## DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 72.8 million with more than 1.6 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 16,519,668 and deaths at 302,992.

California Health Officials announced a Regional Stay at Home Order triggered by ICU capacity. The public health order took effect at 12:59 p.m. on December 5. Under the new order, if a region falls below the 15 percent ICU threshold it will have 23 hours to implement the Stay at Home Order. The Indian Health Service is expecting to receive an initial allocation of 68,425 doses of COVID-19 vaccines. IHS supports CDC and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices recommendations for vaccine release, including prioritization of healthcare workers and residents of long-term care facilities. California activates ‘mass fatality’ program as the state sets new virus records. According to the California Office of Emergency Services, a mass fatality is an incident where more deaths take place in a period of time than can be handled by local coroner or medical emergency personnel. ## UNITED STATES

### COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance\*

- Total cases: 16,519,668
- Total deaths: 302,992
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

\*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

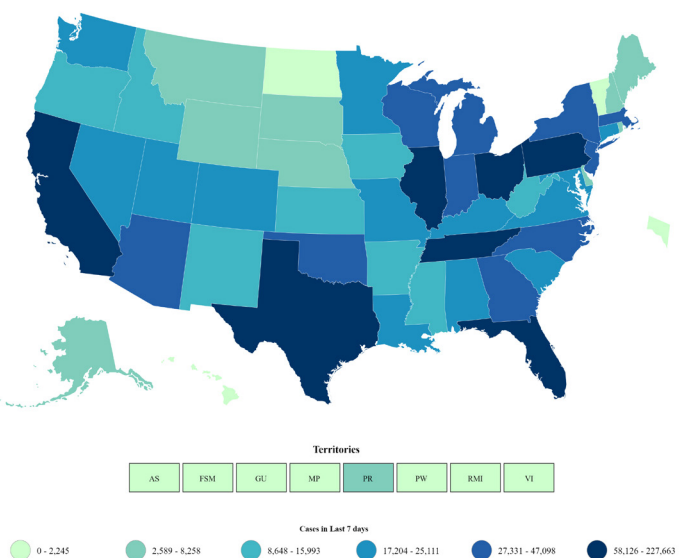
A probable case or death is defined by:

- i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19.

State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

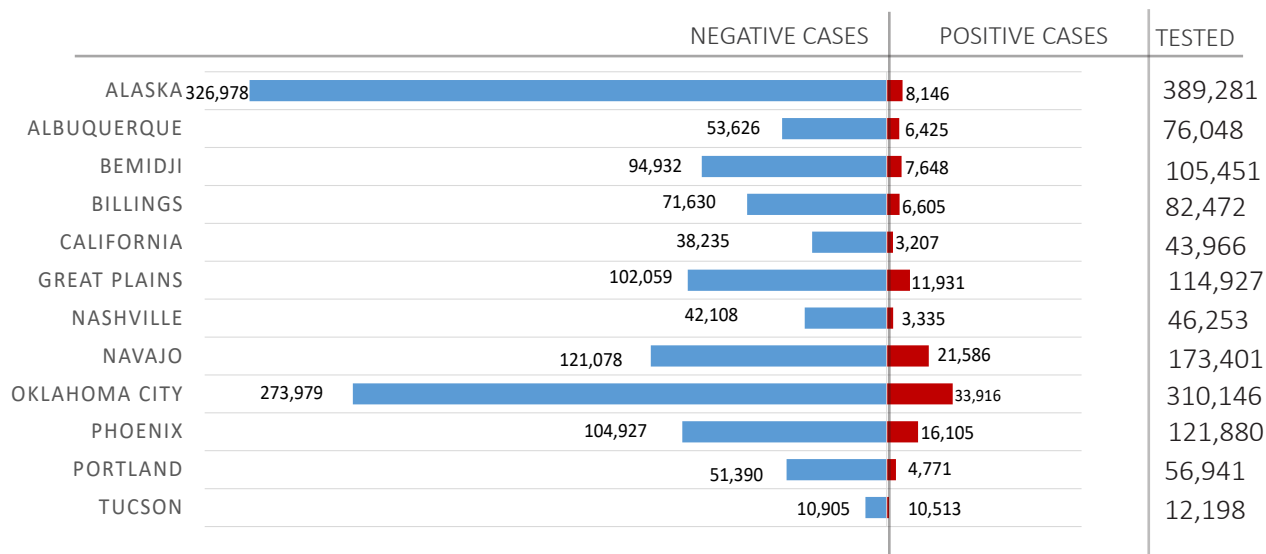

## CALIFORNIA

As of December 16, 2020, there were a total of 1,723,362 positive cases and 21,860 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 202,824 cases
- Age 18-49: 1,020,056 cases
- Age 50-64: 323,215 cases
- Age 65 and older: 176,030 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 845 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 871,835 cases
- Male: 831,105 cases
- Unknown: 6,941 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 28,456,358

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

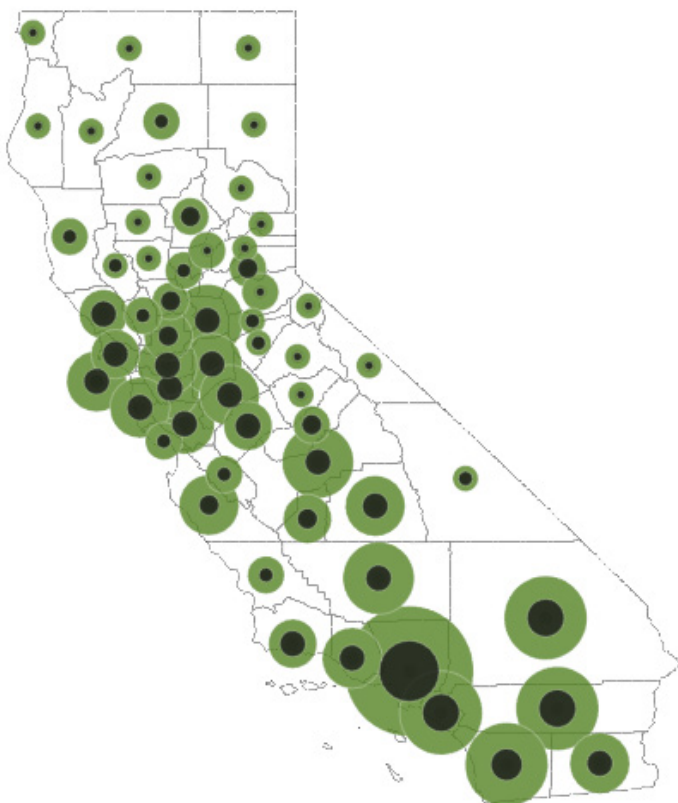

## INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

44,838 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 12/16/2020.

Of these, 3,349 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 39,234 have tested negative for COVID-19.

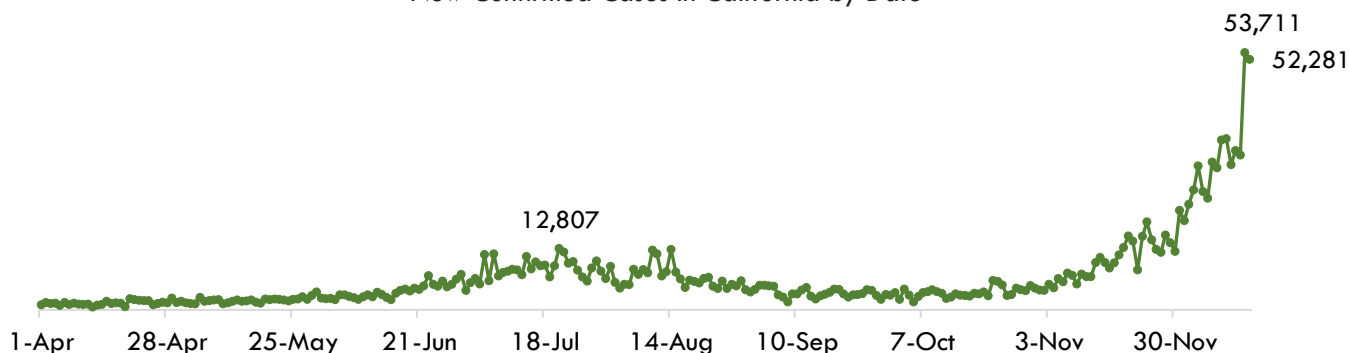

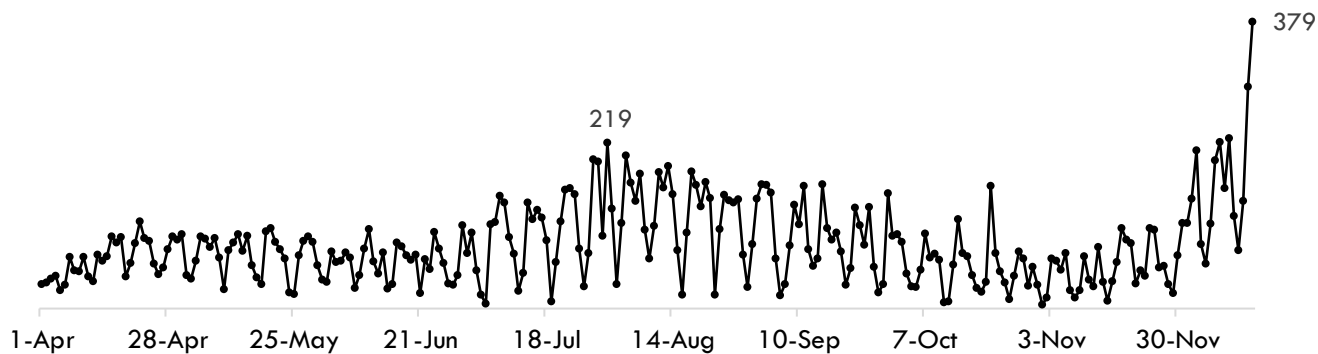

### New Confirmed Cases in California by Date



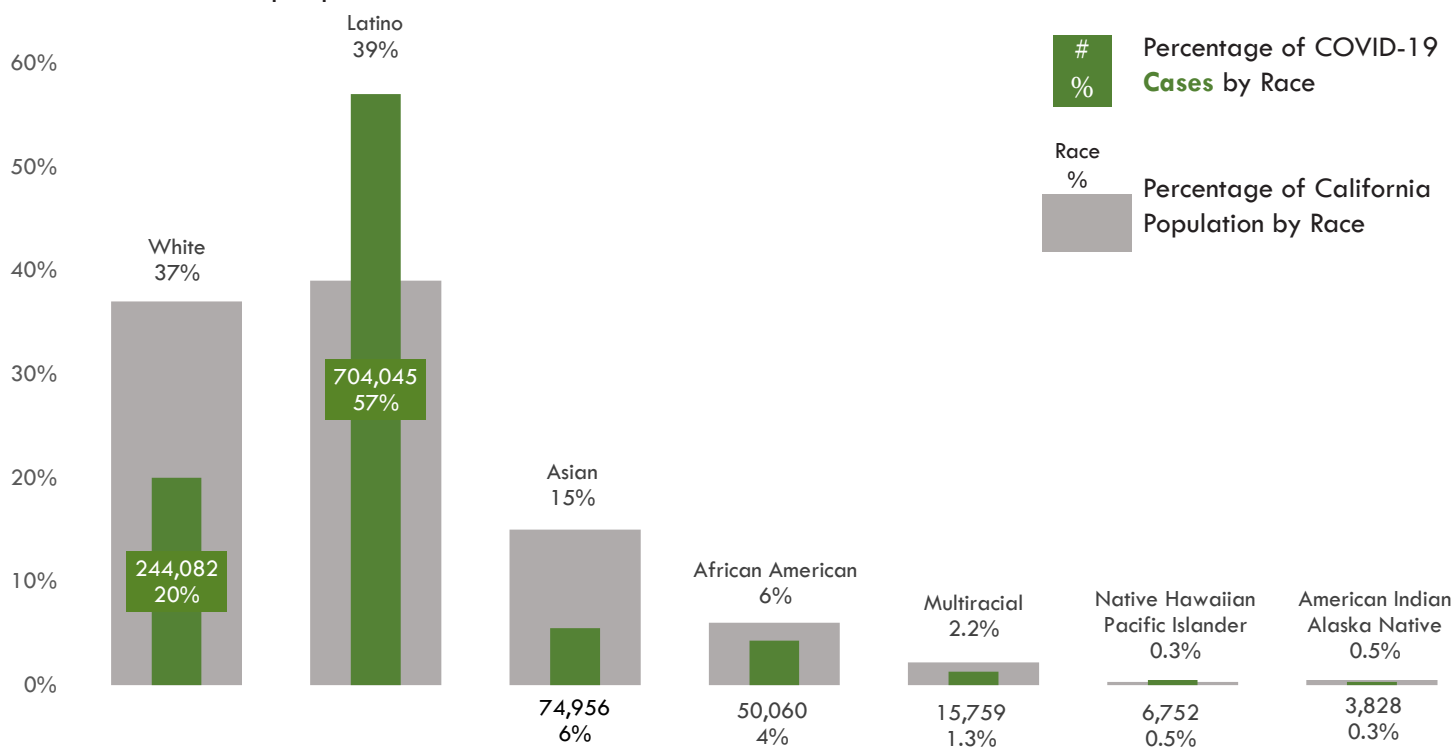
### New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date



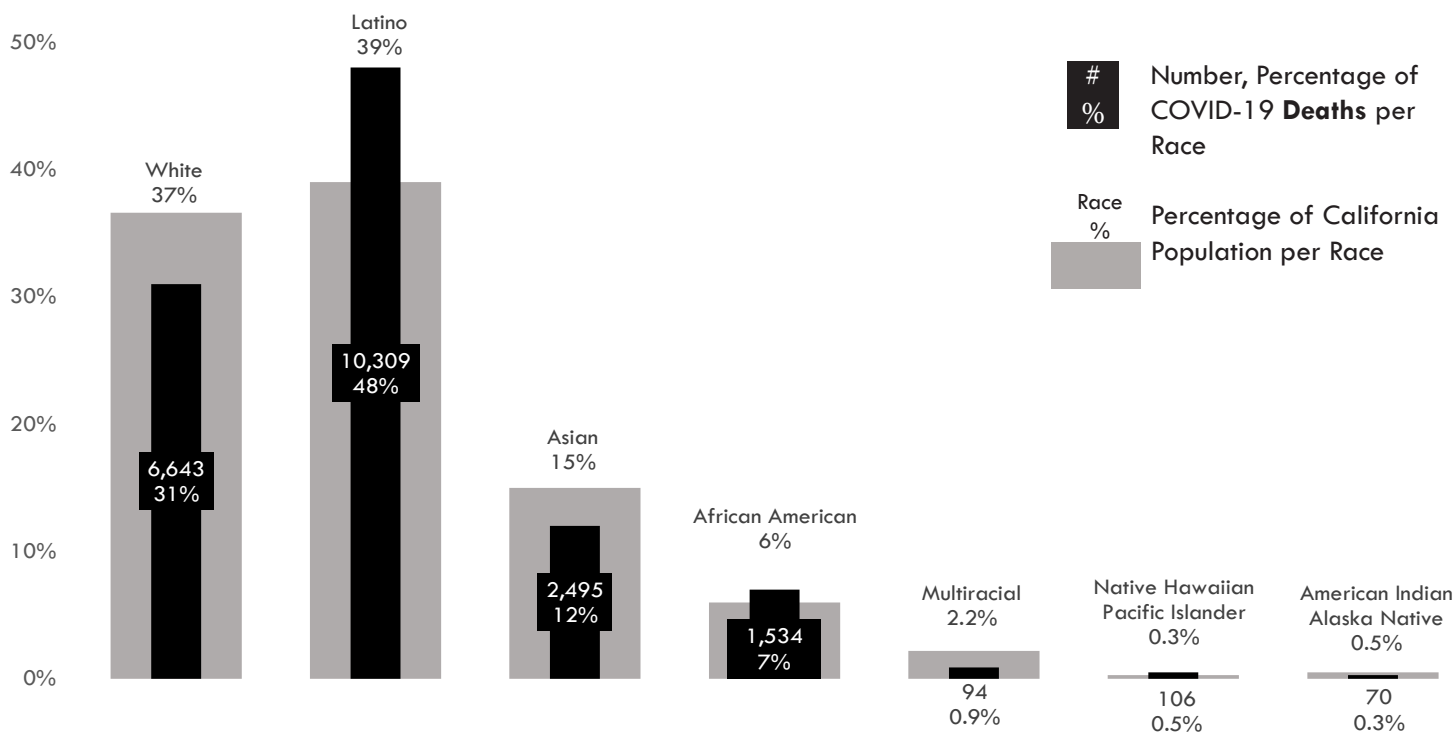

## Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.3% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.3% of deaths** in California. This includes a total of **3,828 cases** and **70 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



California Department of Public Health has nearly complete data on race and ethnicity for COVID-19 deaths, and are reporting the following trends: Latinos, African Americans and Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are dying at disproportionately higher levels.

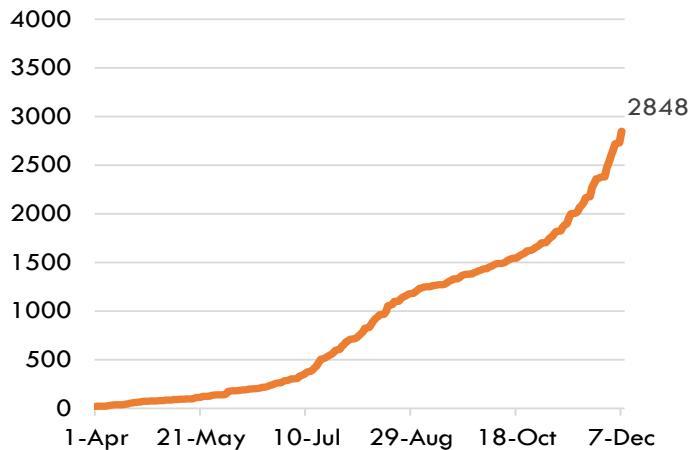

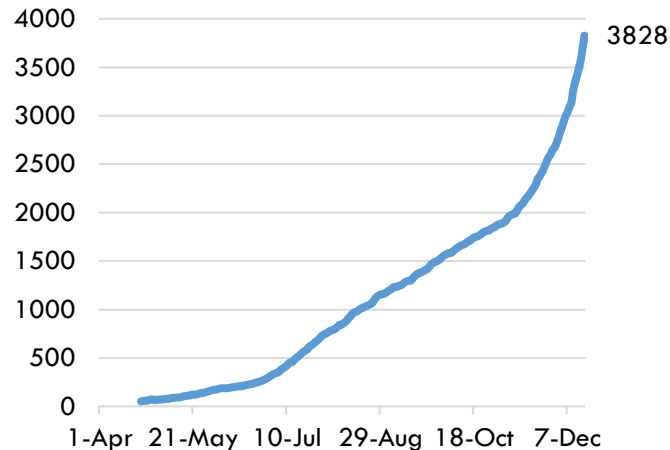
## Two sources for tracking American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) cases reported in California

Data from **California Department of Public Health (CDPH)** include all positive cases of AIAN diagnosed in California.

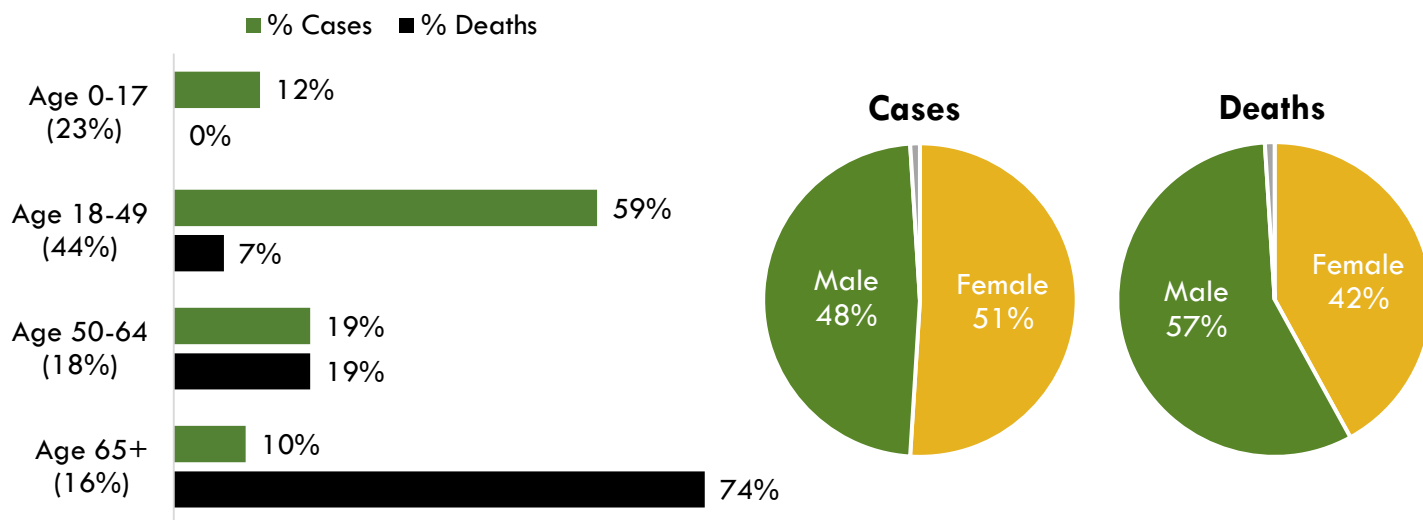

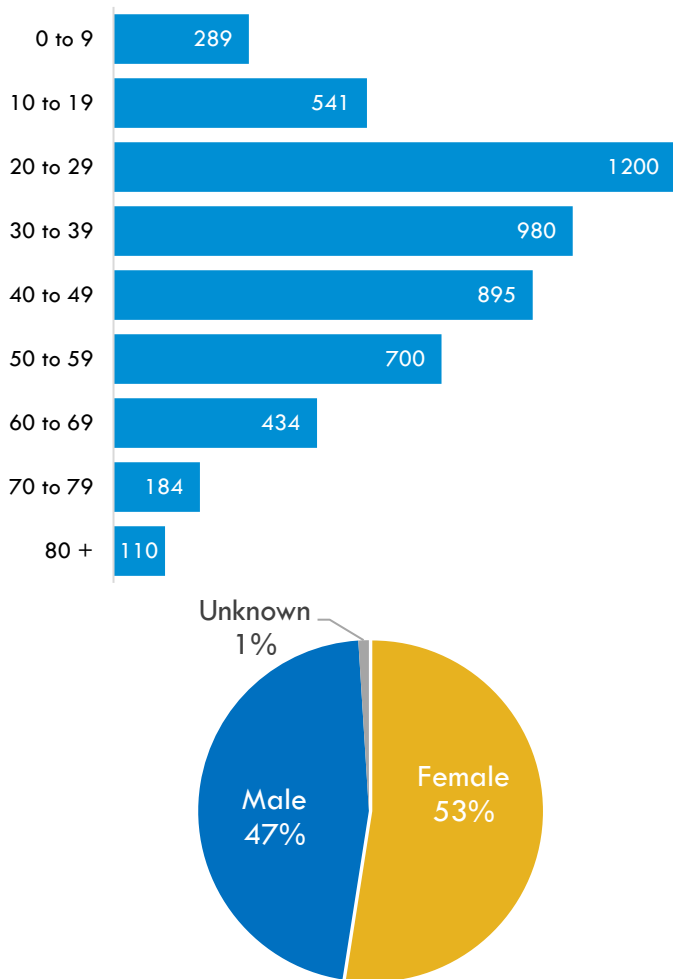

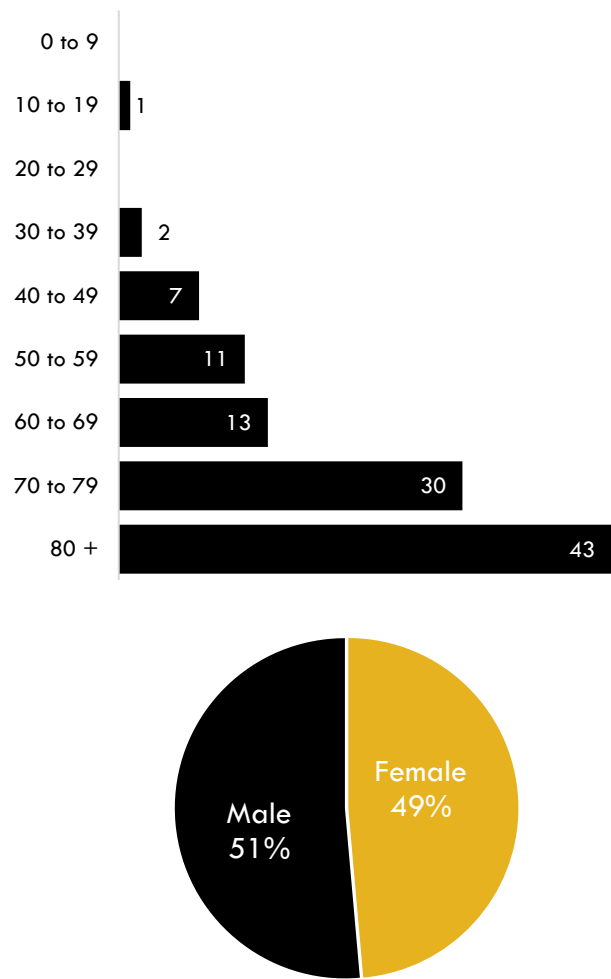

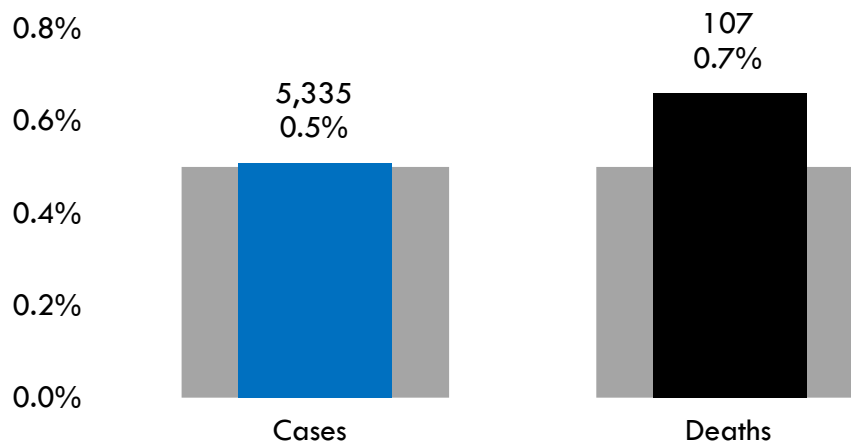
Positive COVID-19 cases among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender

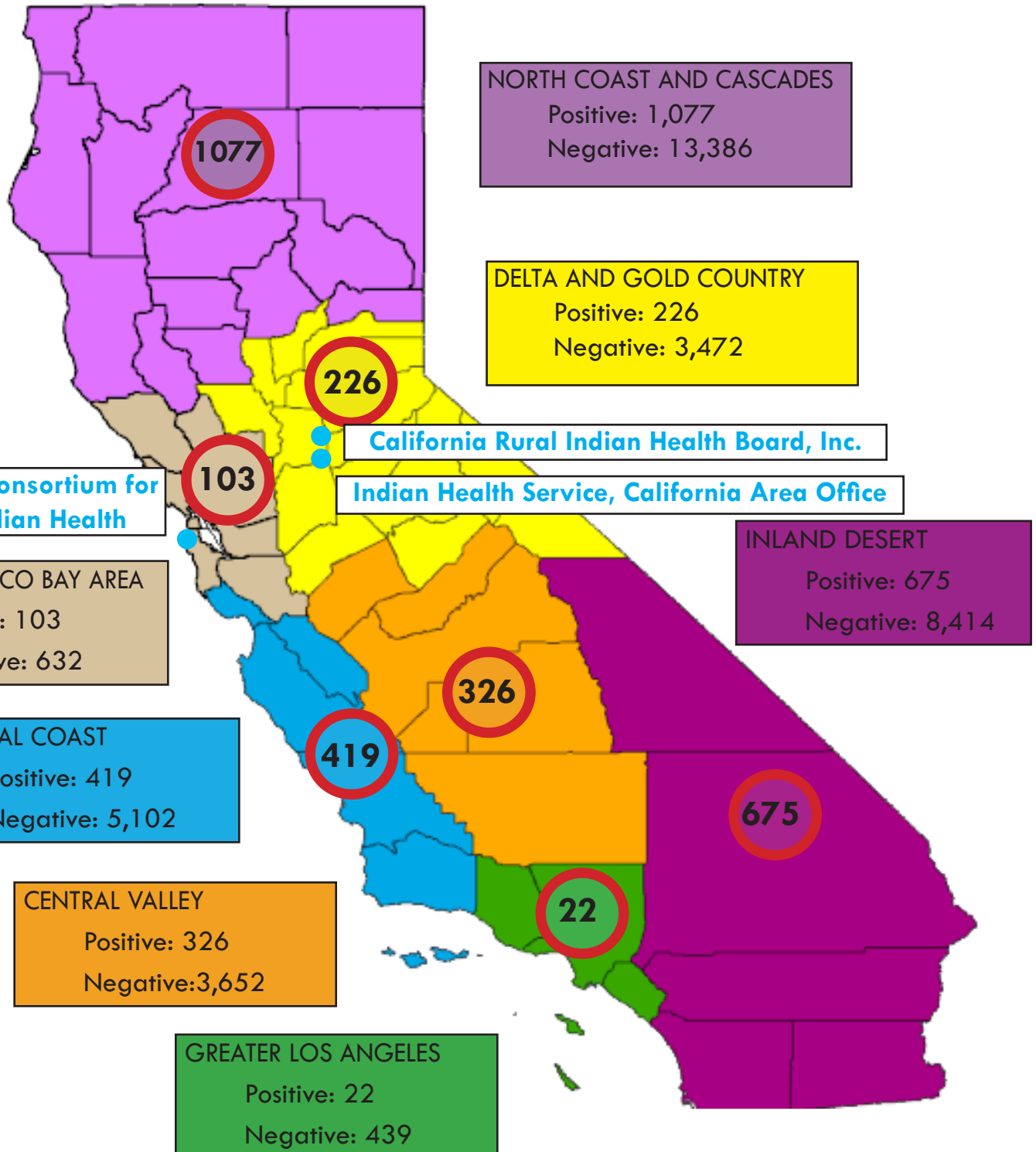

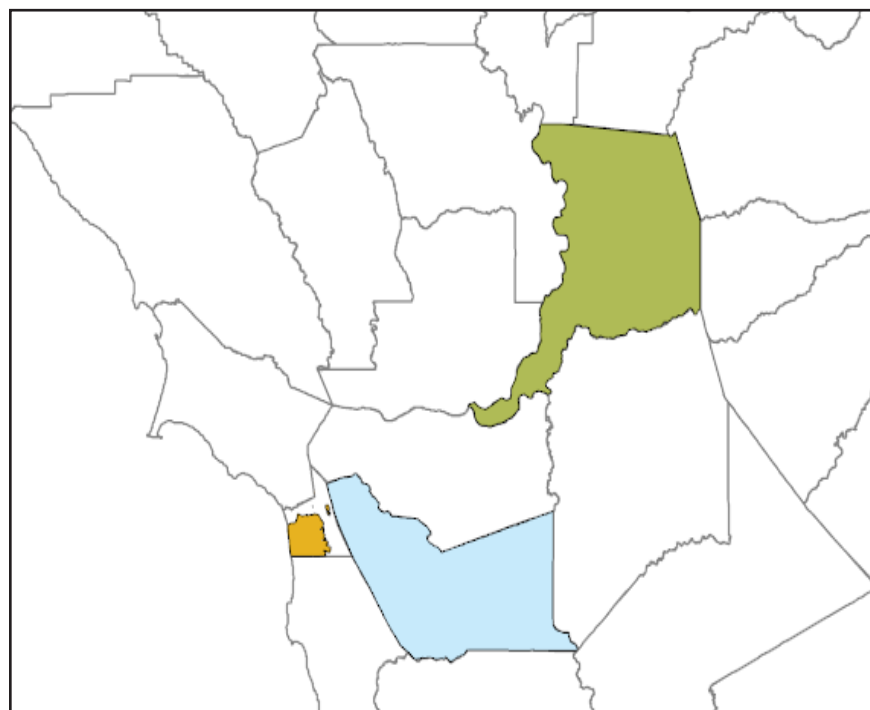
