

## DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 79.9 million with more than 1.7 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 19,232,843 and deaths at 334,029.

At-home testing and collection allow you to collect a specimen at home and either send it to a testing facility or perform the test at home. You and your healthcare provider might consider either an at-home collection kit or an at-home test if you have signs and symptoms of COVID-19 or if you can't get tested at a local healthcare facility. California Health Officials announced a Regional Stay at Home Order triggered by ICU capacity. The public health order took effect at 12:59 p.m. on December 5. Under the new order, if a region falls below the 15 percent ICU threshold it will have 23 hours to implement the Stay at Home Order. 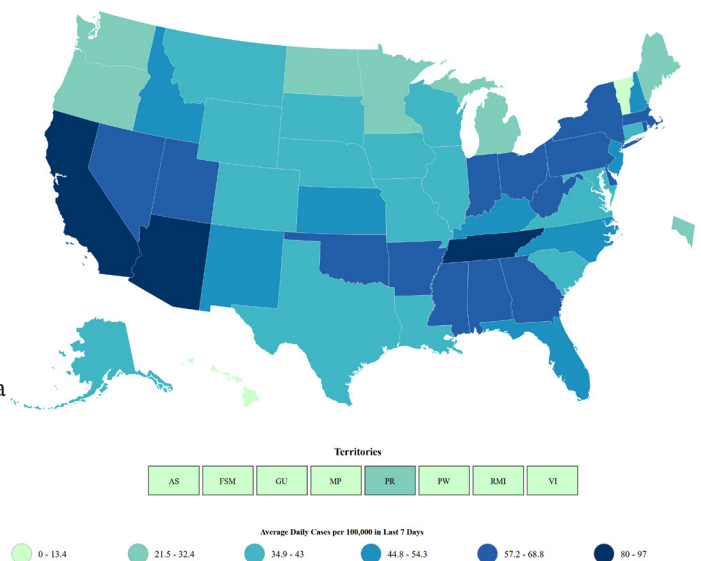
\*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

- meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or
- meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or
- meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19.

State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

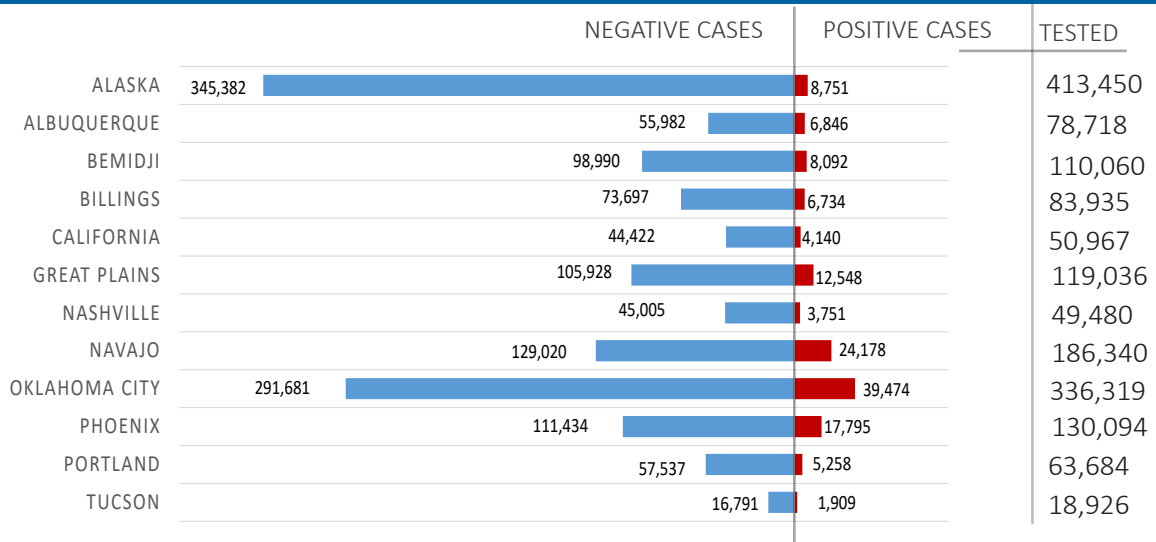

## CALIFORNIA

As of December 27, 2020, there were a total of 2,187,221 positive cases and 24,526 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 264,242
- Age 18-49: 1,280,947
- Age 50-64: 414,336
- Age 65 and older: 226,184
- Unknown/Missing: 1,512

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 1,105,129
- Male: 1,050,241
- Unknown: 31,851

Lab tests reported statewide: 32,374,471

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

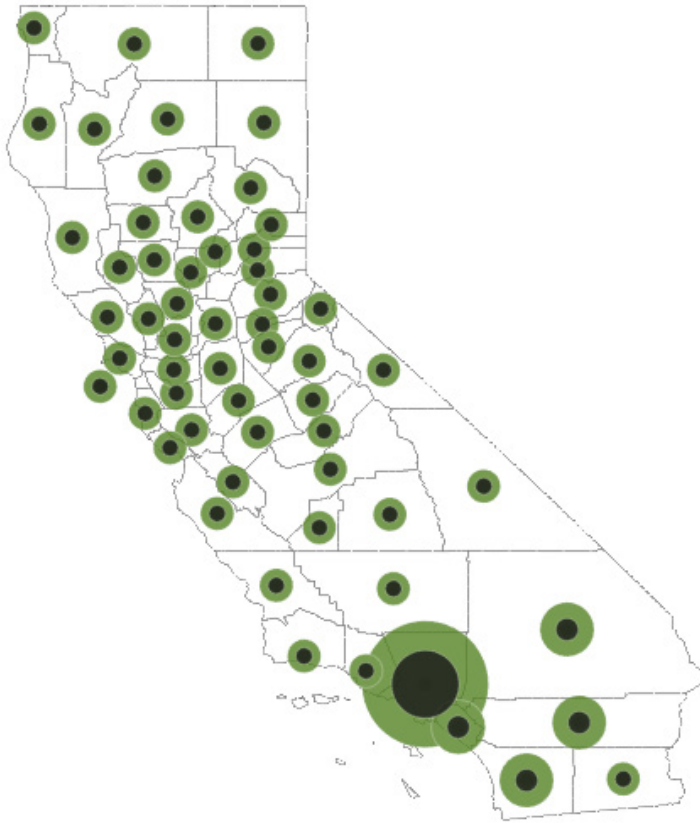

## INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

50,967 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 12/27/2020.

Of these, 4,140 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 44,422 have tested negative for COVID-19.

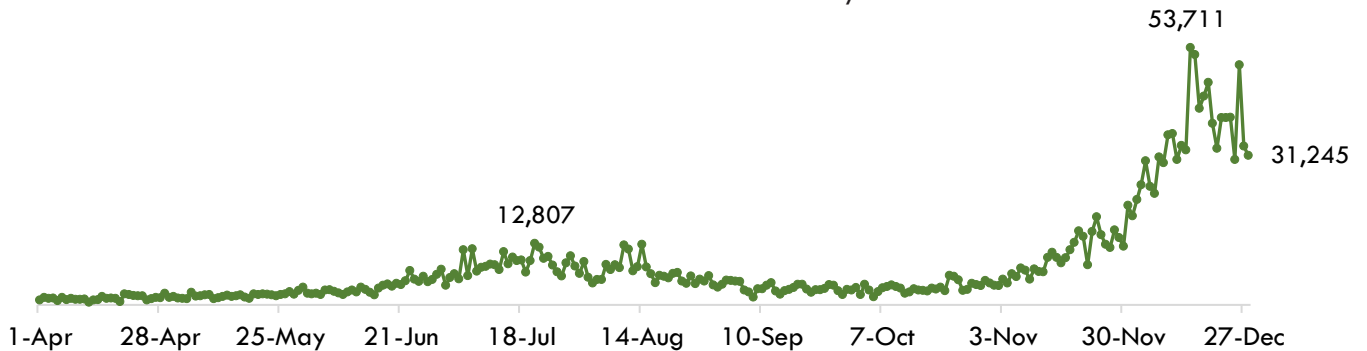

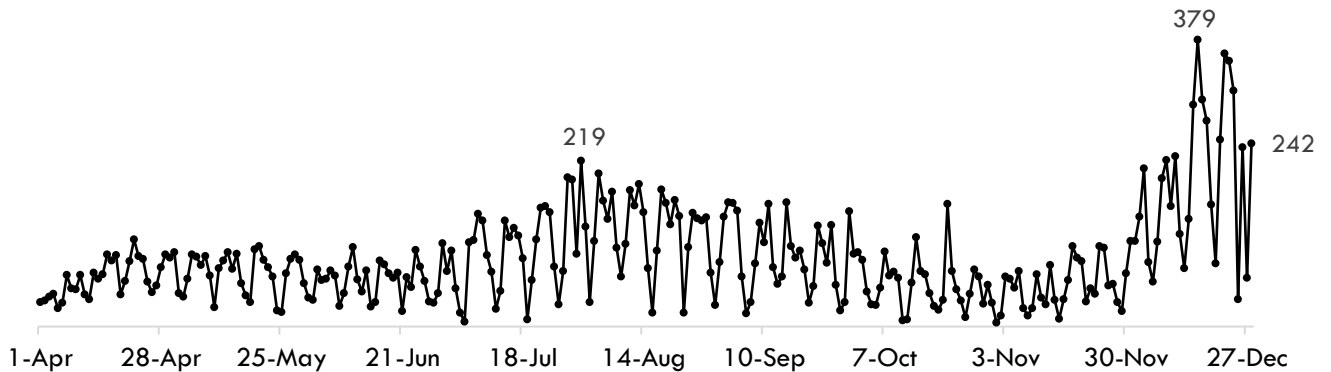

New Confirmed Cases in California by Date



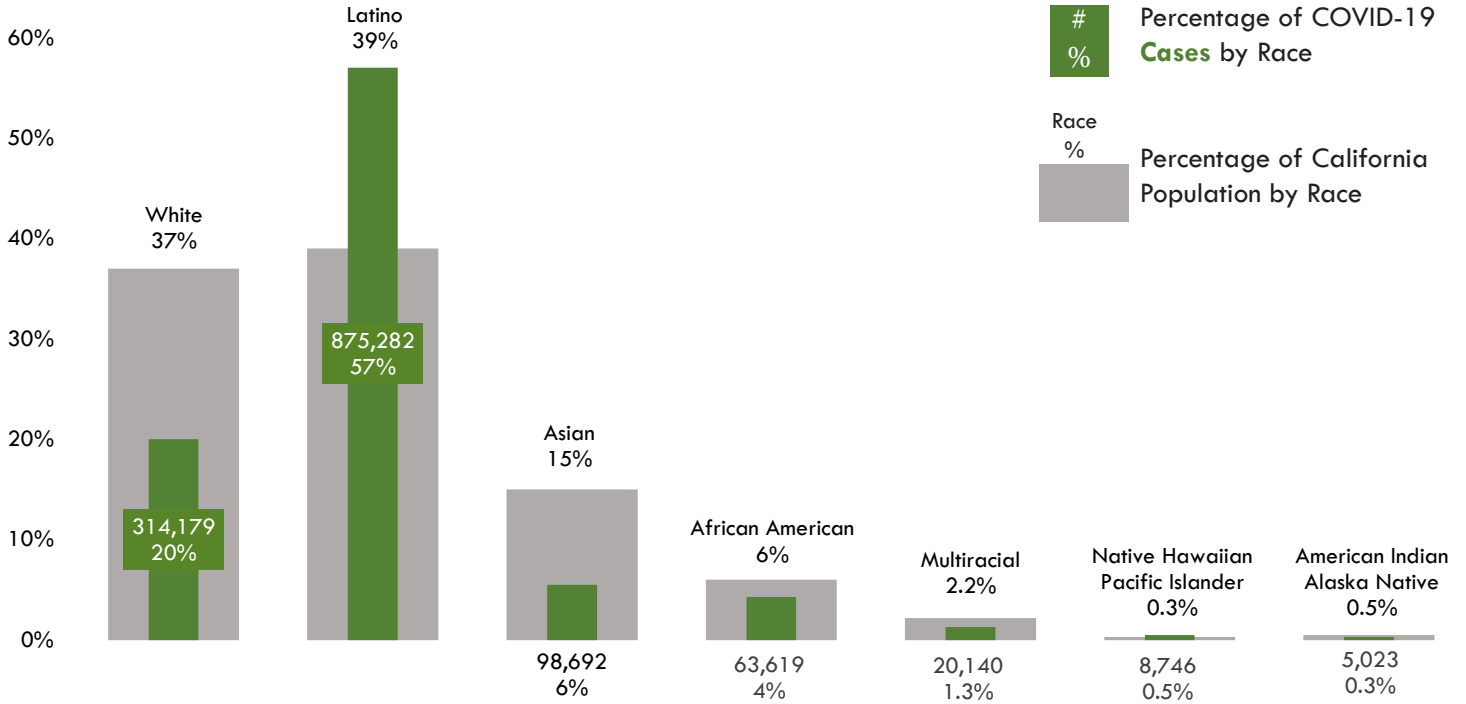
New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date



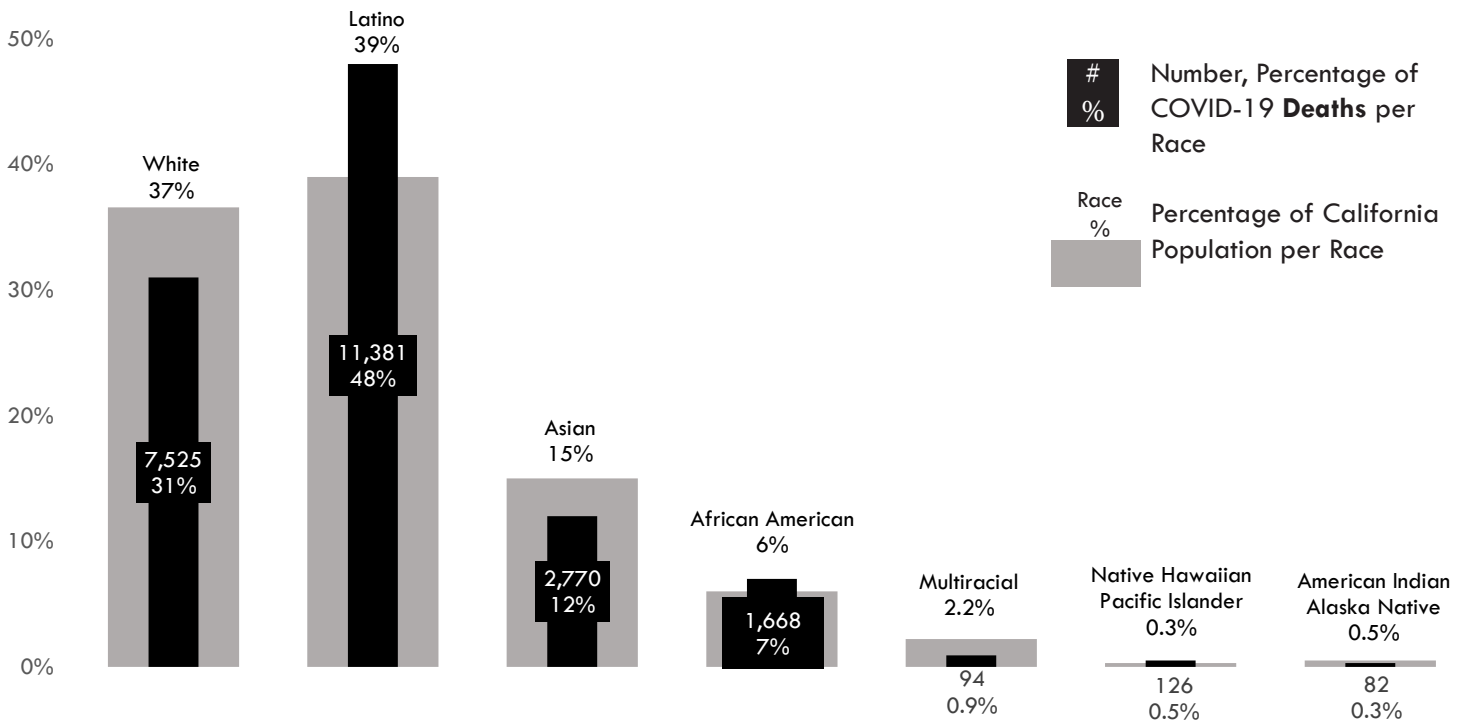

# Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.3% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.3% of deaths** in California. This includes a total of **5,023 cases** and **82 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



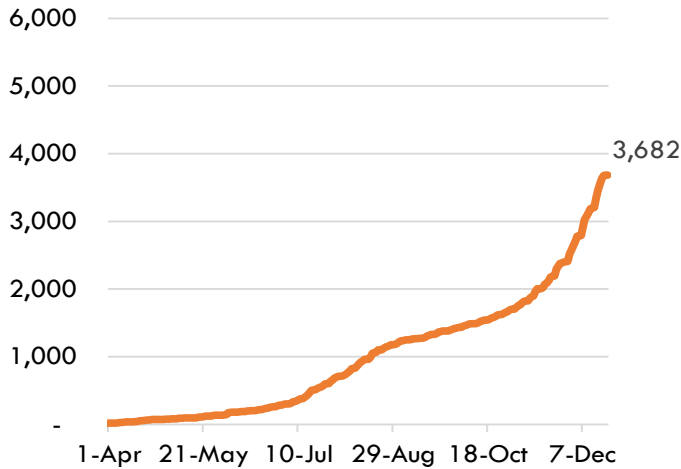
California Department of Public Health has nearly complete data on race and ethnicity for COVID-19 deaths, and are reporting the following trends: Latinos, African Americans and Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are dying at disproportionately higher levels.

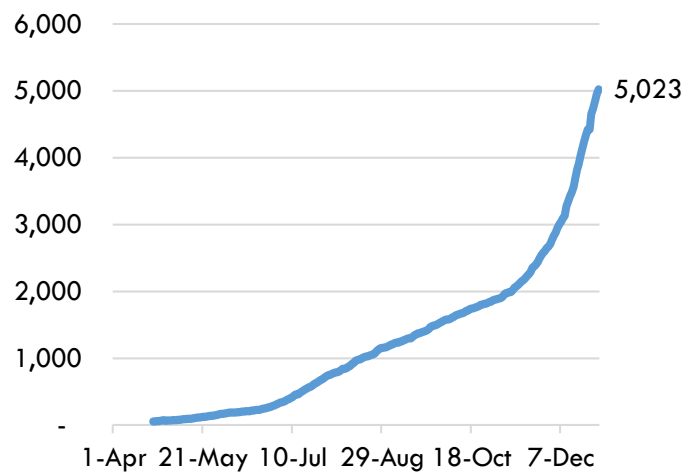

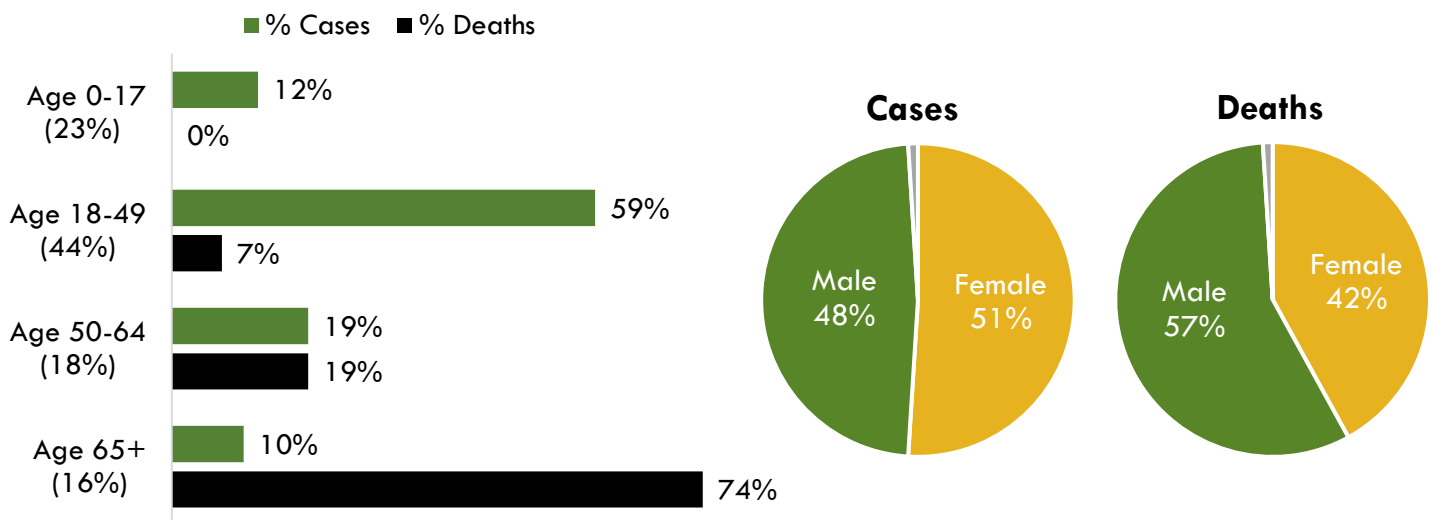

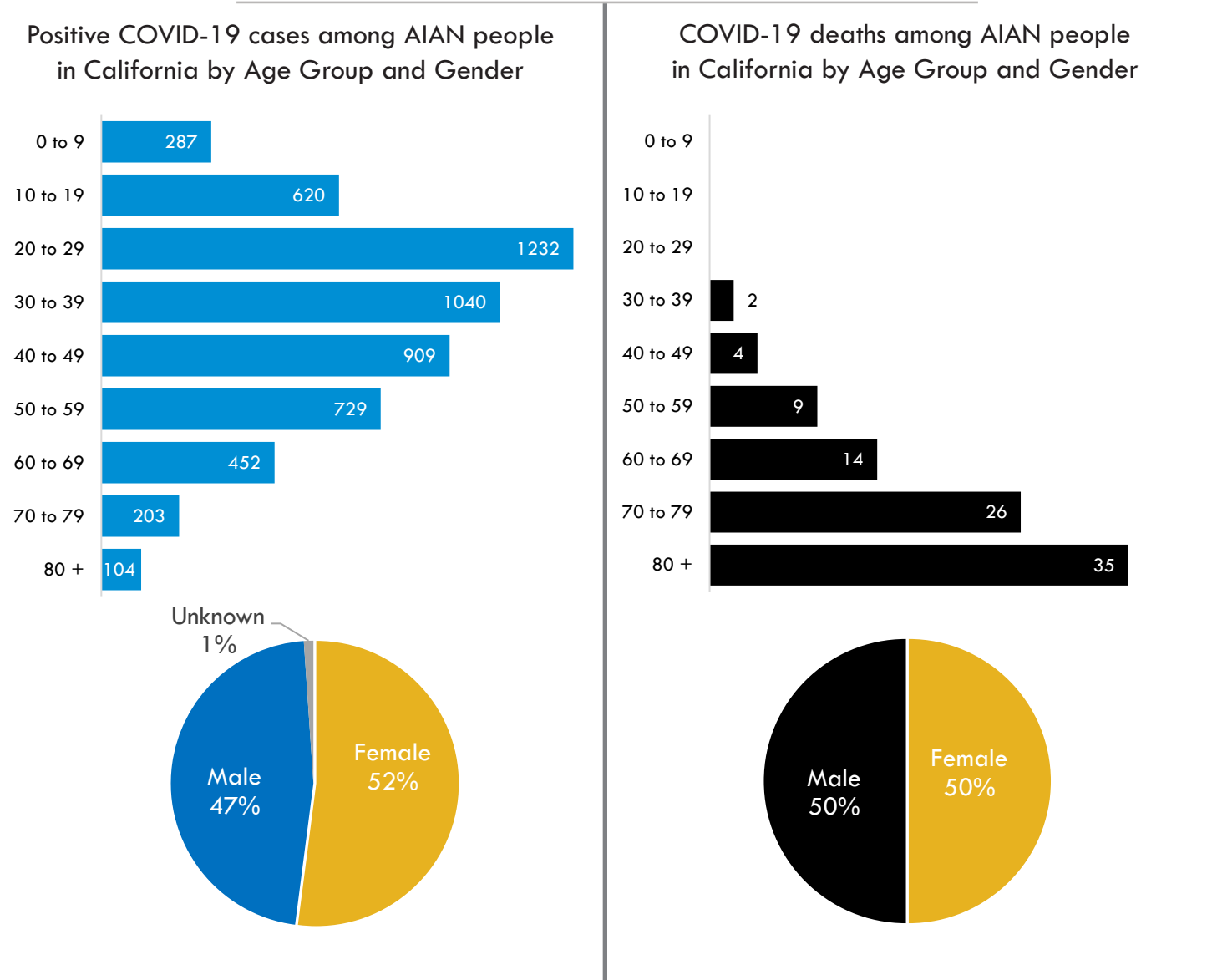

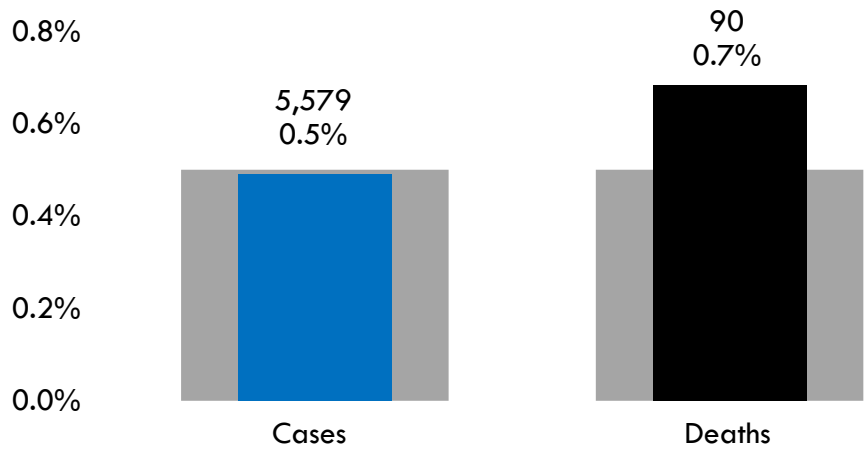

## American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) data reported by California to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)



CDC data show that AIAN in California are testing positive for COVID-19 at rates that are proportionate to their population in California but dying at rates that are higher. This includes a total of **5,579 cases** and **90 deaths**.



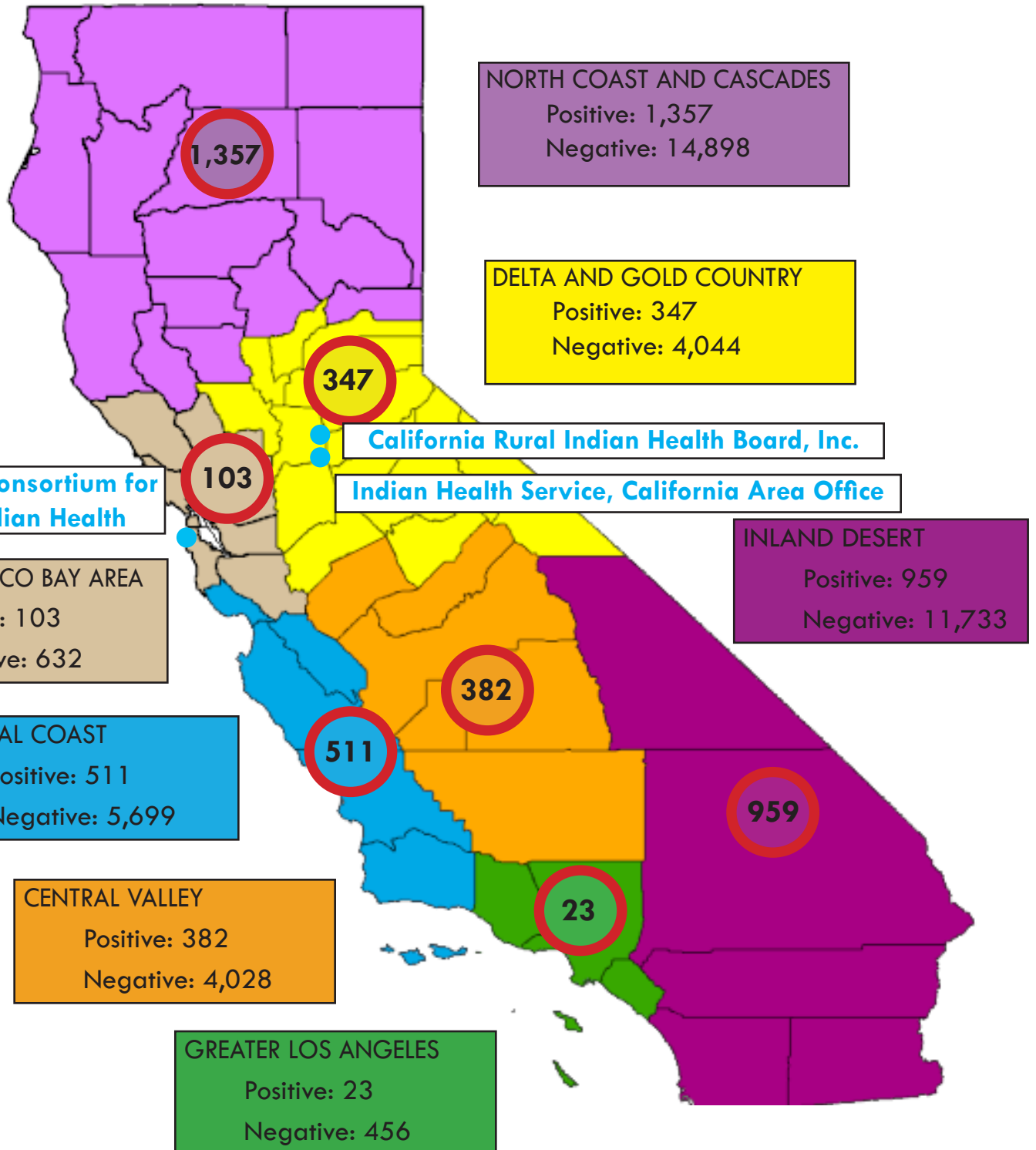

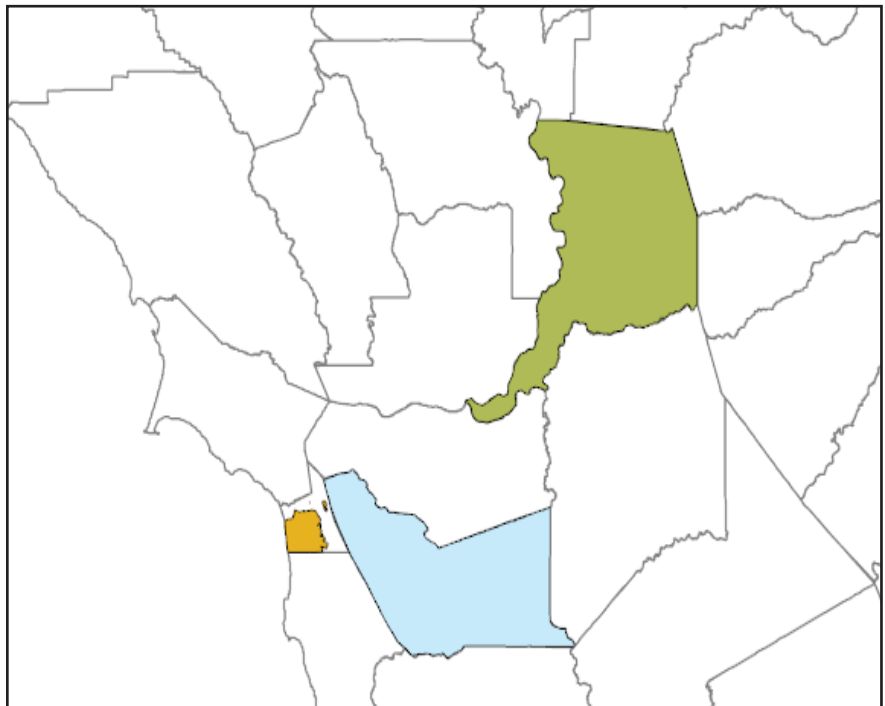

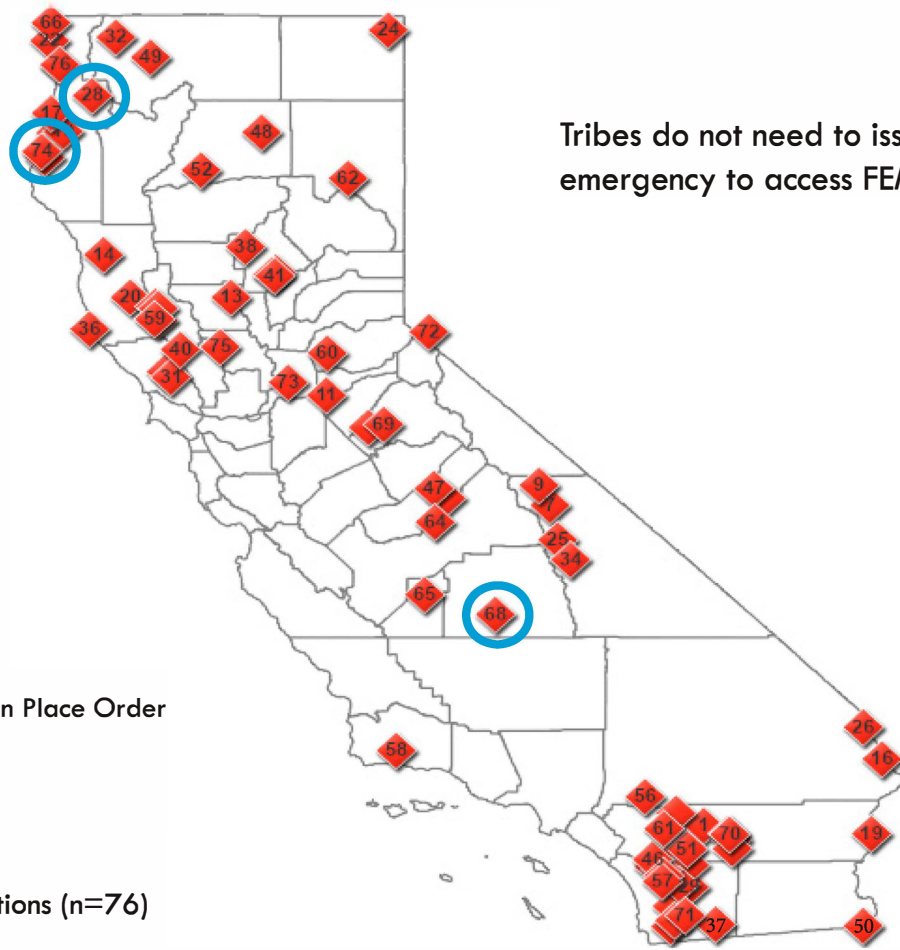
