

DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 13.34 million with more than 579,00 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 3,416,428 as reported on Wednesday 7/15/2020 to 3,483,832 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 135,235 to 136,938.

The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) has reported that 254 California Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients have tested positive for COVID-19 as of 7/14/2020.

The Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) continues its mission to support workers who are performing essential tasks in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Cal OES has sent millions of surgical masks to critical sectors during this ongoing response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Learn more <u>HERE</u>.

The National Indian Health Board (NIHB) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) are collaborating on an infection prevention and control (IPC) training initiative for frontline Tribal healthcare facility personnel. In order for this initiative to be as responsive to the needs of Tribal healthcare workers and the Tribal health system as possible, NIHB will be holding a series national listening sessions with front line Tribal healthcare workers. The purpose of the listening sessions is gather feedback from frontline workers and relevant stakeholders, for frontline staff to share their experience and opinions on what types of IPC trainings would be valuable, how best to host those trainings, as well other types of training materials would be useful. Input from the listening sessions will be used to inform the content and delivery of core trainings, products, and outreach. The first session is held on July 22, at 11:00 am (PST) click <u>HERE</u>.

COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*


- Total cases: 3,483,832
- Total deaths: 136,938
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists

on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by: i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or



iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.



CALIFORNIA

As of July 15, 2020, there were a total of 356,178 positive cases and 7,345 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 29,945 cases
- Age 18-49: 213,083 cases
- Age 50-64: 69,998 cases
- Age 65 and older: 42,748 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 404 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 5,915,508

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 176,728 cases
- Male: 177,540 cases
- Unknown: 1,910 cases


Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA


5,697 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 7/14/2020. Of these, 254 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 4,496 have tested negative for COVID-19. CONFIRMED CASES AND DEATHS BY COUNTY CURRENT AS OF July 16, 2020




RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.4% of deaths in California. These include 498 cases and 25 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



In California:

Racial disparities:

For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.

Almost half of all deaths continue to be in the 80+ age category.


COVID-19 Testing Information from Patients Seen at a Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program in California.


