

# CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019 (COVID-19) SITUATIONAL REPORT #25 APRIL 15, 2020



Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 1.92 million with more than 123,126 deaths.

California Governor Gavin Newsom today unveiled six key indicators that will guide California's thinking for when and how to modify the stay-at-home and other orders during the COVID-19 pandemic. For more information: https://www.gov.ca.gov/

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 579,005, as reported on Tuesday 4/14/2020 to 605,390 reported today. The number of deaths increased from 22,252 to 24,582.

The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) has reported that 35 California Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients have tested positive for COVID-19 as of 4/13/2020.

#### California Tribal Nation Grant Fund

The California Tribal Nation Grant Fund COVID-19 Emergency Grant is available to eligible tribes to prepare for and respond to COVID-19. These grant funds may be used to fund programs, supplies, and actions taken in response to guidance of public health officials to address the threat of COVID-19, so long as those initiatives are not otherwise funded or provided by sources outside of the Tribal Nation Grant Fund.


#### COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance\*

- Total cases: 605,390
- Total deaths: 24,582
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)
- \*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting

confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or

iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19.

State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to

Public health Laboratory Testing


As of the evening of April 14, the total number of public health laboratories (PHLs) that have completed verification and are offering testing is 95. This includes one or more PHL in 50 states plus DC, Guam and Puerto Rico.

#### **CALIFORNIA**

As of April 14, 2020, there are a total of 24,424 positive cases and 821 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

• Age 0-17: 385 cases

• Age 18-49: 11,721 cases

Age 50-64: 6,644 cases

• Age 65 and older: 5,605 cases

• Unknown/Missing: 69 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

• Female: 11,352 cases

• Male: 11,772 cases

• Unknown: 214 cases

In order to better focus public health resources on the changing needs of California communities, beginning on March 18, the state is no longer collecting information about California travelers returning from countries that have confirmed COVID-19 outbreaks. Community transmission of COVID-19 has been identified in California since late February, and since early March, most of the confirmed cases in the state were not related to travel outside of the United States.

Twenty-two public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Contra Costa, Humboldt, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

#### INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA


574 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 4/13/2020.

#### CONFIRMED CASES AND DEATHS BY COUNTY




New Confirmed Cases in California by Date of Lab Confirmation

New Confirmed Deaths in California by Day



American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.4% of deaths in California.




# In California:


