

CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019 (COVID-19) SITUATIONAL REPORT #32 APRIL 24, 2020



Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 2.63 million with more than 181,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 828,441 as reported on Thursday 4/23/2020 to 865,585 reported today. The number of deaths increased from 46,379 to 48,816.

President Trump signed a \$484 billion COVID-19 relief bill on Friday 4/24/2020, supplementing the Payment Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act, to aid employers and hospitals under stress from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Tribal Emergency Preparedness and Response Program (TEPRP) provides technical assistance and training to Tribas and Tribal Health Programs on hazard emergency preparedness planning and response. Tribal leaders and clinic administrators may contact Corinne.Chavez@dhcs.

The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) is accepting applications for the Rural Tribal COVID-19 Response program. The purpose of this program is to assist Tribes, Tribal organizations, urban Indian health organizations and health service providers to Tribes to prevent, prepare for and respond to COVID-19 in rural communities. COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*


- Total cases: 865,585 (2,937 probable cases)
- Total deaths: 48,816 (5,365 probable deaths)
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made

to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.



A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or

iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

Public Health Laboratory Testing


As of the evening of April 23, the total number of public health laboratories (PHL) that have completed verification and are offering testing is 97. This includes one or more PHL in 50 states plus the District of Columbia, Guam and Puerto Rico.

CALIFORNIA

As of April 23, 2020, there are a total of 39,254 positive cases and 1,562 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

• Age 0-17: 936 cases

• Age 18-49: 18,954 cases

• Age 50-64: 10,451 cases

• Age 65 and older: 8,832 cases

• Unknown/Missing: 81 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

• Female: 19,394 cases

• Male: 19,577 cases

• Unknown: 283 cases

In order to better focus public health resources on the changing needs of California communities, beginning on March 18, the state is no longer collecting information about California travelers returning from countries that have confirmed COVID-19 outbreaks. Community transmission of COVID-19 has been identified in California since late February, and since early March, most of the confirmed cases in the state were not related to travel outside of the United States.

Twenty-two public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Contra Costa, Humboldt, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

902 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 4/22/2020.

Of these, 51 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 665 have tested negative for COVID-19.


New Confirmed Cases in California by Date of Lab Confirmation*



RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.3% of deaths in California. These include 53 cases and 7 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



CHARACTERISTICS OF CALIFORNIA COVID-19 POSITIVE CASES


In California:


- 8.5% of confirmed cases have been admitted to a hospital
