CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019 (COVID-19) SITUATIONAL REPORT #114 AUGUST 21, 2020



DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 22.53 million with more than 789,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 5,506,929 as reported on Thursday 8/20/2020 to 5,551,793 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 172,416 to 173,490.

The American Lung Association (ALA) is hosting a webcast on Lung Health and COVID-19: Updates with CDC. The webcast will feature speakers from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the ALA. The expert panel will provide an update on what is currently known about the linkages between COVID-19, smoking and several lung diseases, including asthma and COPD. Speakers will also provide information on educational and cessation resources on COVID-19 that can benefit partners. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) released their August 19th Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR). It is already known that American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) persons appear to be disproportionately affected by the COVID-19 pandemic; however, limited data are available to quantify the disparity in COVID-19 incidence, severity, and outcomes among AI/AN persons compared with those among other racial/ethnic groups. This report shows that in 23 states with adequate race/ethnicity data, the cumulative incidence of laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 among AI/AN persons was 3.5 times that among non-Hispanic white persons. 

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.






State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

CALIFORNIA

As of August 20, 2020, there were a total of 650,336 positive cases and 11,821 deaths in California.

Lab tests reported statewide: 10,329,372

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

8,953 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 8/19/2020.


Of these, 600 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 7,567 have tested negative for COVID-19.





New Confirmed Cases in California by Date




New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date

RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA









In California:


- 0.8% of confirmed cases have been admitted to a hospital
- **0.2%** of confirmed cases have been admitted to an Intensive Care Unit
- 1.8% of cases have died

Case and death disparities:


- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- More males (57%) are dying from COVID-19 than females (43%).




CDC Data show that AIAN in California are testing positive for COVID-19 at rates equal to their proportion of California's population and dying at higher than expected rates. This includes a total of 2,140 cases and 69 deaths.





TRIBAL STATE OF EMERGENCY AND SHELTER IN PLACE DECLARATIONS




