

#### DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 31.42 million with more than 967,000 deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 6,825,697 as reported on Tuesday 9/22/2020 to 6,874,982 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 199,462 to 200,275.

Just days after publishing significant new guidance on airborne transmission of the coronavirus, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on Monday withdrew the advice, saying only that it had been "posted in error" on the agency's website. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and Department of Defense (DoD) released two documents on September 16, 2020, outlining the Administration's detailed strategy to deliver safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine doses to the American people. The documents, developed by HHS in coordination with DoD and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), provide a strategic distribution overview along with an interim playbook for state, Tribal, territorial, and local public health programs and their partners on how to plan and operationalize a vaccination response to COVID-19 within their respective jurisdictions. - Total deaths: 200,275
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

\*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.


A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

#### A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

#### CALIFORNIA

As of September 22, 2020, there were a total of 787,470 positive cases and 15,204 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 81,177 cases
- Age 18-49: 472,300 cases
- Age 50-64: 148,760 cases
- Age 65 and older: 84,312 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 921 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 13,879,423

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 397,436 cases
- Male: 383,438 cases
- Unknown: 6,596 cases

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.



11,738 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 9/21/2020.


Of these, 713 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 10,322 have tested negative for COVID-19.

#### CONFIRMED CASES AND DEATHS BY COUNTY




#### Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.3% of deaths in California. This includes a total of 1,409 cases and 46 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.









# American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) data reported by California to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)






