

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 38 million with more than 1.08 million deaths.

The total number of cases in the U.S. increased from 7,787,548 as reported on Tuesday 10/13/2020 to 7,835,007 reported today. The number of deaths in the U.S. increased from 214,446 to 215,194.

The National Institutes of Health, working in collaboration with the Biomedical Advanced Research and Development Authority (BARDA), announced on October 6, 2020, a third round of contract awards for scale-up and manufacturing of new COVID-19 testing technologies. The six new Rapid Acceleration of Diagnostics (RADx) initiative contracts total \$98.35 million for point-of-care and other novel test approaches that provide new modes of sample collection, processing and return of results. Innovations in these new technologies include integration with smart devices, mobile-lab processing that can be deployed to COVID-19 hot spots, and test results available within minutes. According to CNBC and other credible news sources, a 25-year-old man in the U.S. state of Nevada has contracted the coronavirus on two separate occasions, a study in the Lancet Infectious Diseases journal showed, with the patient becoming seriously ill following the second infection. *As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020. The position statement included a case definition and made COVID-19 a nationally notifiable disease.


A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.



As of October 13, 2020, there were a total of 855,072 positive cases and 16,639 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 65 and older: 91,051 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 895 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 16,425,487

- Male: 416,579 cases
- Unknown: 6,906 cases


Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA


21,180 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 10/12/2020. Of these, 1,349 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 19,473 have tested negative for COVID-19.

CONFIRMED CASES AND DEATHS BY COUNTY




Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.2% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.3% of deaths in California. This includes a total of 1,676 cases and 51 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.




Latinos and African Americans are dying at disproportionately high rates in California. The proportion of COVID-19 deaths in Latinos is 1.3 times their population representation across all adult age categories.







American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) data reported by California to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)





Note: This map shows patients by the regional location of the clinic where they were tested and NOT by the residence of the patients.








