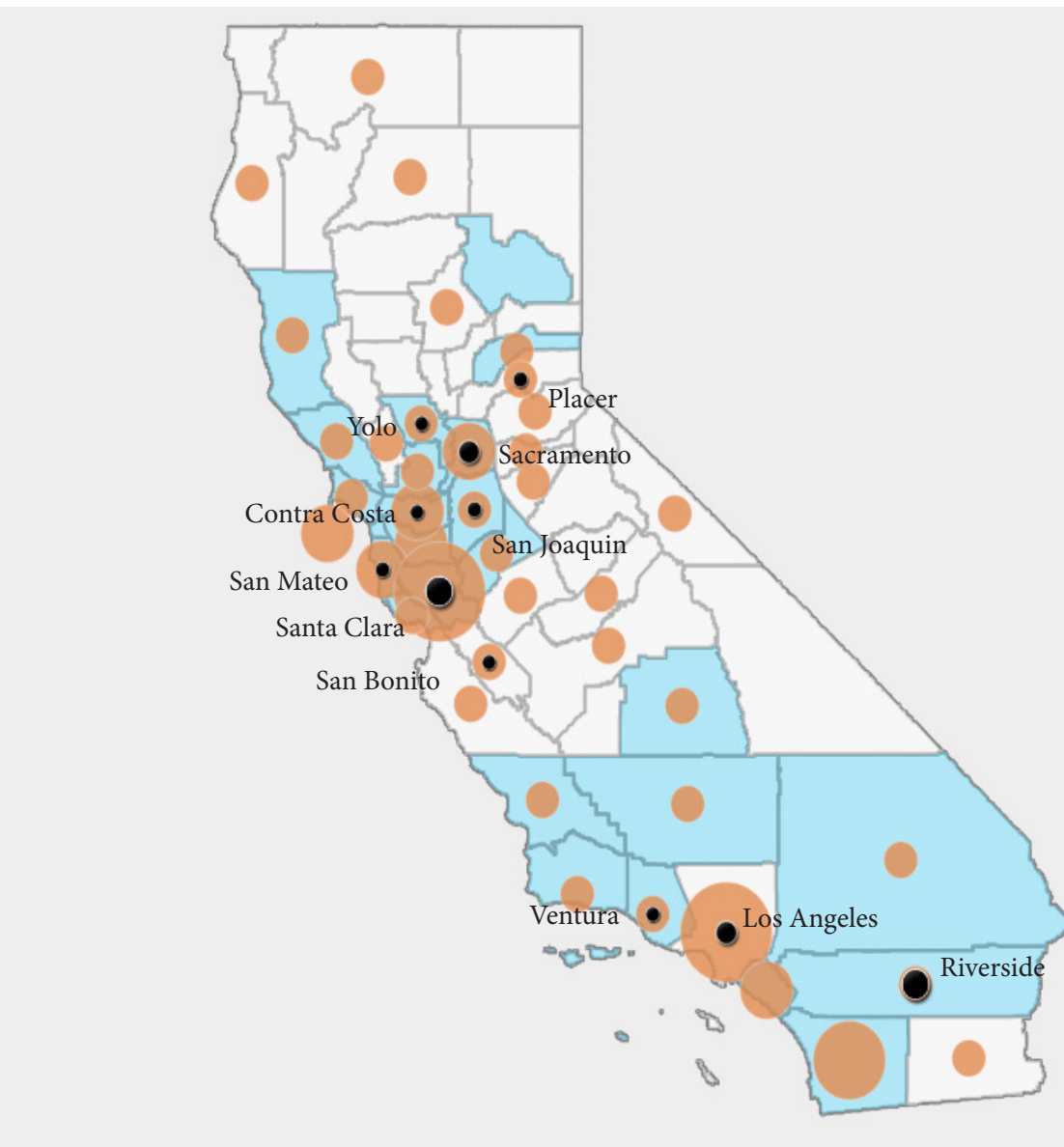

CURRENT AS OF 12PM ON MARCH 23, 2020

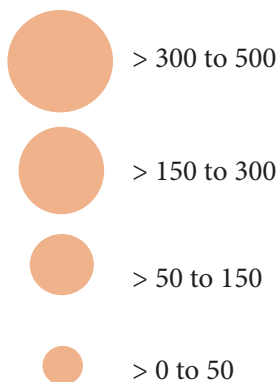

### Confirmed Cases by County



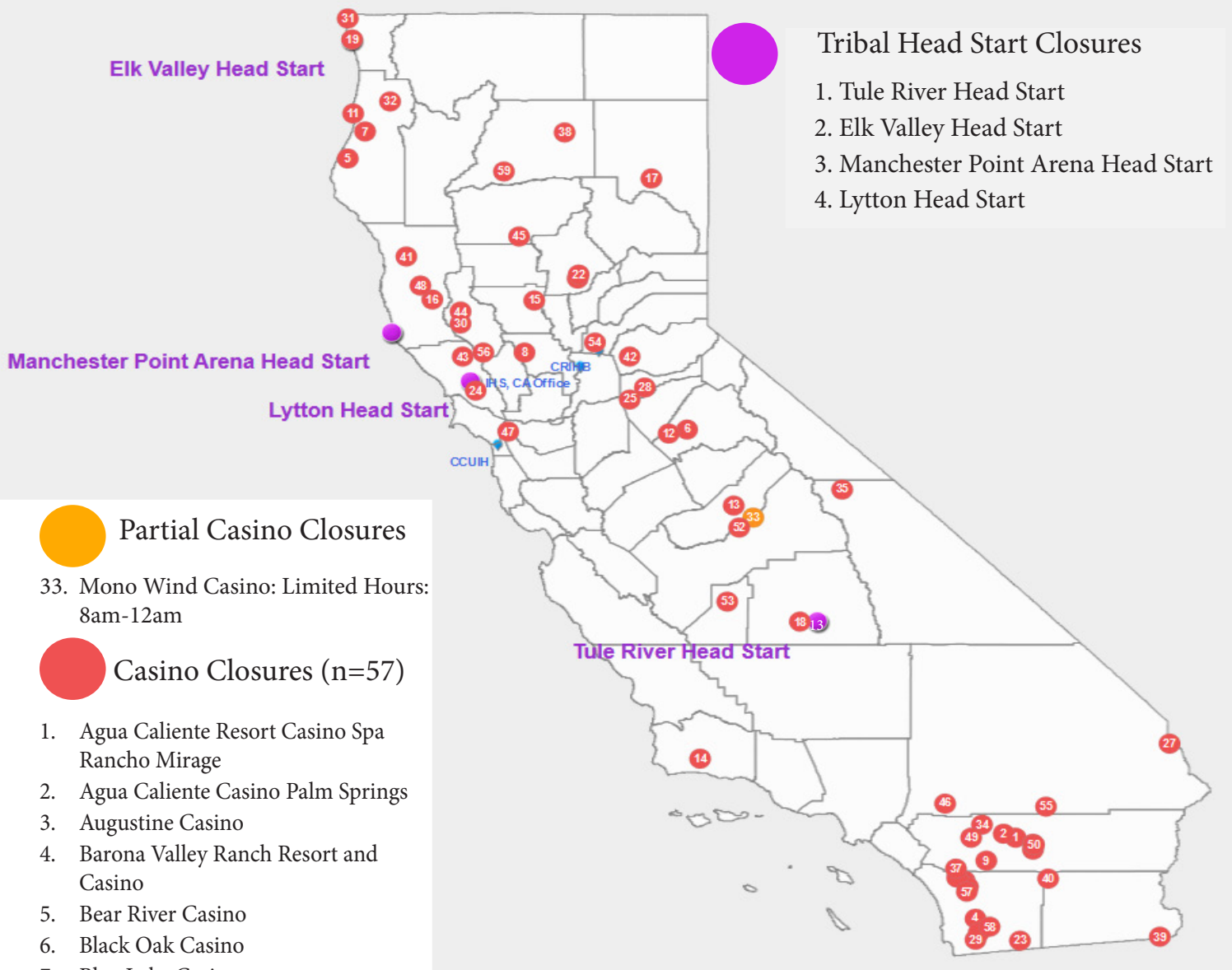

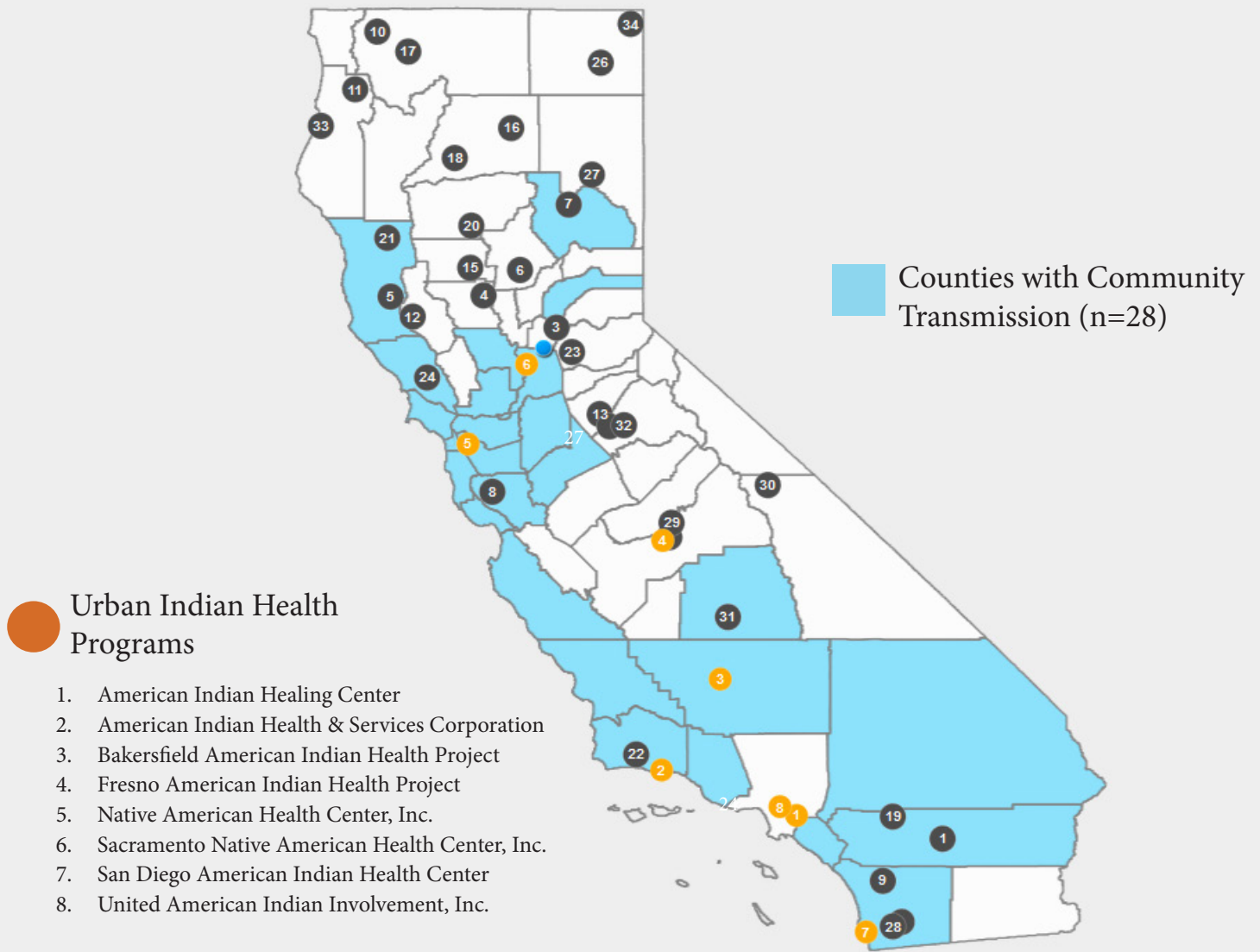
