

CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019 (COVID-19) SITUATIONAL REPORT #26 APRIL 16, 2020



Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 1.99 million with more than 130,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 605,390 as reported on Wednesday, 4/15/2020 to 632,220 reported today. The number of deaths increased from 24,582 to 27,012.

The Tribal Emergency Preparedness and Response Program (TEPRP) provides technical assistance and training to Tribes and Tribal Health Programs on hazard emergency preparedness planning and response. Tribal leaders and clinic administrators may contact Corinne.Chavez@dhcs.ca.gov.

At the California Governor's direction, the Employment Development Department (EDD) will launch a new call center on Monday that will operate 7 days a week from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. The Governor also directs EDD to expedite access to the Work Share program to avert layoffs. California Tribal Nation Grant Fund

The California Tribal Nation Grant Fund COVID-19 Emergency Grant is available to eligible tribes to prepare for and respond to COVID-19. These grant funds may be used to fund programs, supplies, and actions taken in response to guidance of public health officials to address the threat of COVID-19, so long as those initiatives are not otherwise funded or provided by sources outside of the Tribal Nation Grant Fund.

COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*

- Total cases: 632,548 (632,220 confirmed; 348 probable)
- Total deaths: 27,012 (22,871 confirmed; 4,141 probable)
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case

definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.


A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19. A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or

iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to

<u>Public Health Laboratory Testing</u>
As of the evening of April 15, the total number of public health laboratories that have completed verification and are offering testing is 95. This includes one or more PHL in 50 states plus DC, Guam and Puerto Rico.

CALIFORNIA

As of April 15, 2020, there are a total of 26,182 positive cases and 890 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

• Age 0-17: 432 cases

• Age 18-49: 12,479 cases

• Age 50-64: 7,141 cases

• Age 65 and older: 6,051 cases • Unknown/Missing: 79 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

• Female: 12,771 cases

• Male: 13,169 cases

• Unknown: 242 cases

In order to better focus public health resources on the changing needs of California communities, beginning on March 18, the state is no longer collecting information about California travelers returning from countries that have confirmed COVID-19 outbreaks. Community transmission of COVID-19 has been identified in California since late February, and since early March, most of the confirmed cases in the state were not related to travel outside of the United States.

Twenty-two public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Contra Costa, Humboldt, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

594 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 4/14/2020.


Of these, 36 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 460 have tested negative for COVID-19.


New Confirmed Cases in California by Date of Lab Confirmation*

New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date*



American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.4% of deaths in California.




In California:


