



#### DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 3.4 million with more than 238,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 1,062,446 as reported on Friday 5/01/2020 to 1,152,372 reported today. The number of deaths increased from 62,406 to 67,456.

The Tribal Emergency Preparedness and Response Program (TEPRP) provides technical assistance and training to Tribas and Tribal Health Programs on hazard emergency preparedness planning and response. Tribal leaders and clinic administrators may contact <u>Corinne.Chavez@dhcs.</u> <u>ca.gov</u>.

The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) is accepting applications for the Rural Tribal COVID-19 Response program. The purpose of this program is to assist Tribes, Tribal organizations, urban Indian health organizations and health service providers to Tribes to prevent, prepare for and respond to COVID-19 in rural communities. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) announced the availability of, and distribution decisions for, \$15 million in new resources appropriated in the recently enacted Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security, to address coronavirus prevention, preparedness, and response in American Indian and Alaska Native communities. In response to Tribal Leader feedback, SAMHSA will allocate \$15 million by providing supplements to the existing Tribal Behavioral Health Grant (Native Connections). The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) has reported that 64 California Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients have tested positive for COVID-19 as of 5/02/2020.

#### COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance\*

- Total cases: 1,152,372
- Total deaths: 67,456
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

\*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and

probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

The position statement included a case

definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19. A probable case or death is defined by:


i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or

ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or

iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19.

State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date. <u>Public Health Laboratory Testing</u>


As of the evening of May 3, the total number of public health laboratories (PHL) that have completed verification and are offering testing is 97. This includes one or more PHL in 50 states plus the District of Columbia, Guam and Puerto Rico.

#### CALIFORNIA

As of May 3, 2020, there are a total of 54,937 positive cases and 2,254 deaths in California.

- Ages of all confirmed positive cases:
  - Age 0-17: 1,715 cases
  - Age 18-49: 26,956 cases
  - Age 50-64: 14,078 cases
  - Age 65 and older: 12,098 cases
  - Unknown/Missing: 90 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 27,239 cases
- Male: 27,332 cases
- Unknown: 366 cases

In order to better focus public health resources on the changing needs of California communities, beginning on March 18, the state is no longer collecting information about California travelers returning from countries that have confirmed COVID-19 outbreaks. Community transmission of COVID-19 has been identified in California since late February, and since early March, most of the confirmed cases in the state were not related to travel outside of the United States.


Twenty-two public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Contra Costa, Humboldt, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

### INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

1,597 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 5/02/2020. Of these, 64 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 1,071 have tested negative for COVID-19. 
## CONFIRMED CASES AND DEATHS BY COUNTY

#### RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.3% of deaths in California. These include 71 cases and 7 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.

## CHARACTERISTICS OF CALIFORNIA COVID-19 POSITIVE CASES


In California:

## **Racial disparities:**

- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos, African Americans, and Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are dying at disproportionately high rates.
- More men than women are dying, consistent with national statistics.
- For Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders, overall numbers are low, but the proportion of COVID-19 deaths is roughly 3 times their population representation.
