DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 36 million with more than 1.04 million deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 7,475,262 as reported on Wednesday 10/7/2020 to 7,528,313 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 210,232 to 211,132.

According to CNBC and other credible news sources, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) revised its coronavirus guidance Monday, acknowledging that it can sometimes spread through airborne particles that can “linger in the air for minutes to hours” and among people who are more than 6 feet apart. Older adults and adults with chronic conditions, including many people dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid, face increased risk of adverse outcomes related to the flu, including hospitalization and death. Dually eligible individuals are also at greater risk for severe outcomes due to COVID-19. Flu vaccination uptake may reduce health care system burden during the COVID-19 pandemic. In this panel discussion, health plans will share promising practices for promoting flu vaccinations, including establishing flu vaccine committees, developing effective communication and outreach strategies with the input of member advisory councils, and partnering with community organizations in vaccination delivery. COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*

- Total cases: 7,528,313
- Total deaths: 211,132
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

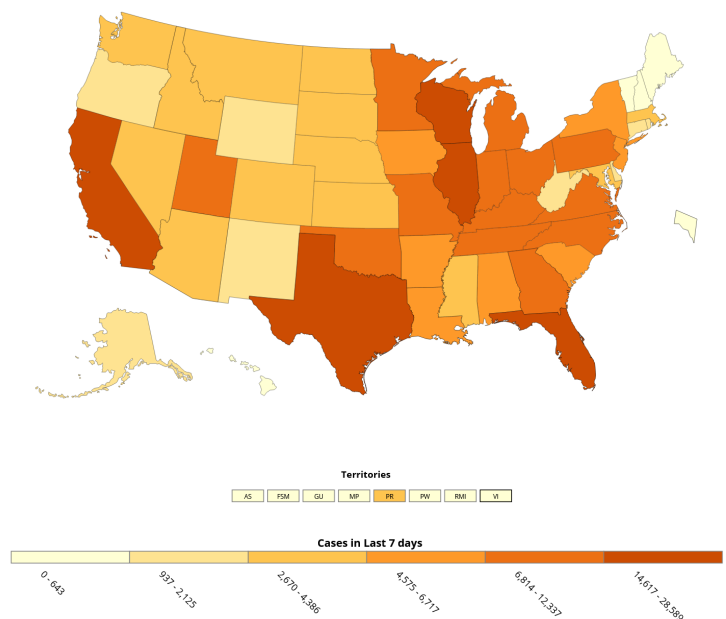
- i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19.

State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

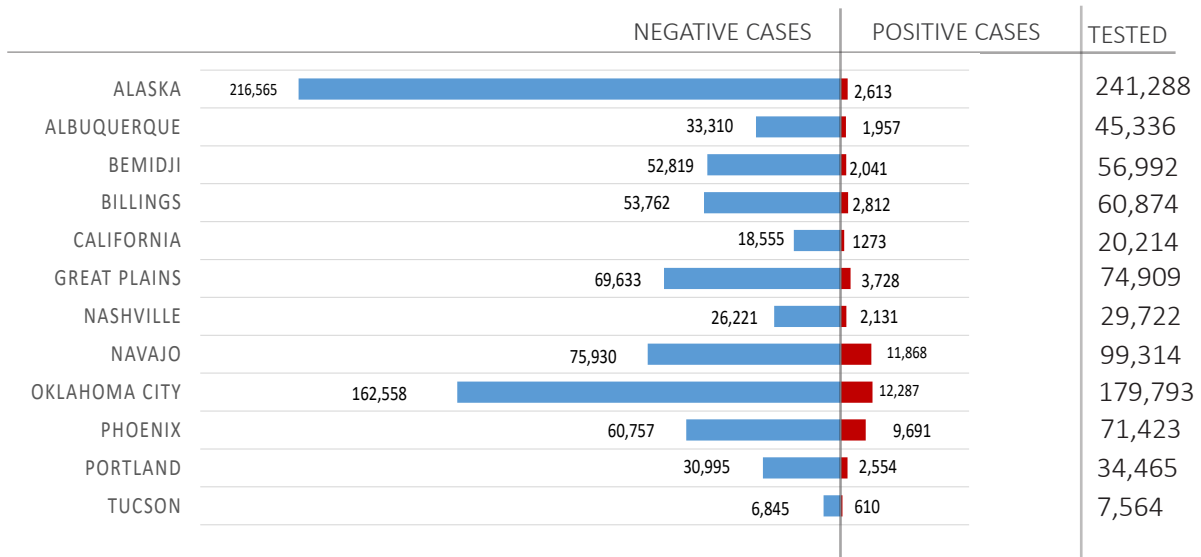

CALIFORNIA

As of October 7, 2020, there were a total of 834,800 positive cases and 16,361 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 87,201 cases
- Age 18-49: 500,052 cases
- Age 50-64: 157,546 cases
- Age 65 and older: 89,114 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 887 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 421,112 cases
- Male: 406,928 cases
- Unknown: 6,760 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 15,623,623

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

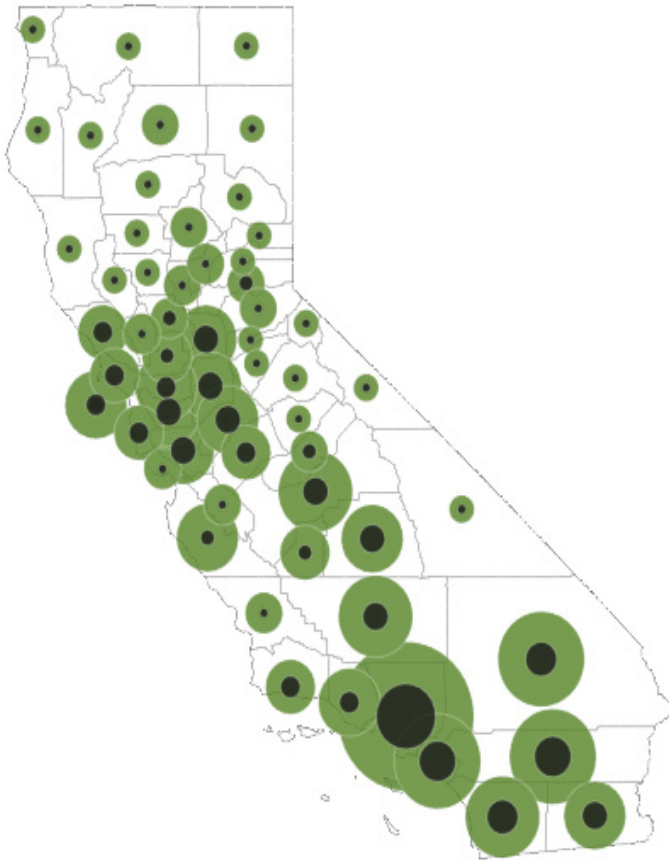

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

20,214 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 10/6/2020.

Of these, 1,290 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 18,555 have tested negative for COVID-19.

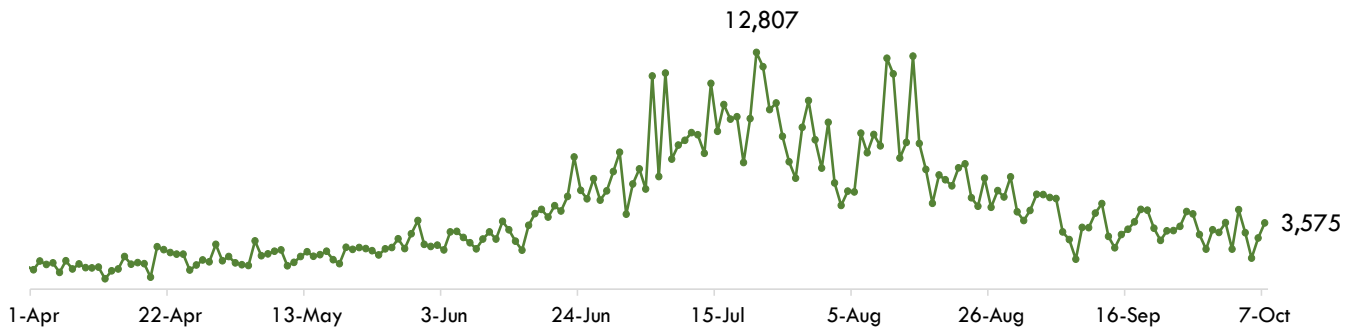

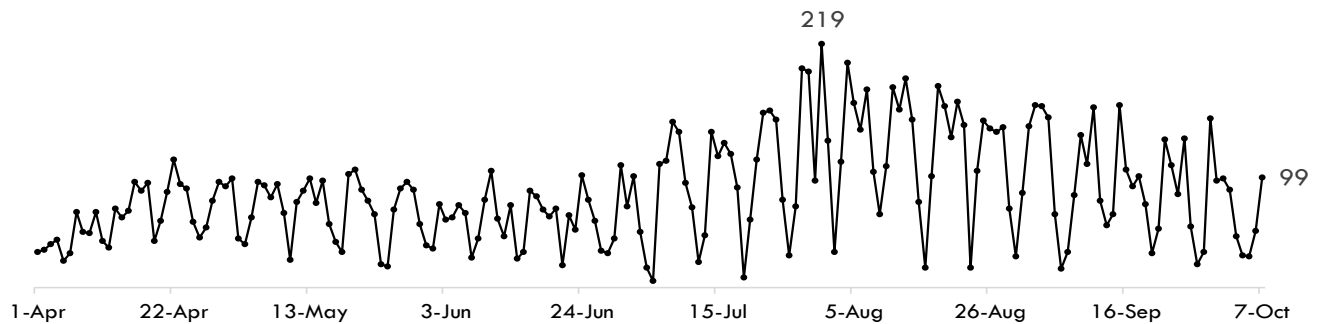

New Confirmed Cases in California by Date



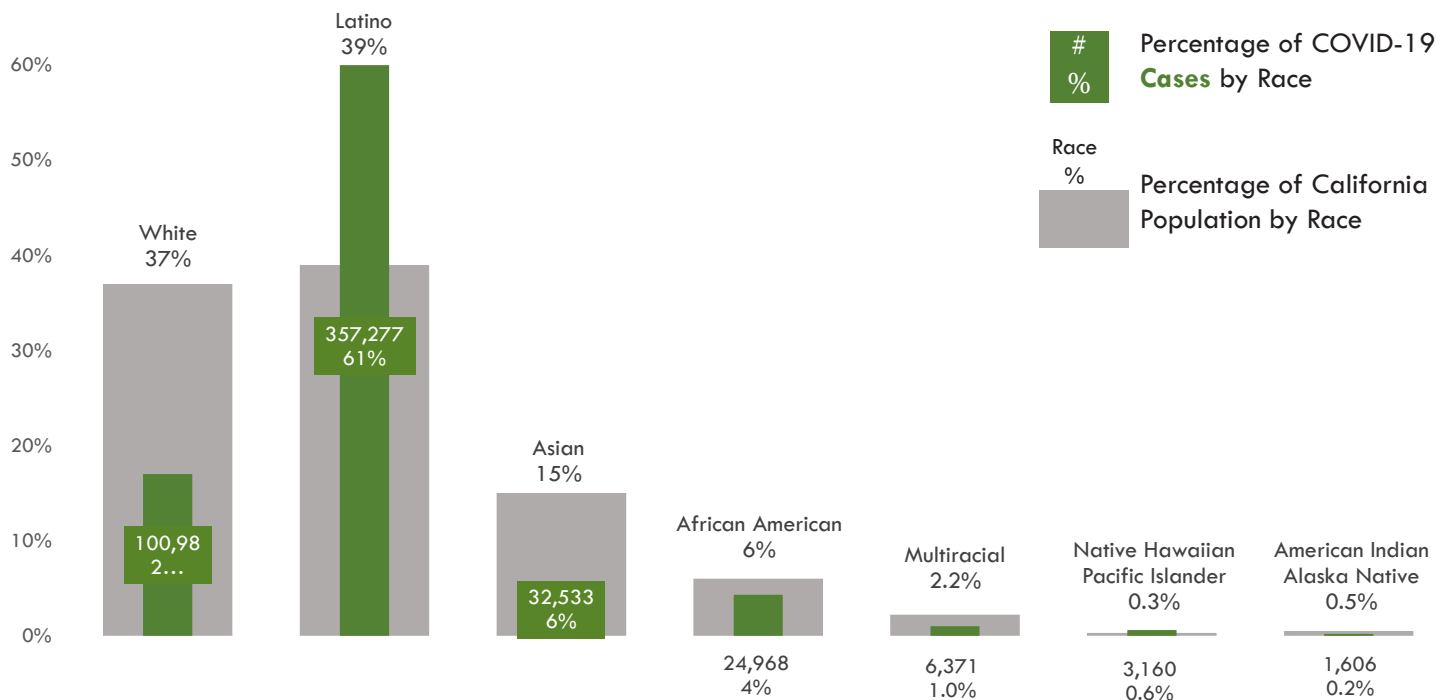
New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date



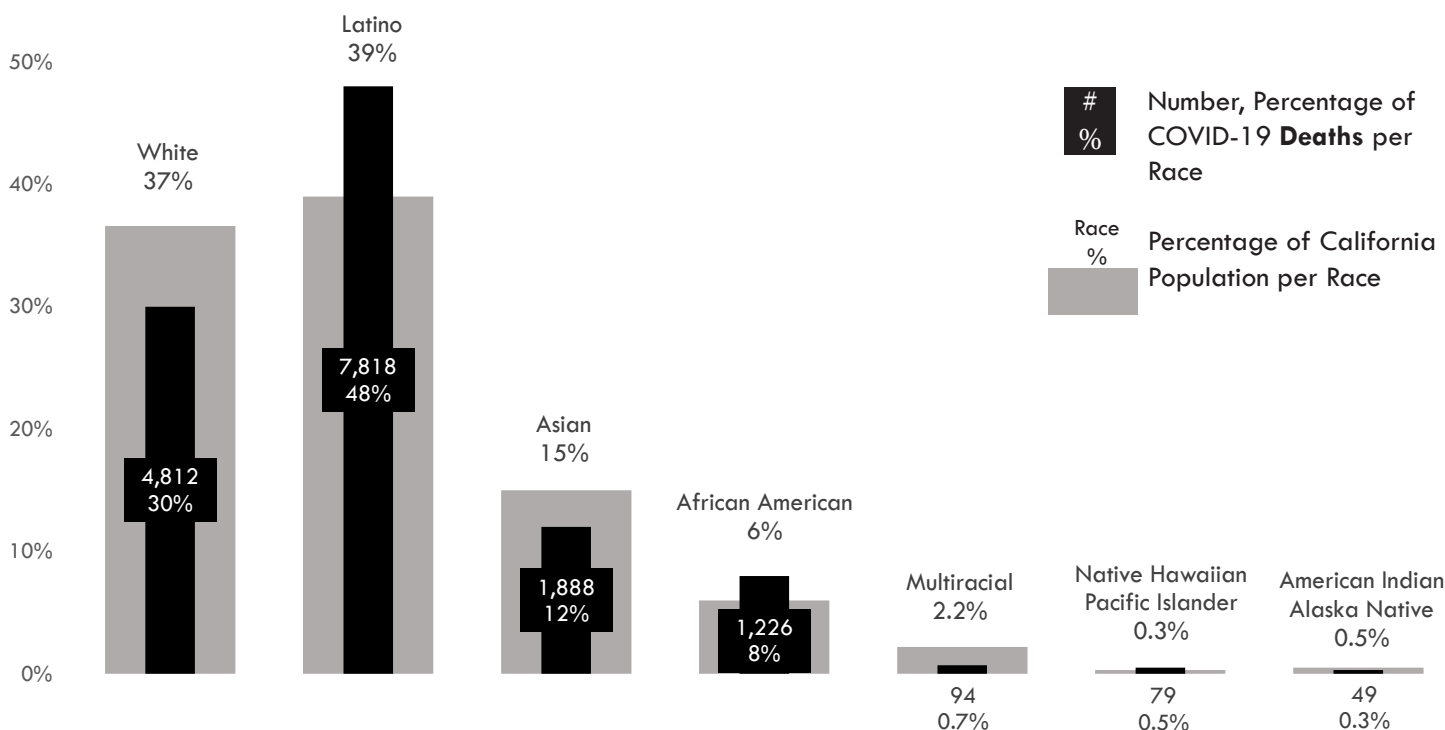

Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.2% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.3% of deaths** in California. This includes a total of **1,606 cases** and **49 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



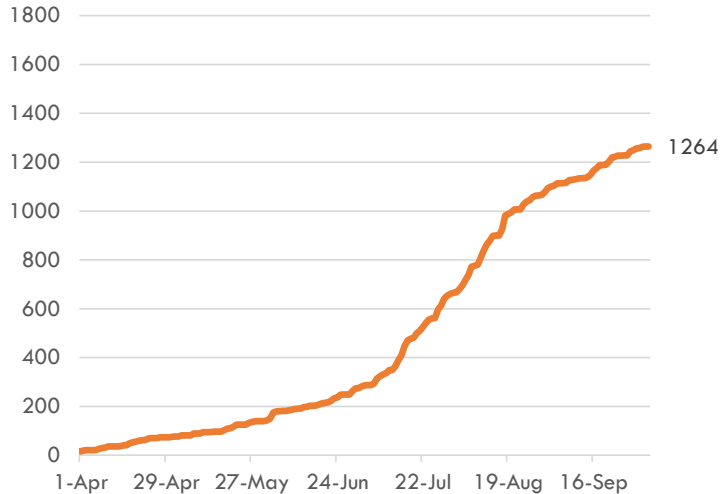
Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates in California. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is 1.3 times their population representation across all adult age categories.

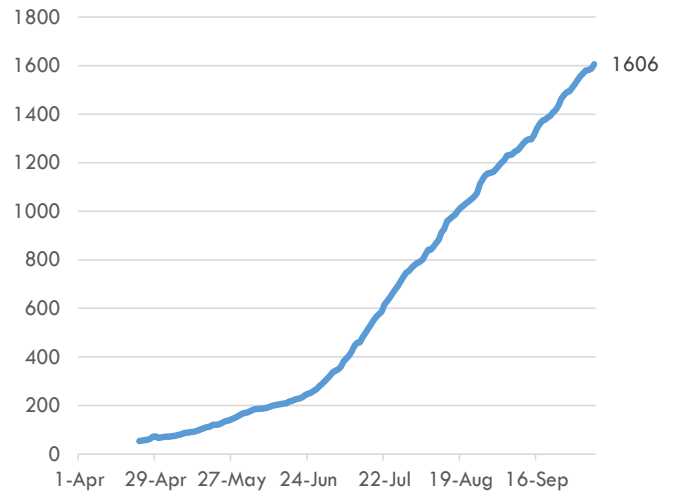

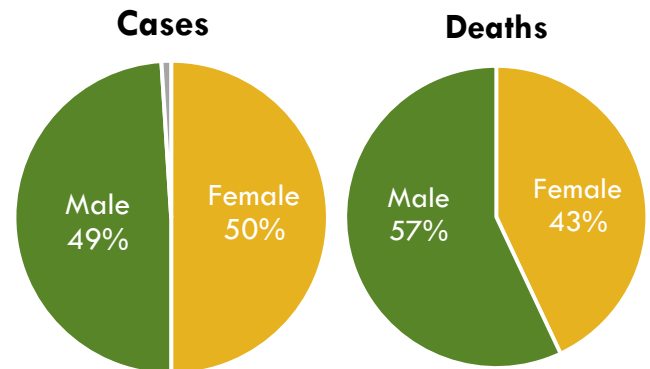
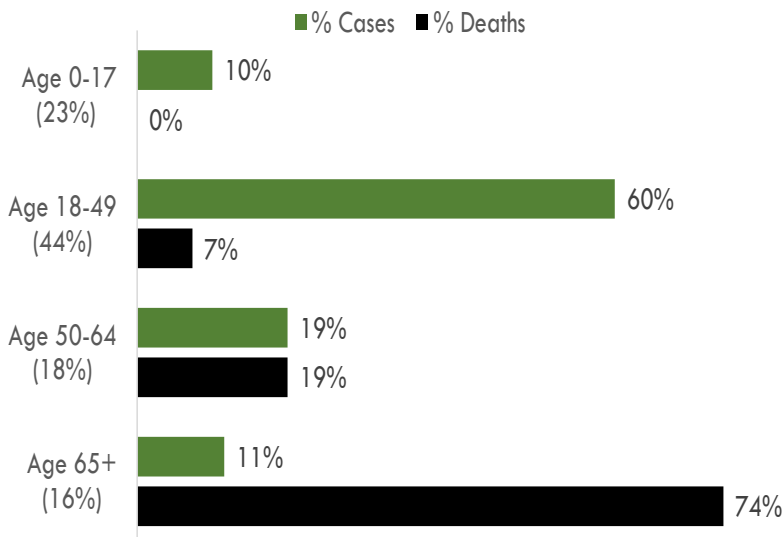

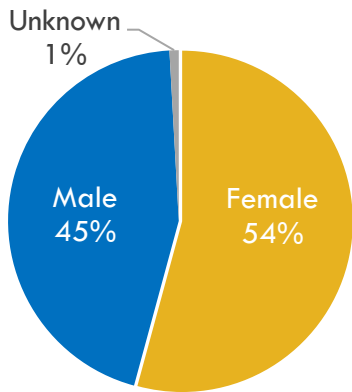
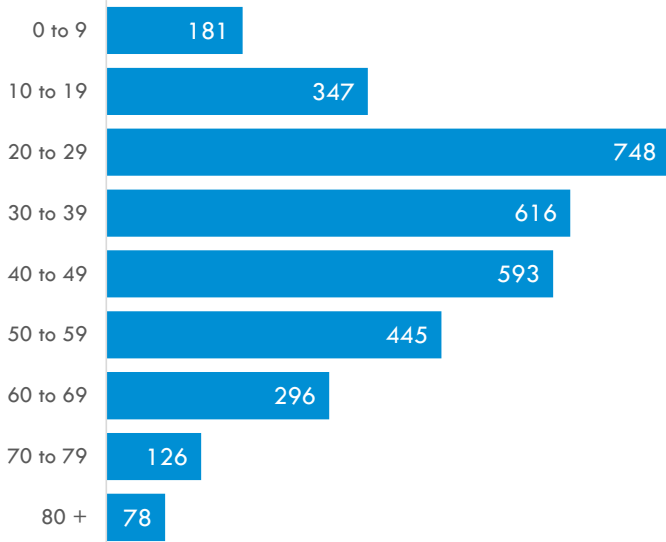

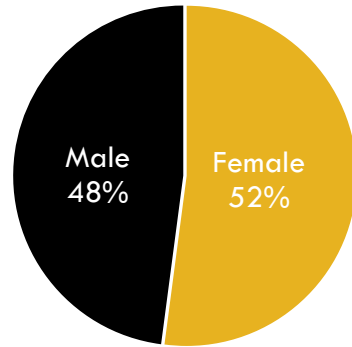
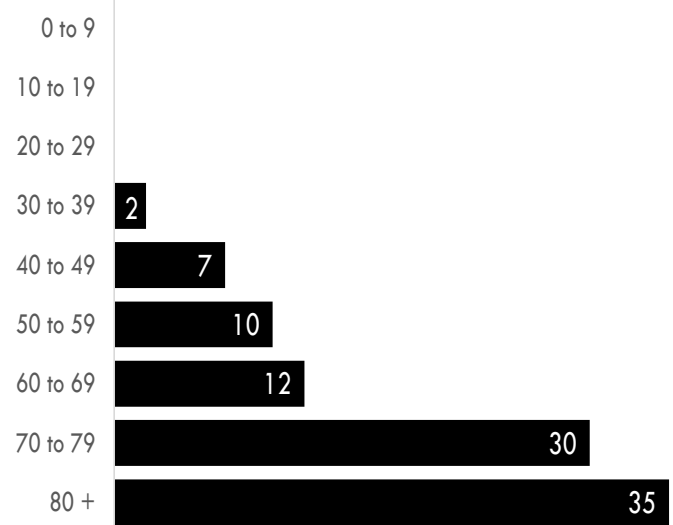

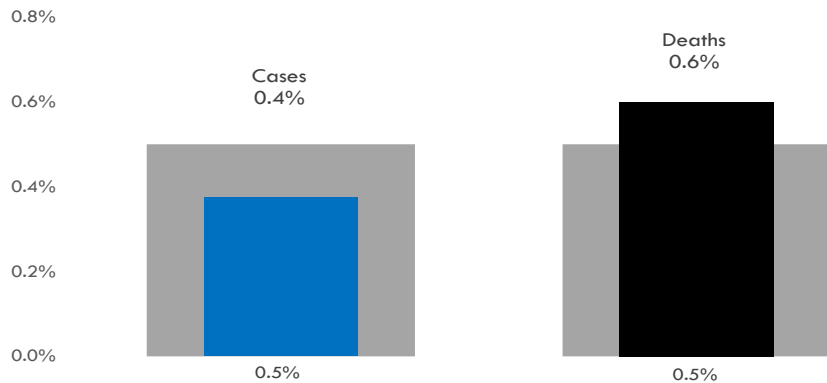
Positive COVID-19 cases among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender

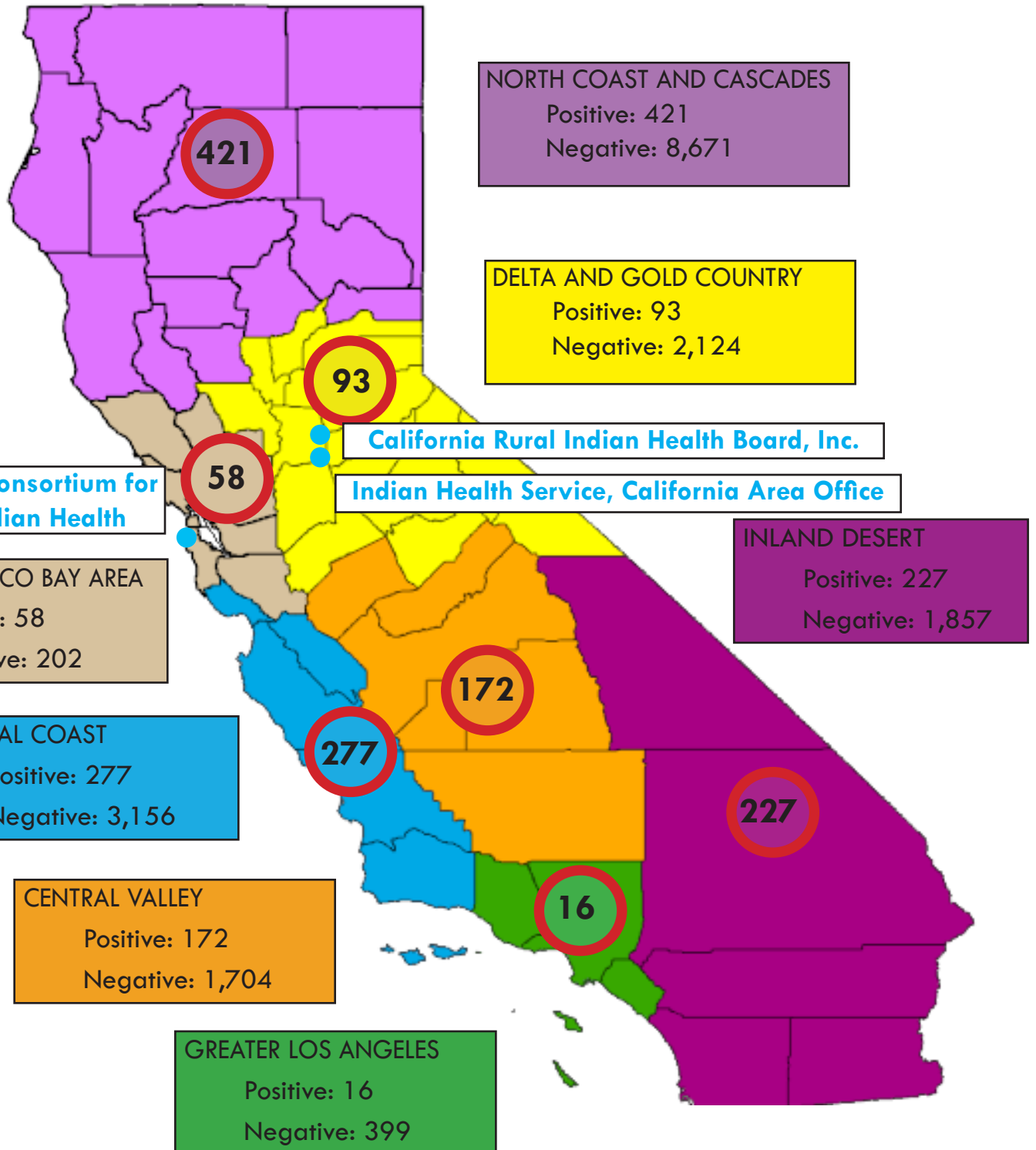

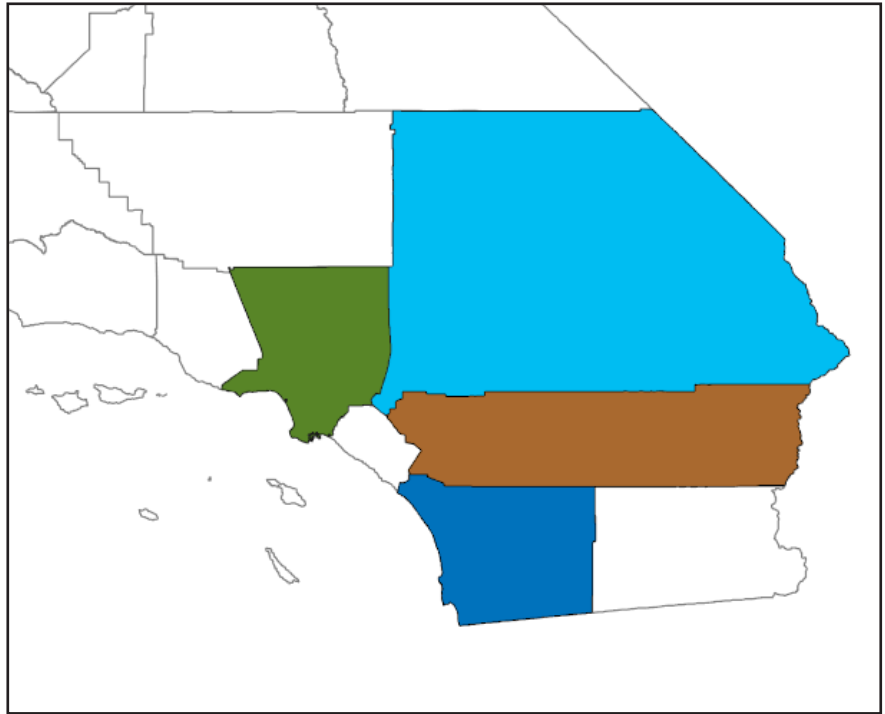
