

DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 23.75 million with more than 815,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 5,715,567 as reported on Tuesday 8/25/2020 to 5,762,653 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 176,617 to 177,759.


COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*

- Total cases: 5,762,653
- Total deaths: 177,759
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by: i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic



evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19.


State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

CALIFORNIA

As of August 25, 2020, there were a total of 679,099 positive cases and 12,407 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 68,163 cases
- Age 18-49: 408,100 cases
- Age 50-64: 128,929 cases
- Age 65 and older: 72,988 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 919 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 10,832,757

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:


- Female: 342,058 cases
- Male: 330,194 cases
- Unknown: 6,847 cases

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

9,179 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 8/24/2020. Of these, 614 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 7,881 have tested negative for COVID-19. 


CONFIRMED CASES AND DEATHS BY COUNTY

CURRENT AS OF August 26, 2020


Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.3% of deaths in California. These include 1,075 cases and 38 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



0.7% of confirmed cases have been admitted to a hospital


0.2% of confirmed cases have been admitted to an Intensive Care Unit

1.8% of cases have died


Case and death disparities:

- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.5 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- More males (57%) are dying from COVID-19 than females (43%).

American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) data reported by California to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)




CDC Data show that AIAN in California are testing positive for COVID-19 at rates equal to their proportion of California's population and dying at higher than expected rates. This includes a total of 2,140 cases and 69 deaths.

American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) COVID-19 cases reported by local public health departments in selected California counties








