

DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 16.81 million with more than 662,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 4,339,997 as reported on Wednesday 7/29/2020 to 4,405,932 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 148,866 to 150,283.

The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) has reported that 410 California Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients have tested positive for COVID-19 as of 7/28/2020.

The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has taken action to require better, more timely collection of data on race, ethnicity, gender identity, and sexual orientation to better understand the impact of COVID-19 on the state's diverse communities. The regulations require providers and labs to continue to collect and report race and ethnicity and patient's gender identity and sexual orientation data.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services released its first monthly update of data that provides a snapshot of the impact of COVID-19 on the Medicare population. For the first time, the snapshot includes data for American Indian/Alaskan Native Medicare beneficiaries. The new data indicate that American Indian/Alaskan Native beneficiaries have the second highest rate of hospitalization for COVID-19 among racial/ethnic groups after Blacks. Previously, the number of hospitalizations of American Indian/Alaskan Native beneficiaries was too low to be reported. The updated data confirm that the COVID-19 public health emergency is disproportionately affecting vulnerable populations, particularly racial and ethnic minorities.


COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*

- Total cases: 4,405,932
- Total deaths: 150,283
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by: i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic



evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19.

State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.



CALIFORNIA

As of July 29, 2020, there were a total of 485,502 positive cases and 8,909 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 43,880 cases
- Age 18-49: 293,721 cases
- Age 50-64: 93,273 cases
- Age 65 and older: 54,039 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 589 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 7,633,840

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 242,598 cases
- Male: 238,861 cases
- Unknown: 4,043 cases


Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA


6,817 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 7/28/2020. Of these, 410 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 5,584 have tested negative for COVID-19. CONFIRMED CASES AND DEATHS BY COUNTY CURRENT AS OF July 30, 2020




RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.4% of deaths in California. These include 713 cases and 32 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.





0.4% of confirmed cases have been admitted to an Intensive Care Unit


1.8% of cases have died

Racial disparities:


- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- Almost half of all deaths continue to be in the 80+ age category.



CDC Data show that AIAN in California are testing positive for COVID-19 and dying at rates that are nearly equal to their proportion of California's population. This includes a total of








TRIBAL STATE OF EMERGENCY AND SHELTER IN PLACE DECLARATIONS




