

## CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019 (COVID-19) SITUATIONAL REPORT #102 AUGUST 5, 2020



### DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 18.35 million with more than 696,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 4,649,102 as reported on Monday 8/3/2020 to 4,748,806 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 154,471 to 156,311.

The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) has reported that 458 California Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients have tested positive for COVID-19 as of 8/3/2020.

According to a Public Health Newswire article by Louise Dettman from the American Public Health Association, when compared to their urban counterparts, rural women have shorter life expectancies, experience more incidents of violence and content with a greater lack of access to a range of health care and other services close to home. The COVID-19 pandemic has worsened those inequities. There's increased sexual and domestic violence, economic hardship and adverse health effects due to shifting priorities to child care and job security. Native Americans are experiencing a disproportionate toll on their health and economy, for example, with the pandemic exacerbating existing inequities. Yet rural communities are well-connected, resourceful and have made positive efforts to protect their health. Some of the programs that assist rural women in Arizona have included mutual aid efforts across Native land to provide handwashing stations and masks, the expansion of telehealth programs throughout the state and community health centers that offer COVID-19 testing and provide services through a sliding-scale fees. Some community health centers are adding virtual support groups for domestic violence victims. Visit publichealthnewswire.org for the full article.



### COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance\*


- Total cases: 4,748,806

\*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.



i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing



performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.



### **CALIFORNIA**

As of August 4, 2020, there were a total of 524,722 positive cases and 9,703 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

• Age 0-17: 48,524 cases

• Age 18-49: 317,287 cases

• Age 50-64: 100,408 cases

• Age 65 and older: 57,847 cases

• Unknown/Missing: 656 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

• Female: 261,806 cases

• Male: 256,828 cases

• Unknown: 6,088 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 8,409,400

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

7,493 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 8/3/2020.


Of these, 458 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 6,195 have tested negative for COVID-19.






### New Confirmed Cases in California by Date of Lab Confirmation






### RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA






Two sources for tracking American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) Cases reported in California








### In California:


- **1.2%** of confirmed cases have been admitted to a hospital
- **0.3%** of confirmed cases have been admitted to an Intensive Care Unit
- 1.8% of cases have died

### Racial disparities:

- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- Almost half of all deaths continue to be in the 80+ age category.



CDC Data show that AIAN in California are testing positive for COVID-19 at rates just below their proportion of California's population and dying at slightly higher than expected rates.

This includes a total of 1,559 cases and 49 deaths.




### COVID-19 Testing Information from Patients Seen at a Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program in California.




