DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 20.73 million with more than 751,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 5,176,018 as reported on Thursday 8/13/2020 to 5,228,817 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 165,148 to 166,317.

Leading up to the current COVID-19 public health crisis, many state and federal policies undercut Tribal sovereignty, leaving Tribal healthcare systems underfunded and ill-equipped to respond to the spread of COVID-19 in their communities. In response, Tribes have exercised their inherent sovereignty to implement a range of infection control measures, with community-led initiatives providing creative and nimble solutions to the evolving crisis. This webinar will introduce participants to key principles in Indian law and Tribal public health law, discuss the impact of COVID-19 in Indian Country, and identify response strategies based upon practical experience. COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*

- Total cases: 5,228,817
- Total deaths: 166,317
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

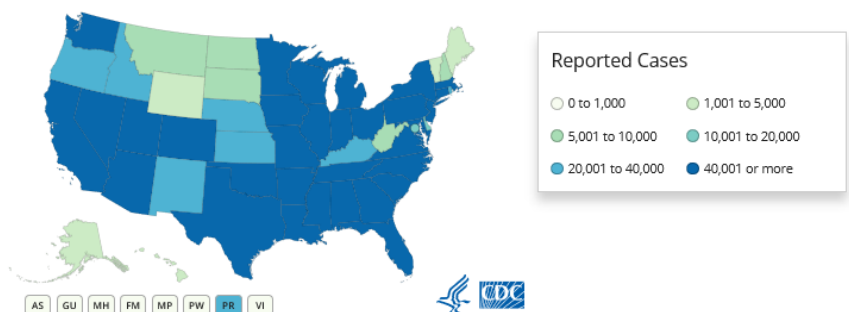
A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19.

State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

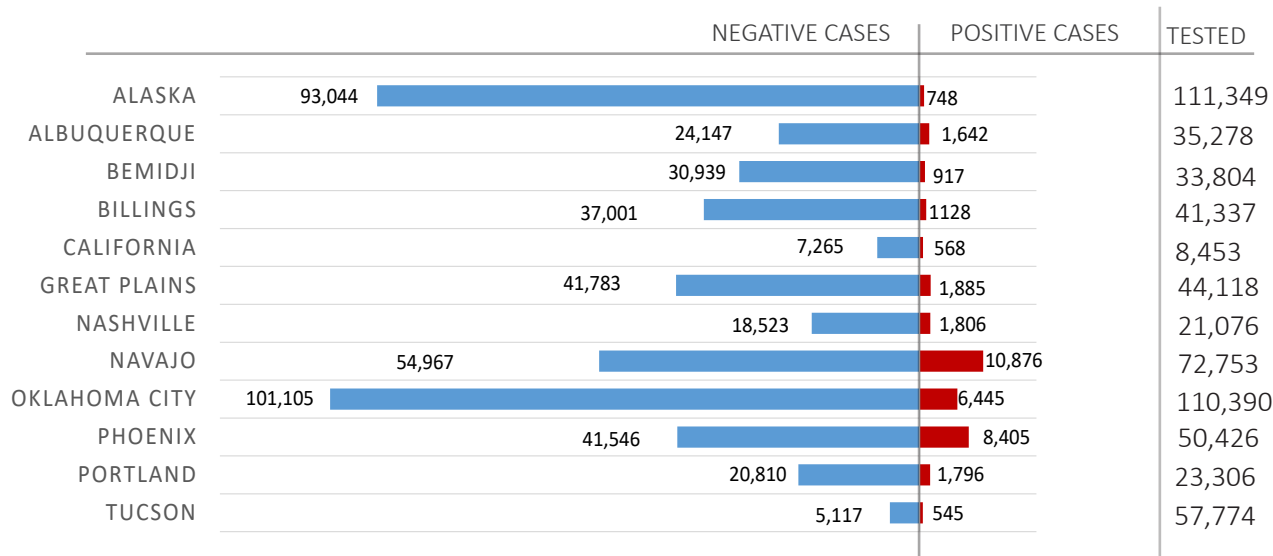

CALIFORNIA

As of August 13, 2020, there were a total of 601,075 positive cases and 10,996 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 58,146 cases
- Age 18-49: 362,344 cases
- Age 50-64: 114,633 cases
- Age 65 and older: 65,116 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 836 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 301,863 cases
- Male: 292,627 cases
- Unknown: 6,585 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 9,556,598

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

8,453 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 8/12/2020.

Of these, 568 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 7,265 have tested negative for COVID-19.

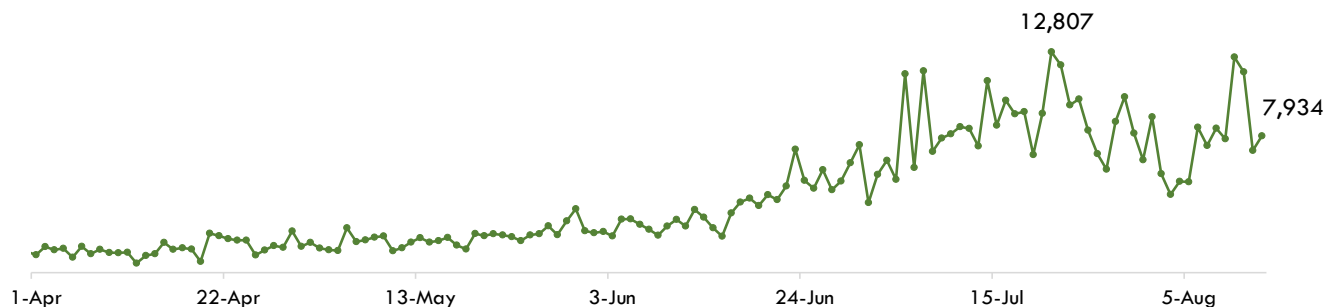

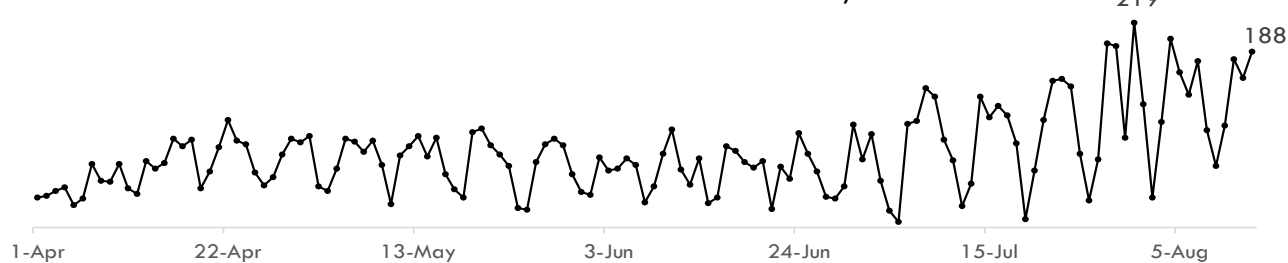

New Confirmed Cases in California by Date of Lab Confirmation



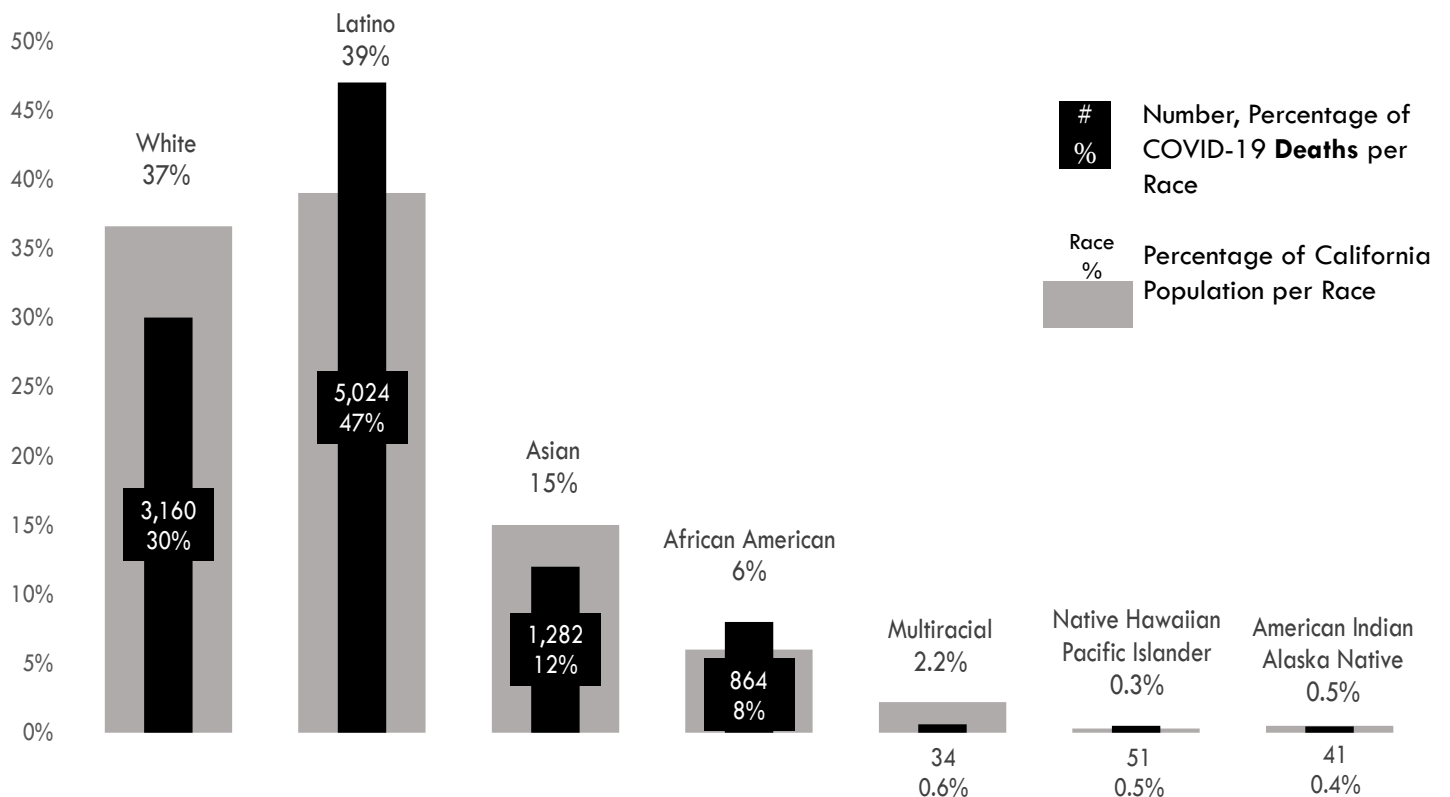
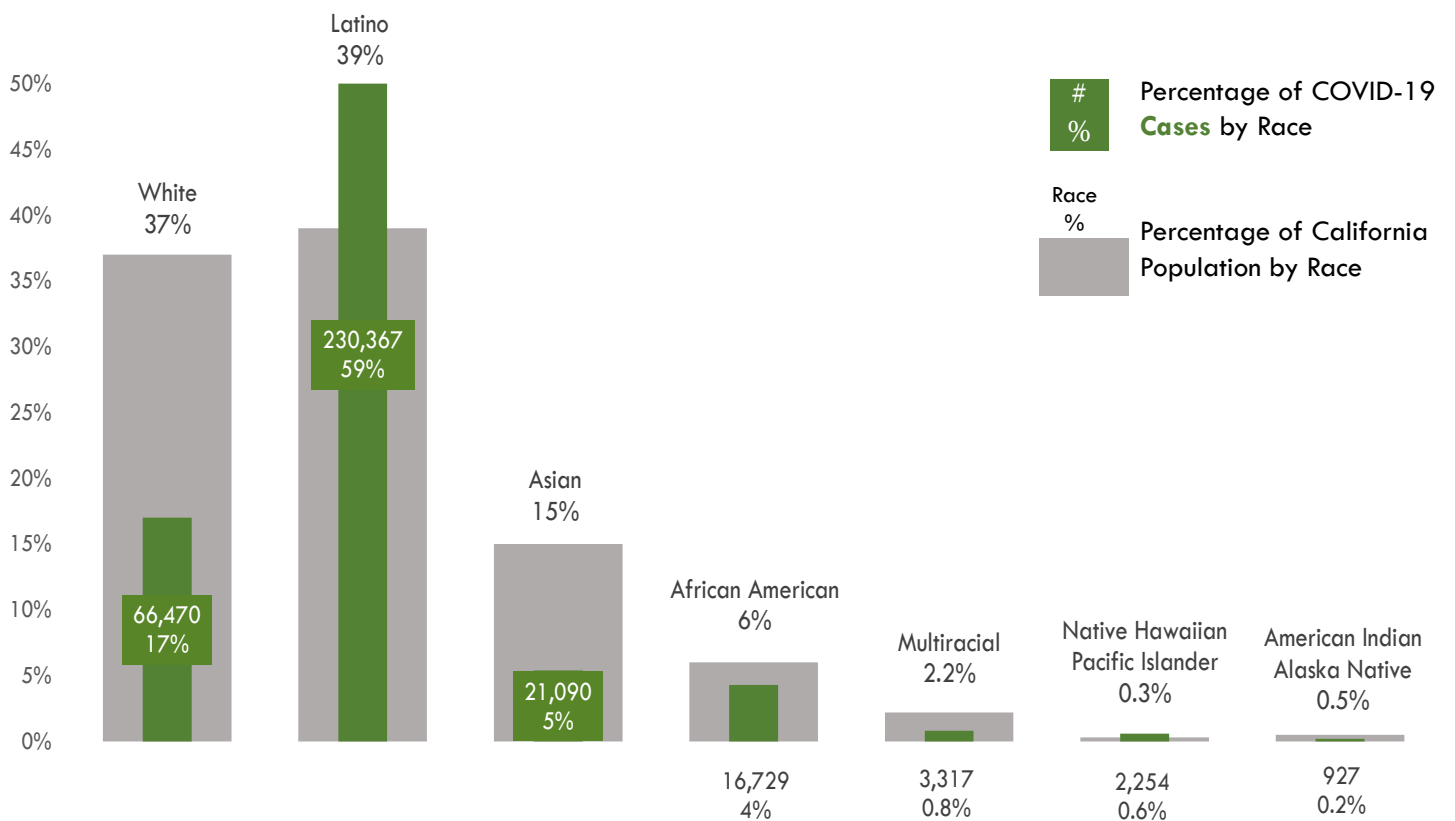
New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date

RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA

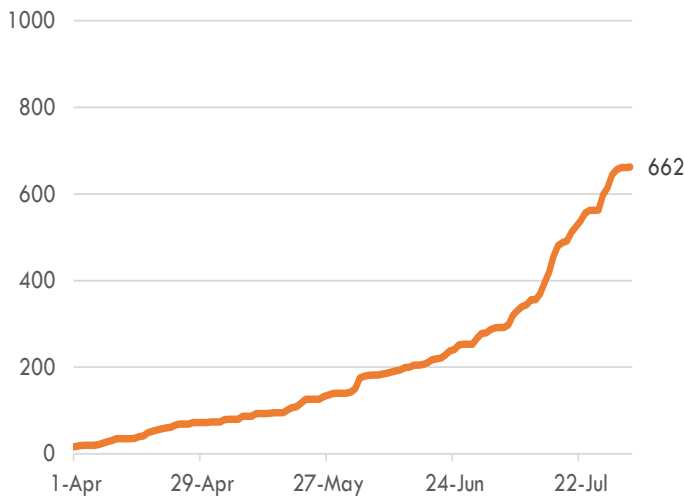
American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.2% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.4% of deaths** in California. These include **927 cases** and **41 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



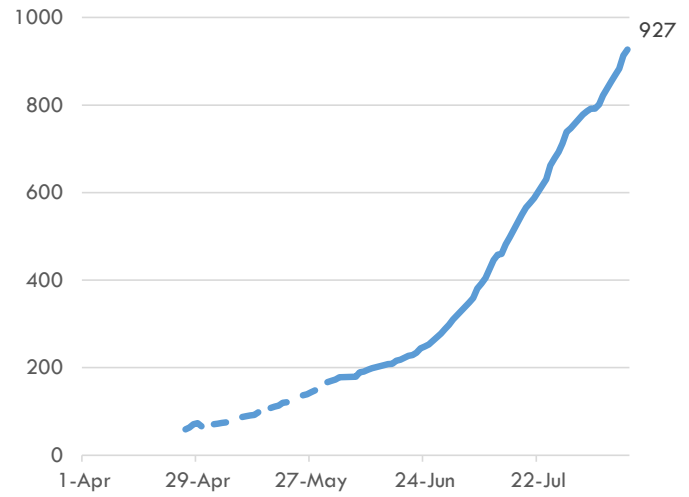

Data from the **Indian Health Service (IHS)** include positive cases reported by Tribal and Urban Indian Health Programs.

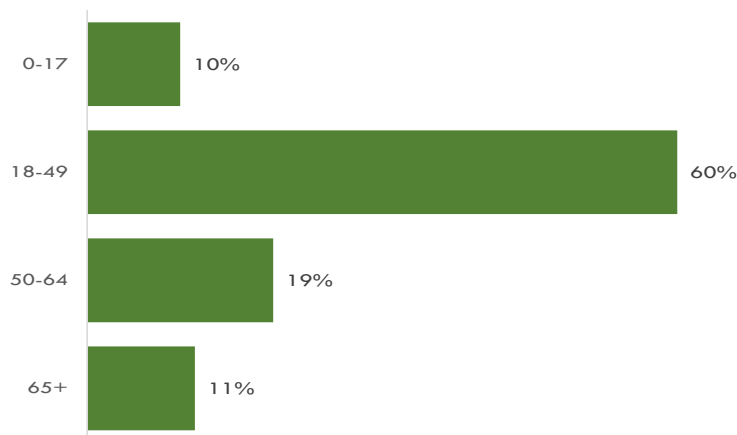

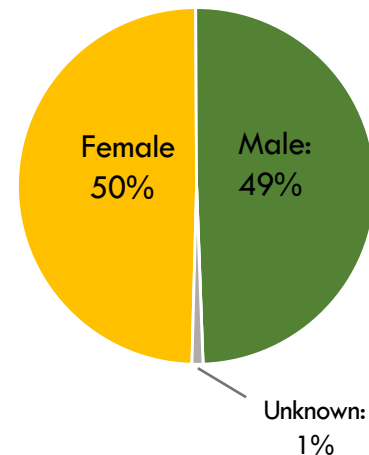

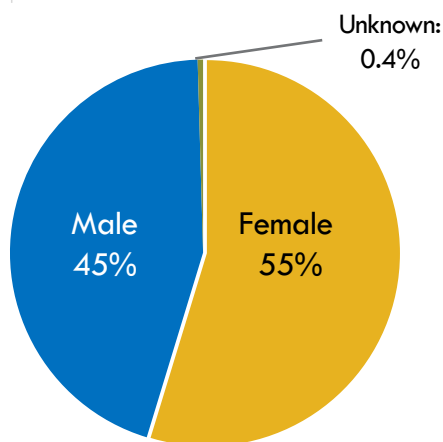
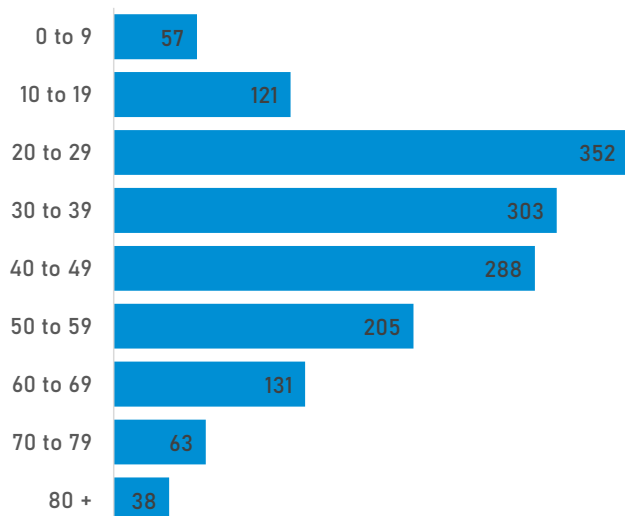
Case and death disparities:

- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- More males (57%) are dying from COVID-19 than females (43%).

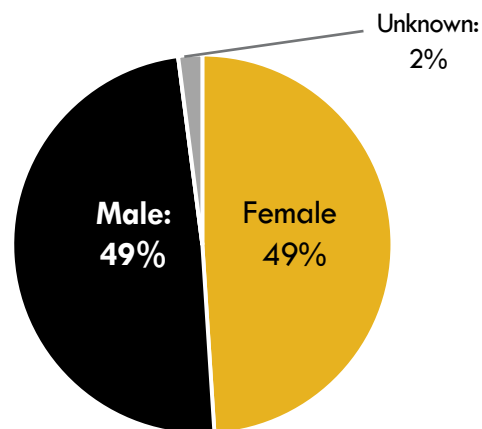
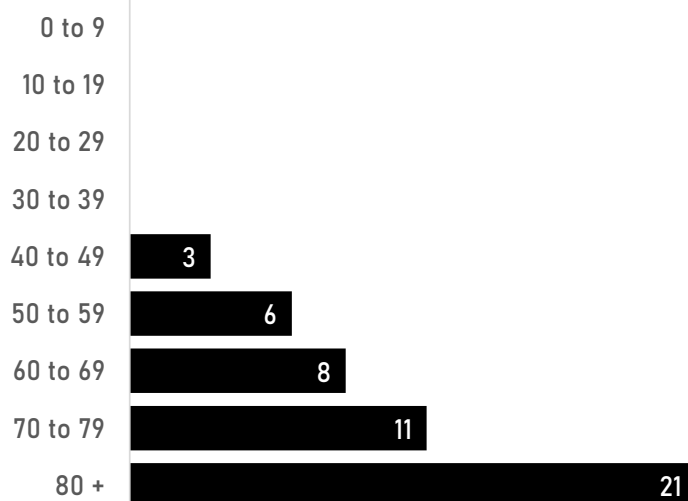

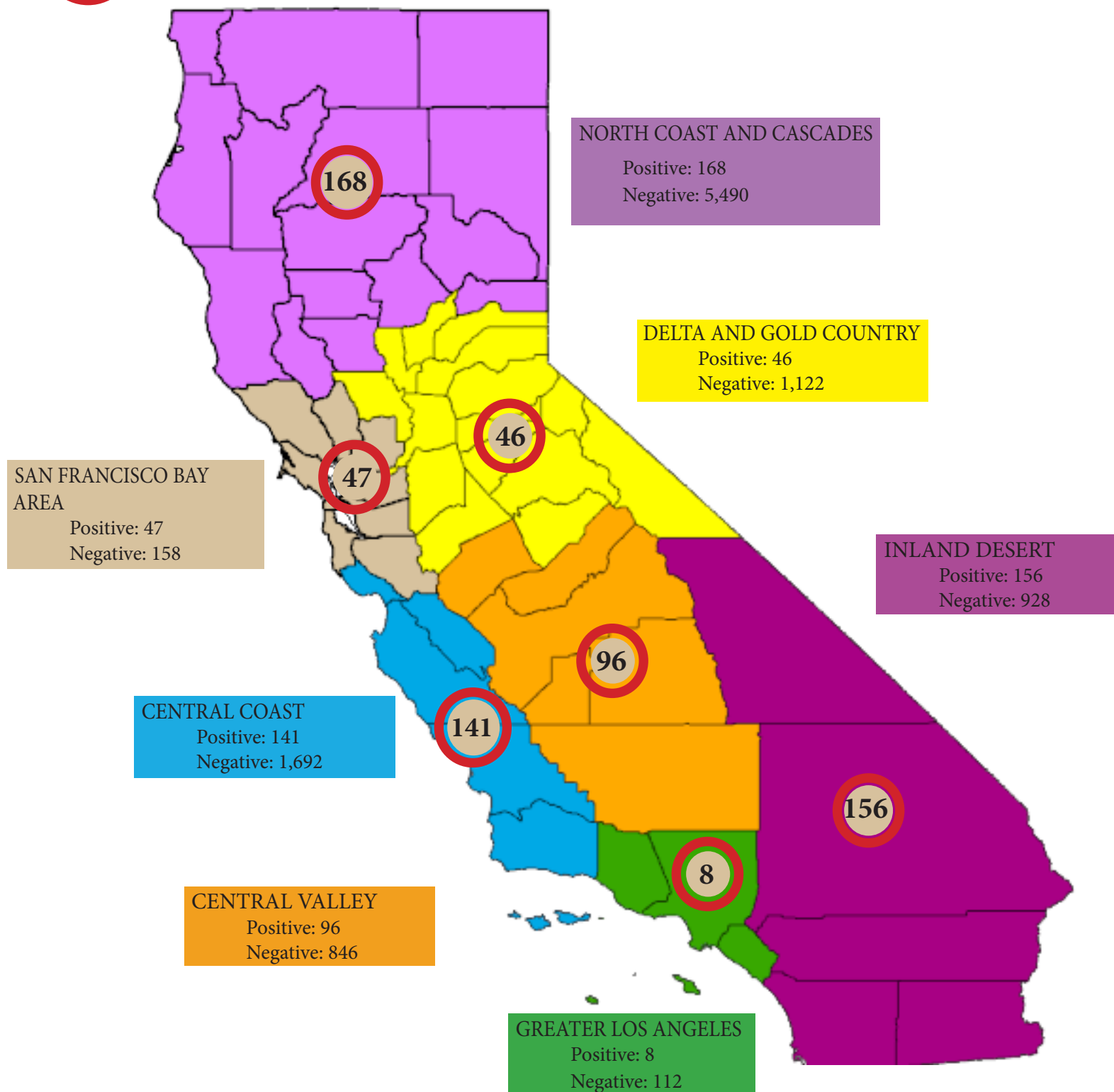

Tribes Issuing Shelter in Place Order

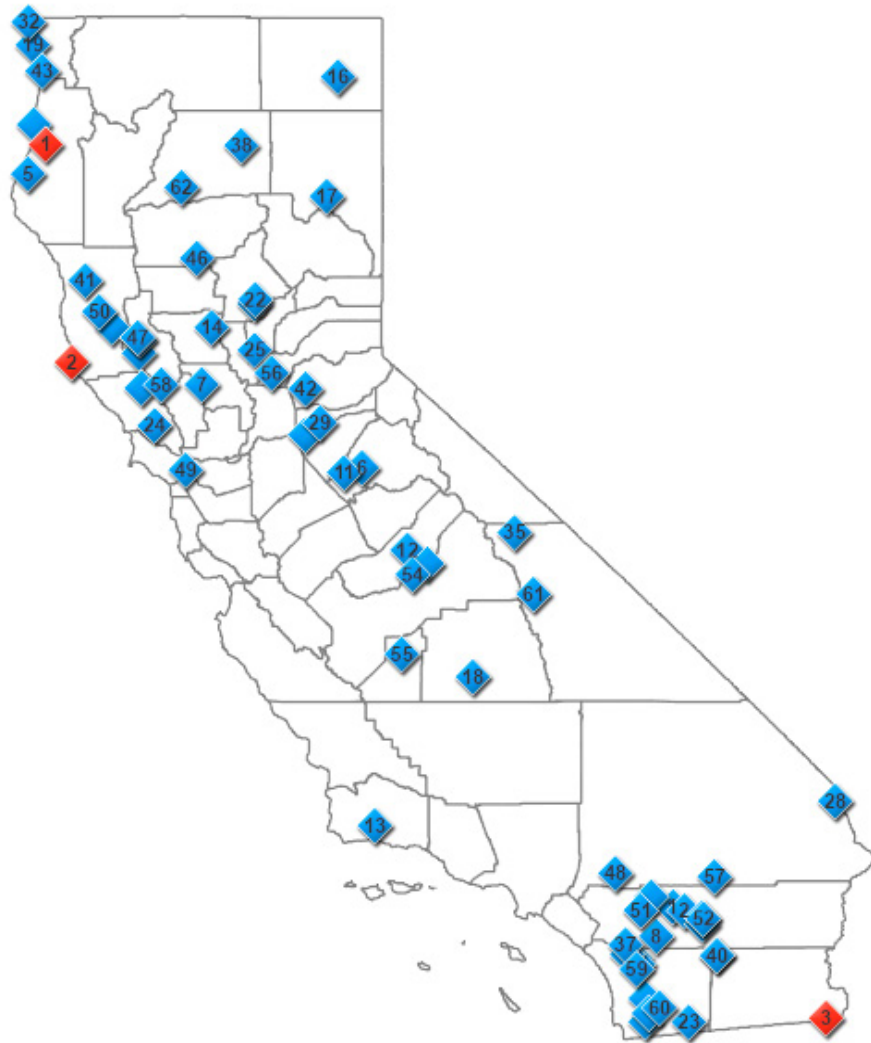

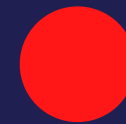


California Counties COVID-19 Response
