

DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 18.14 million with more than 691,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 4,405,932 as reported on Thursday 7/30/2020 to 4,649,102 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 150,283 to 154,471 (updated as of 8/3).

The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) has reported that 447 California Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients have tested positive for COVID-19 as of 8/2/2020.

COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*


- Total cases: 4,649,102 (updated as of 8/3)
- Total deaths: 154,471
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing



performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.



CALIFORNIA

As of August 3, 2020, there were a total of 519,427 positive cases and 9,501 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 47,920 cases
- Age 18-49: 314,238 cases
- Age 50-64: 99,383 cases
- Age 65 and older: 57,247 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 639 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 8,305,713

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:


- Female: 259,130 cases
- Male: 254,274 cases
- Unknown: 6,023 cases

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.



7,281 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 8/2/2020. Of these, 447 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 5,951 have tested negative for COVID-19. 


RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.4% of deaths in California. These include 786 cases and 35 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



36% of cases and 2% of deaths are of unknown race/ethnicity. As of 8/03/2020. Source: CDPH


Two sources for tracking American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) Cases reported in California




Racial disparities:


- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- Almost half of all deaths continue to be in the 80+ age category.


COVID-19 Testing Information from Patients Seen at a Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program in California.




