DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 860,000 with more than 45,000 deaths. The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) has reported that 17 California IHS patients have tested positive for COVID-19. The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 186,101 as reported on Wednesday 4/1/2020 to 213,144 reported today. The number of deaths increased from 3,603 to 4,513.

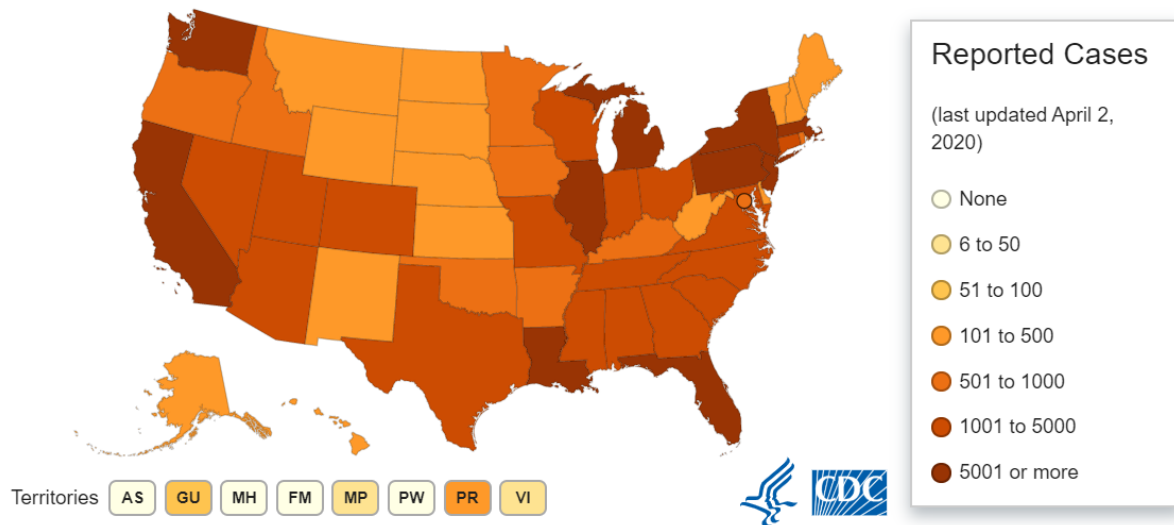

COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*

- Total cases: 213,144
- Total deaths: 4,513
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

* Data include both confirmed and presumptive positive cases of COVID-19 reported to CDC or tested at CDC since January 21, 2020, with the exception of testing results for persons repatriated to the United States from Wuhan, China and Japan. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

Public Health Laboratory Testing

As of the evening of April 1, the total number of public health laboratories (PHL) that have completed verification and are offering testing is 95. This includes one or more PHL in 50 states plus DC, Guam and Puerto Rico.

CALIFORNIA

As of April 1, 2020, there are a total of 9,191 positive cases and 203 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 101 cases
- Age 18-49: 4,604 cases
- Age 50-64: 2,429 cases
- Age 65 and older: 2,007 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 50 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 4,254 cases
- Male: 4,806 cases
- Unknown: 131 cases

In order to better focus public health resources on the changing needs of California communities, beginning on March 18, the state is no longer collecting information about California travelers returning from countries that have confirmed COVID-19 outbreaks. Community transmission of COVID-19 has been identified in California since late February, and since early March, most of the confirmed cases in the state were not related to travel outside of the United States.

Twenty-two public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Contra Costa, Humboldt, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.



INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

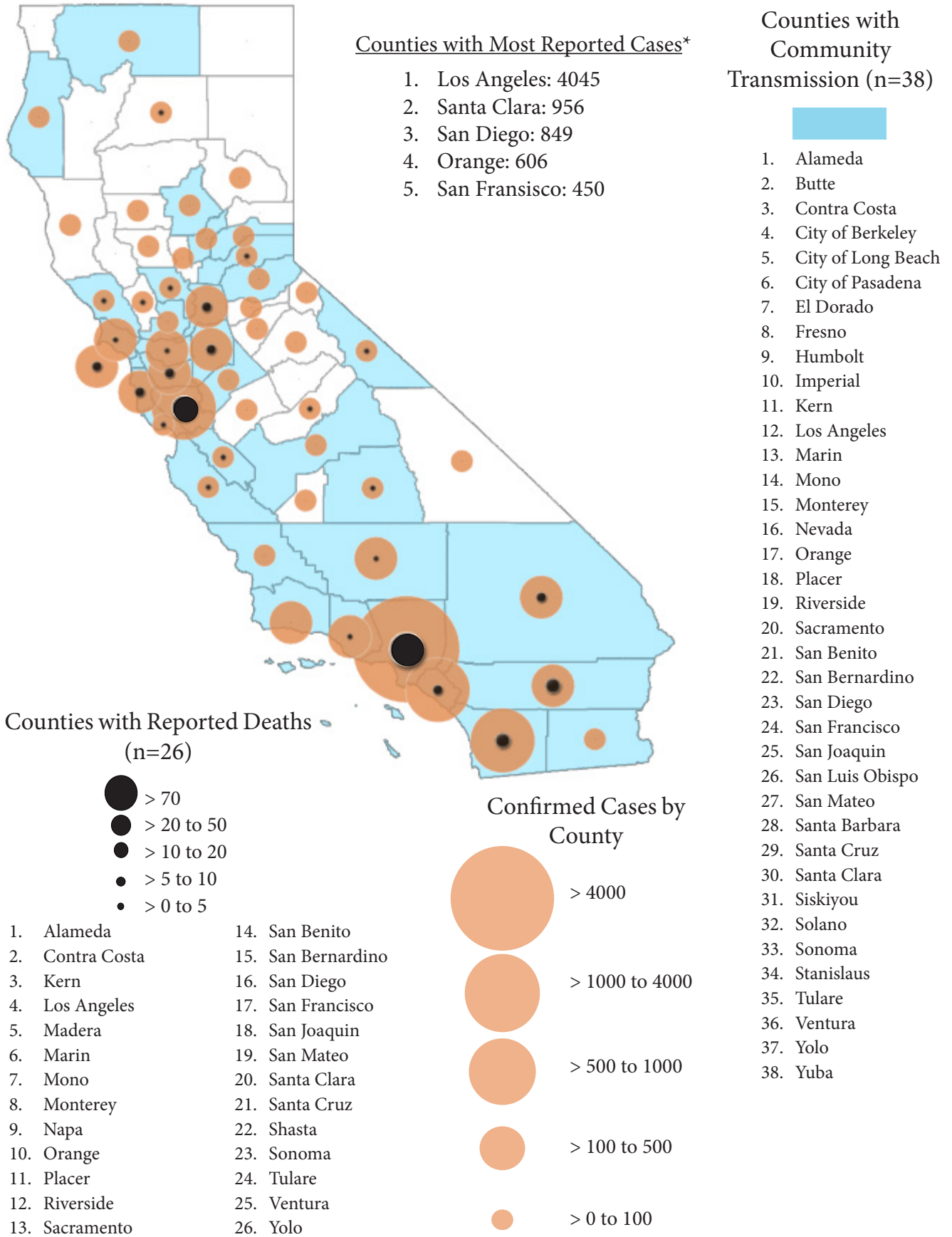
The Indian Health Service (IHS) California Area as of 04/2/2020 reports that 372 IHS patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19. Of these, 17 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 234 have tested negative for COVID-19.

CONFIRMED CASES AND DEATHS BY COUNTY

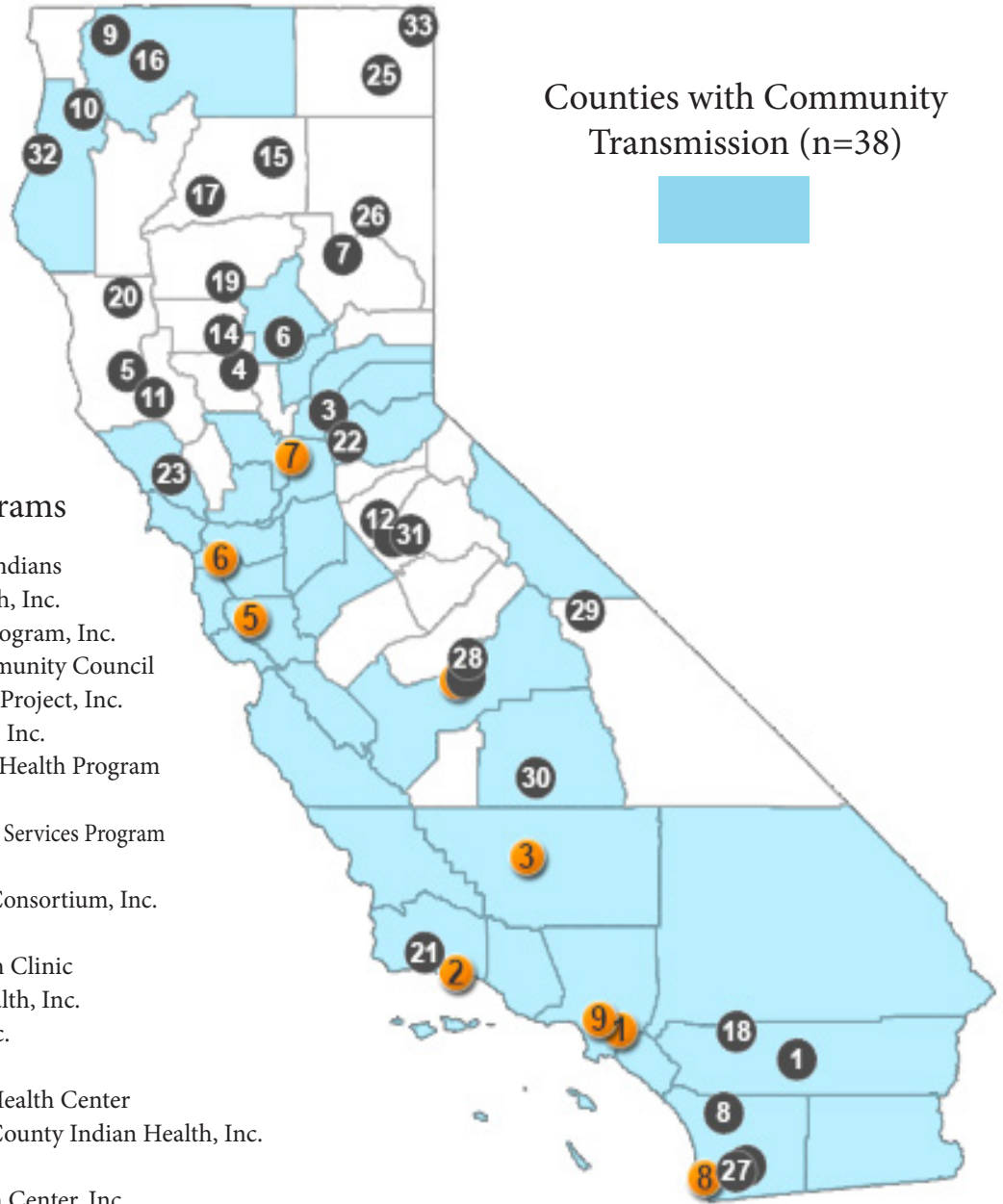
CURRENT AS OF 12PM ON APRIL 2, 2020

This map shows community transmission cases reported to the county. The locations of Tribal Health Programs and Urban Indian Health Programs are being shown as reference only.



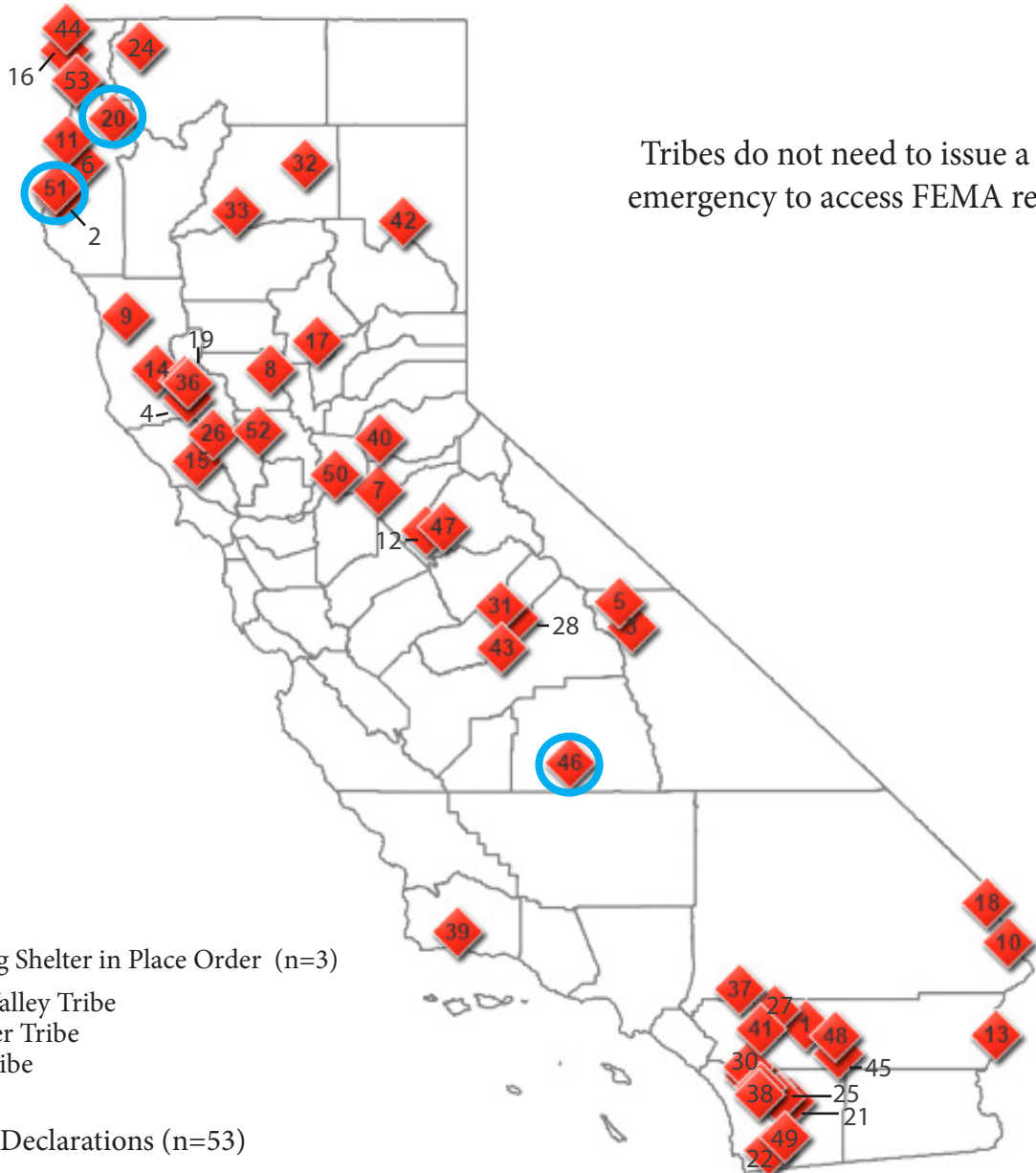

TRIBAL STATE OF EMERGENCY AND SHELTER IN PLACE DECLARATIONS



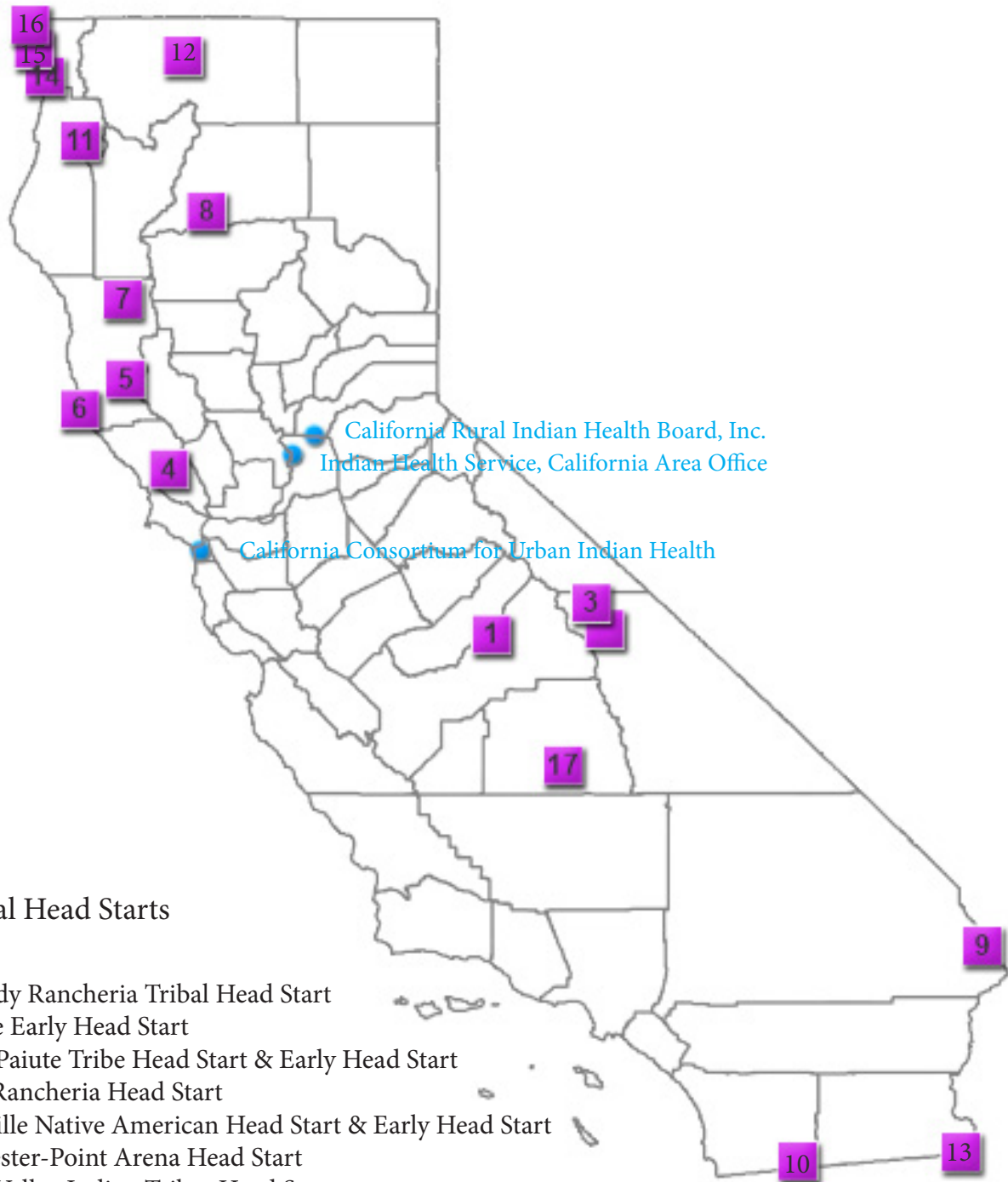
