## CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019 (COVID-19) SITUATIONAL REPORT #106 AUGUST 11, 2020



### DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 19.93 million with more than 732,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 5,023,649 as reported on Monday 8/10/2020 to 5,064,171 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 161,842 to 162,407.

The California Area Indian Health Service (IHS) has reported that 519 California Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients have tested positive for COVID-19 as of 8/9/2020.

On Thursday August 6, the National Indian Health Board (NIHB) submitted a letter to President Trump urging his Administration to endorse critical Tribal COVID-19 health priorities as negotiations continue on the next congressional pandemic relief package. The priorities outlined in NIHB's letter reflect many urgent priorities communicated by Tribal leaders in furtherance of federal treaty obligations and to address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on Tribal Nations and American Indian and Alaska Native people. Dr. Sonia Angell, California's Department of Public Health Director, resigned on Sunday August 9th. Her resignation comes just days after it was revealed that the state's computer system 'CalREDIE' was malfunctioning, causing an undercount of COVID-19 cases in the state. In her place, Sandra Shewry will serve as acting director of California Department of Public Health.

Secretary DeVos announced a \$15 million grant competition to promote tribally directed education choice for Native American students. Accessing Choices in Education (ACE) grants will allow tribes, or other education entities partnering with tribes, to set up a variety of education options and services from which parents or students can choose. 

### COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance\*

\*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.






State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

### **CALIFORNIA**

As of August 10, 2020, there were a total of 574,411 positive cases and 10,468 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

• Age 0-17: 54,778 cases

• Age 18-49: 346,637 cases

• Age 50-64: 109,714 cases

• Age 65 and older: 62,506 cases

• Unknown/Missing: 776 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

• Female: 287,810 cases

• Male: 279,981 cases

• Unknown: 6,620 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 9,186,279

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

7,937 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 8/9/2020.


Of these, 519 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 6,804 have tested negative for COVID-19.



### New Confirmed Cases in California by Date of Lab Confirmation




New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date


### RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.4% of deaths in California. These include 869 cases and 39 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.










- 1.0% of confirmed cases have been admitted to a hospital

### Racial disparities:


- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- Almost half of all deaths continue to be in the 80+ age category.

### American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) data reported by California to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)






### COVID-19 Testing Information from Patients Seen at a Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program in California.


