DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 25.88 million with more than 859,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 6,047,692 as reported on Wednesday 9/2/2020 to 6,087,403 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 184,083 to 185,092.

California has a new blueprint for reducing COVID-19 in the state with revised criteria for loosening and tightening restrictions on activities. To find out how businesses and activities can open in your county, click here.

According to CNN and other credible news sources, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has modified their current testing guidelines for those suspected of having COVID-19. The new testing guidelines exclude individuals with no COVID-19 symptoms, even if you have been in close contact (within 6 feet) of a person with COVID-19 infection for at least 15 minutes. Many public health experts disagree with this change. Governor Newsom has chosen to continue adhering to the previous testing guidelines. 

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:
i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19.
State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.





CALIFORNIA

As of September 2, 2020, there were a total of 717,177 positive cases and 13,327 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

• Age 0-17: 72,822 cases

• Age 18-49: 430,475 cases

• Age 50-64: 135,797 cases

• Age 65 and older: 77,191 cases

• Unknown/Missing: 892 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

• Female: 362,183 cases

• Male: 348,495 cases

• Unknown: 6,499 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 11,663,924

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.






New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date

Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California










- 0.5% of confirmed cases have been admitted to a hospital

Case and death disparities:


- For all adults ages 18+, Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is more than 1.3 times their population representation across all adult age categories.
- More males (57%) are dying from COVID-19 than females (43%).






