

DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 68.16 million with more than 1.55 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 15,040,175 and deaths at 285,381 (as of 12/9).

On December 16 from 3:00-4:00 PM EST, CDC Foundation President and CEO Dr. Judy Monroe and CDC Principal Deputy Director Dr. Anne Schuchat will cover the agency's current COVID-19 response, including the latest information about vaccines and vaccine distribution plans. The IHS has released the IHS COVID-19 Pandemic Vaccine Plan November 2020. The plan is available on the IHS Web site [HERE](#).

The Regional Stay Home Order, announced by Governor Newsom on December 3, will go into effect within 48 hours in regions with less than 15% ICU availability. It prohibits private gatherings of any size, closes sector operations except for critical infrastructure and retail, and requires 100% masking and physical distancing in all others. The order will remain in effect for at least 3 weeks and, after that period, will be lifted when a region's projected ICU capacity meets or exceeds 15%. This will be assessed on a weekly basis after the initial 3 week period. The state released a map of five regions and their current ICU capacity, as well as projected dates when regions will fall below the 15 percent threshold. 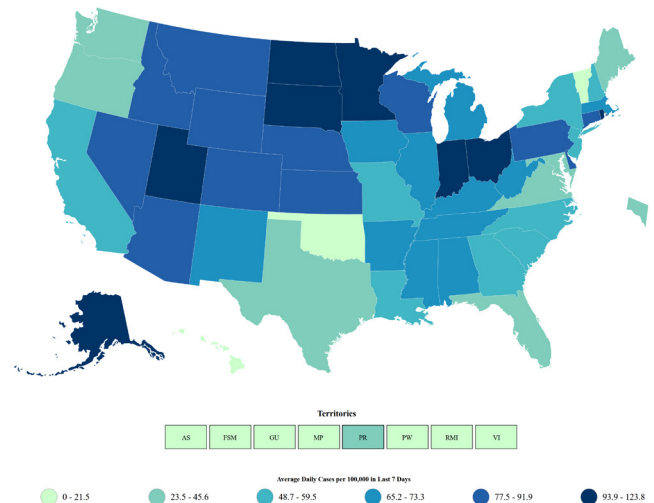
COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance* (as of 12/9)

- Total cases: 15,040,175
- Total deaths: 285,381
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:
i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

CALIFORNIA

As of December 9, 2020, there were more than 1.45 million positive cases and a total of 20,463 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 166,453 cases
- Age 18-49: 861,727 cases
- Age 50-64: 271,628 cases
- Age 65 and older: 149,303 cases
- Unknown/Missing: 1,124 cases

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 734,995 cases
- Male: 699,325 cases
- Unknown: 15,915 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 26,324,332

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

Of these, 2,905 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 35,498 have tested negative for COVID-19.

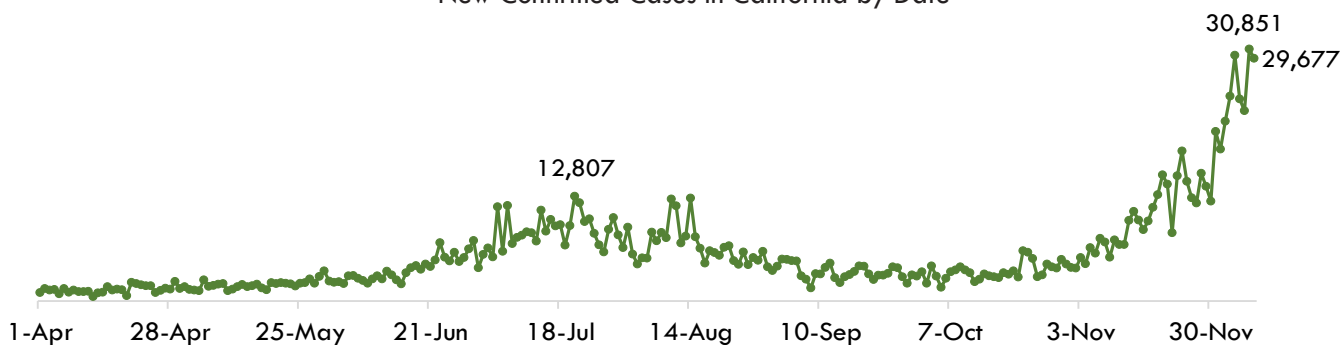

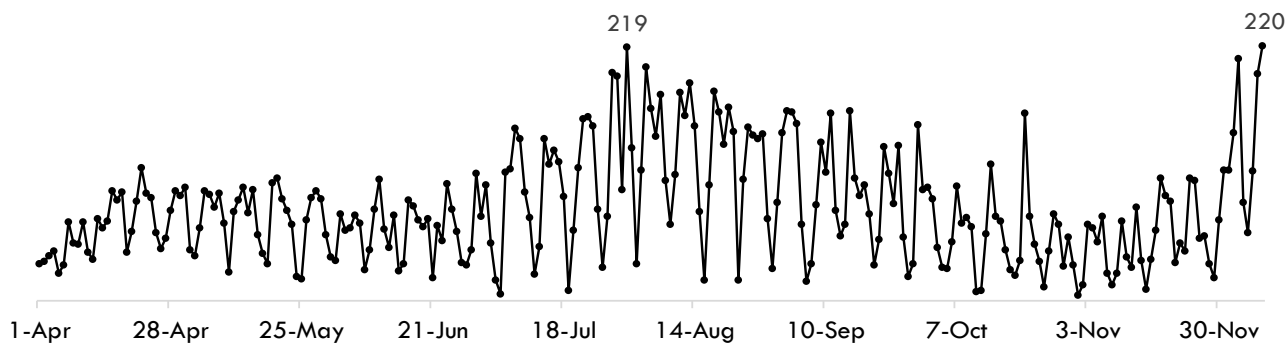

New Confirmed Cases in California by Date



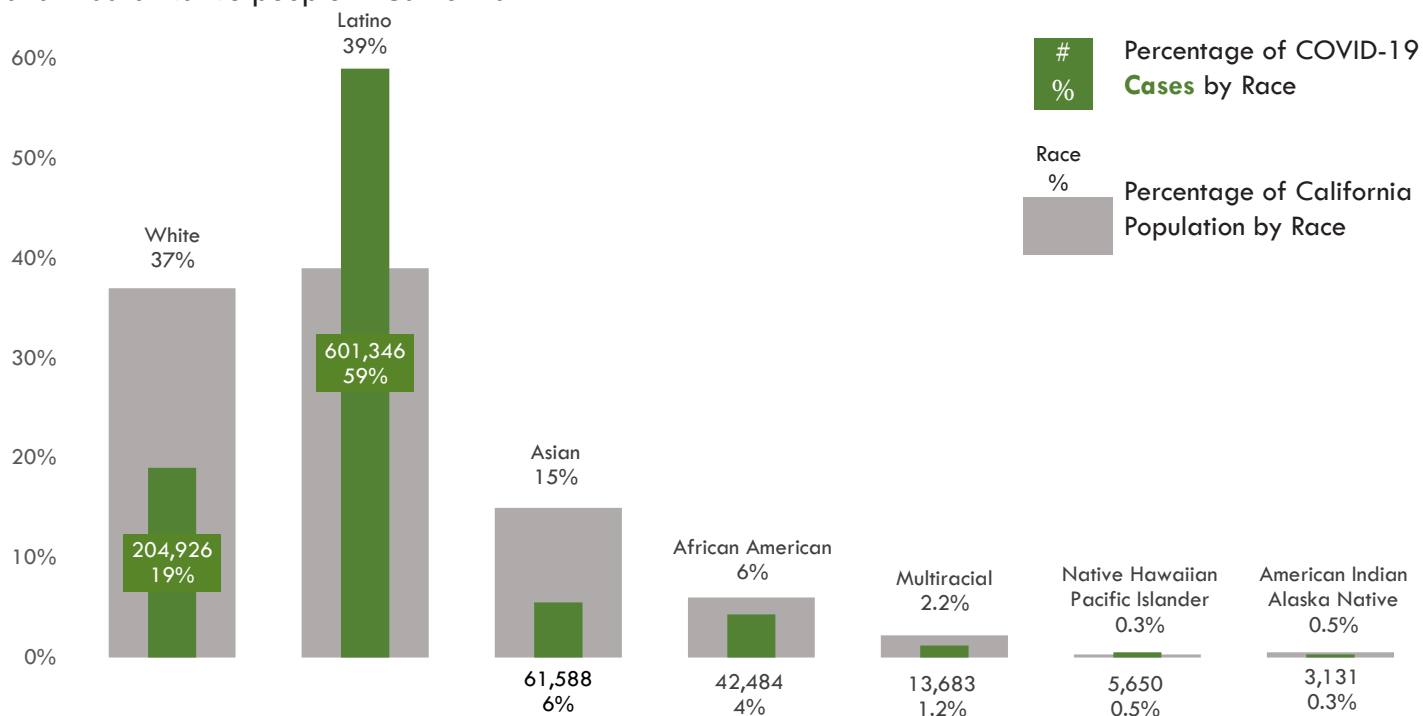
New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date



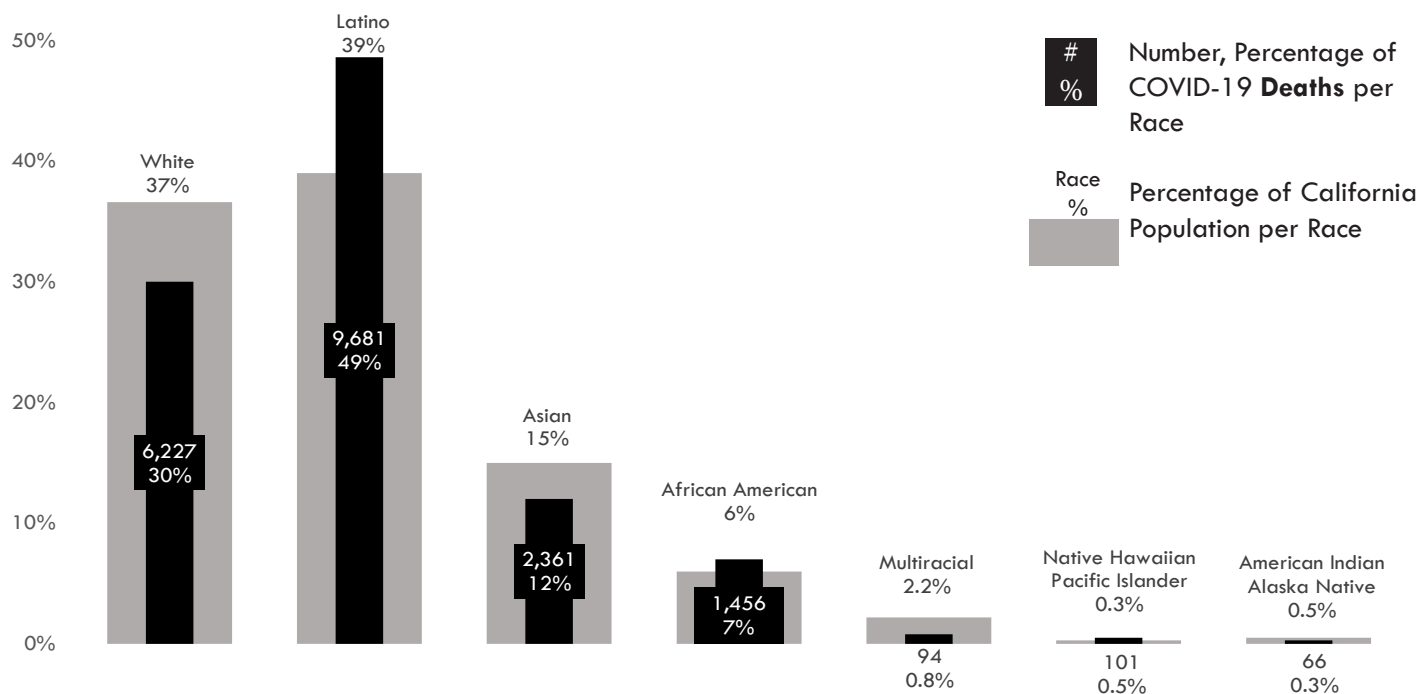

Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.3% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.3% of deaths** in California. This includes a total of **3,131 cases** and **66 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



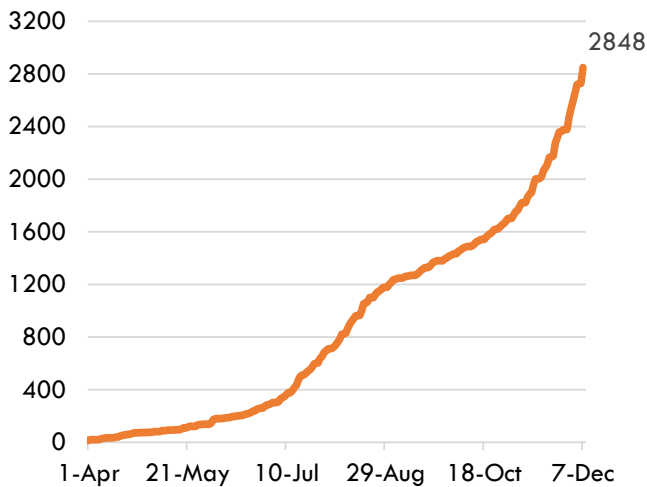

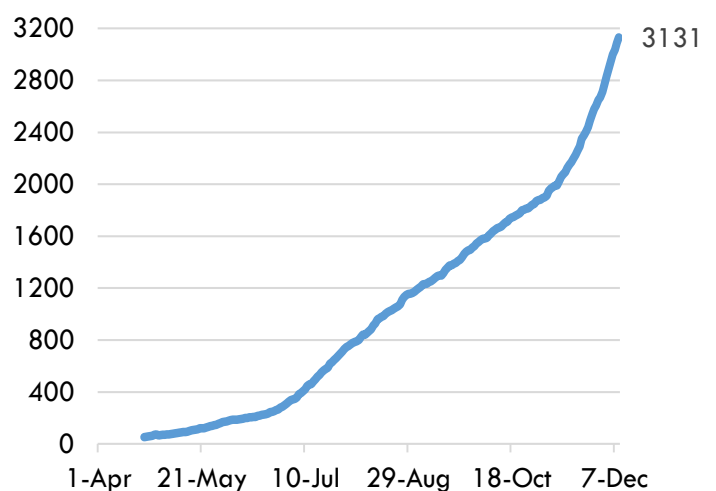

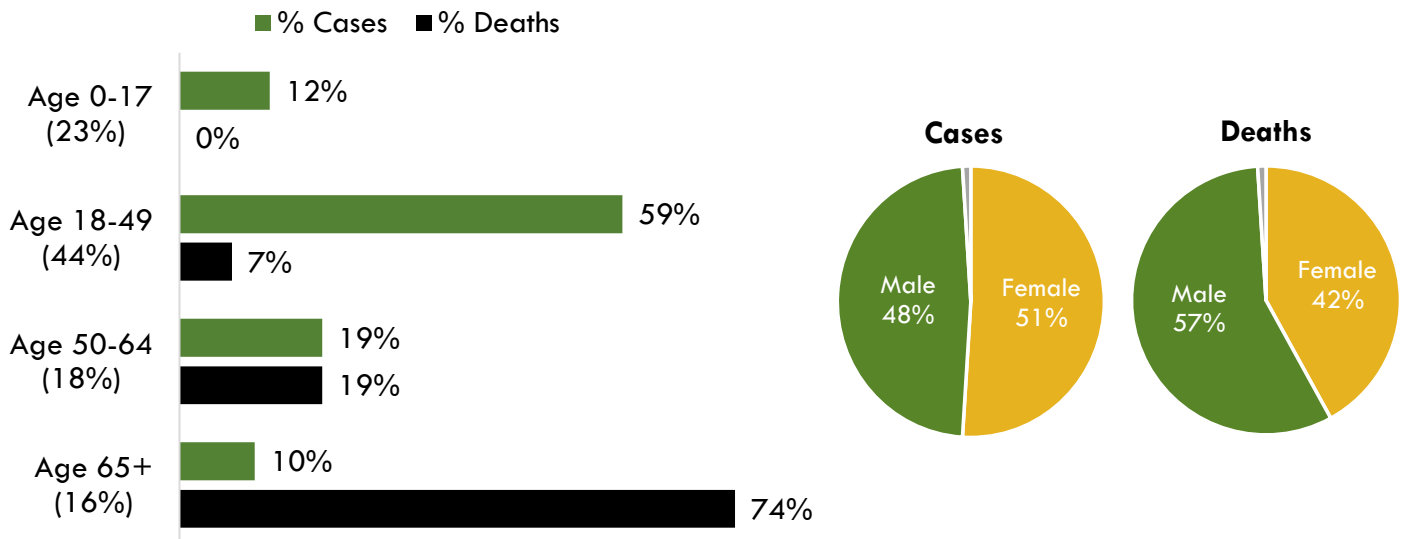

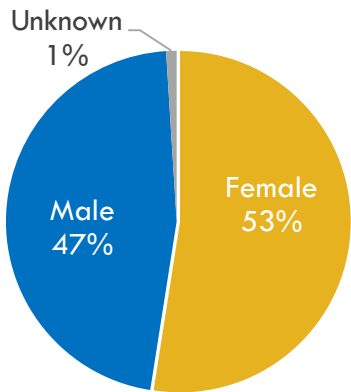
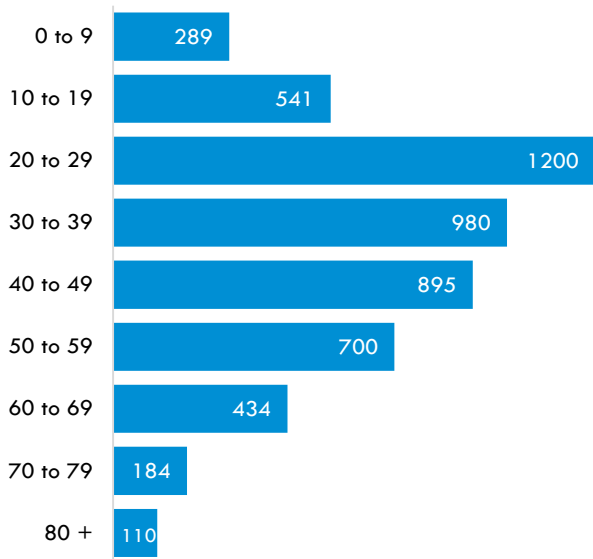

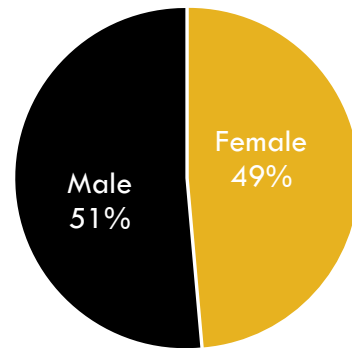
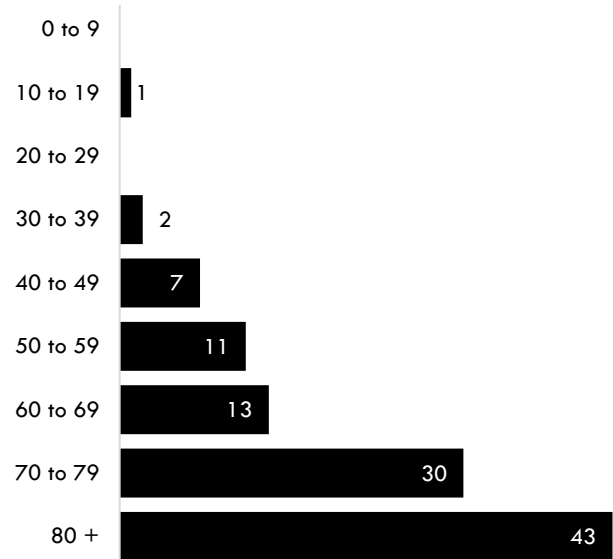

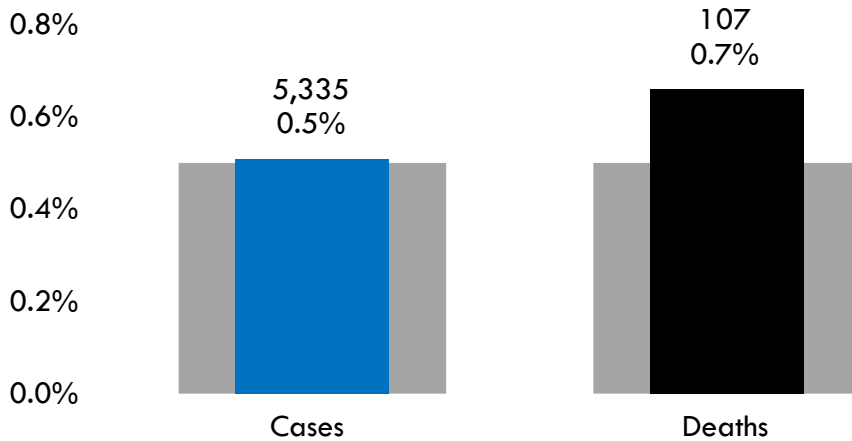
Positive COVID-19 cases among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender

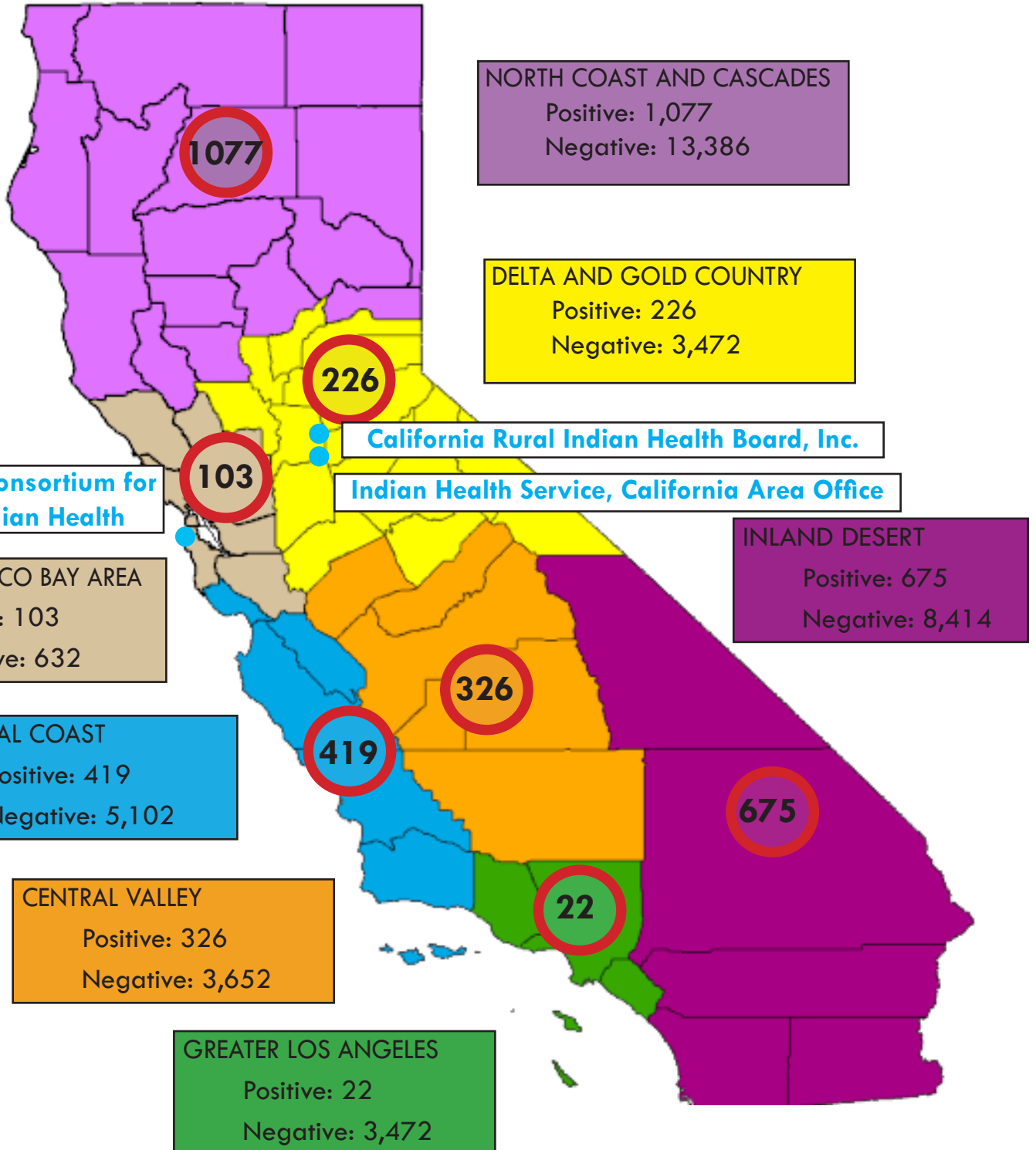

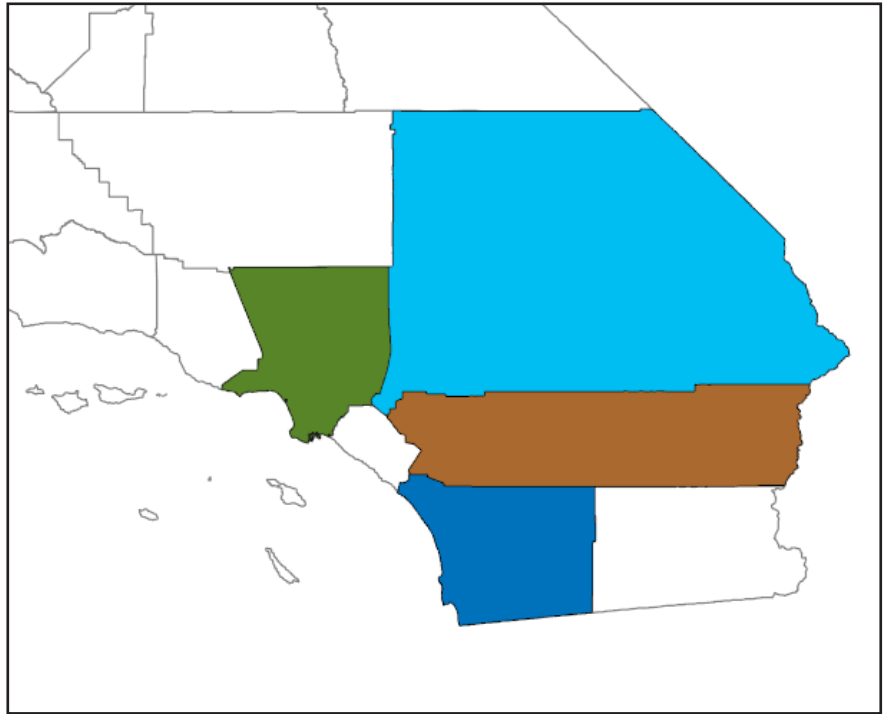

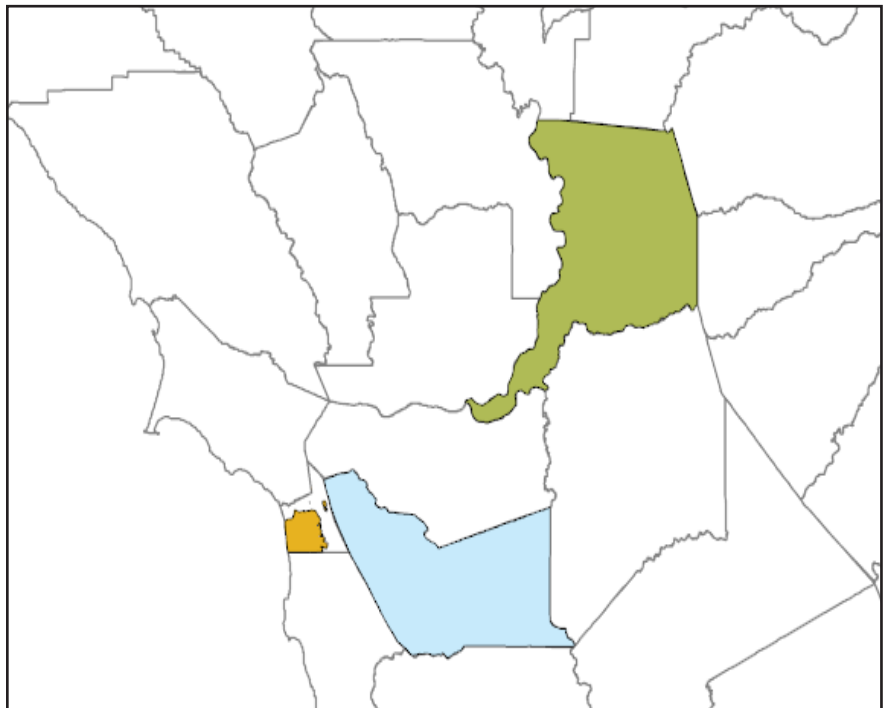
