DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 23.31 million with more than 806,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 5,551,793 as reported on Friday 8/21/2020 to 5,682,491 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 173,490 to 176,223.

According to MSN, a man in Hong Kong is the first with a confirmed reinfection with the novel coronavirus, a new study suggests. There have been some previous reports of potential reinfection cases around the globe, but none have been confirmed with definitive testing, according to The New York Times. A group of researchers reported today on a case of a patient who was infected with two genetically different strains of the coronavirus, months apart, according to a press release from the University of Hong Kong's Department of Medicine. Antibody tests showed that the patient did not have any detectable antibody to the coronavirus when he was reinfected but developed detectable antibodies after reinfection. 

The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.







CALIFORNIA

As of August 23, 2020, there were a total of 668,615 positive cases and 12,152 deaths in California.

Lab tests reported statewide: 10,652,487

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

9,112 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 8/22/2020.


Of these, 610 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 7,789 have tested negative for COVID-19.






New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date

RACIAL DISTRIBUTION OF CONFIRMED COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN CALIFORNIA










- **0.7**% of confirmed cases have been admitted to a hospital

- 1.8% of cases have died

Case and death disparities:


- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- More males (57%) are dying from COVID-19 than females (43%).




CDC Data show that AIAN in California are testing positive for COVID-19 at rates equal to their proportion of California's population and dying at higher than expected rates. This includes a total of 2,140 cases and 69 deaths.






