## CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019 (COVID-19) SITUATIONAL REPORT #189 DECEMBER 11, 2020



#### DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 69.14 million with more than 1.57 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 15,474,800 and deaths at 291,522.

Based on data from 14 participating states, age-adjusted COVID-19–associated mortality among AI/ANs was 1.8 times that among non-Hispanic Whites. Among AI/ANs, mortality was higher among men than among women, and the disparity in mortality compared with non-Hispanic Whites was highest among persons aged 20–49 years. The following 14 states were solicited by CSTE to participate in the workgroup and provide data for analysis: Alaska, Arizona, Louisiana, Minnesota, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, and Washington. The Regional Stay Home Order, announced by Governor Newsom on December 3, will go into effect within 48 hours in regions with less than 15% ICU availability. It prohibits private gatherings of any size, closes sector operations except for critical infrastructure and retail, and requires 100% masking and physical distancing in all others. The order will remain in effect for at least 3 weeks and, after that period, will be lifted when a region's projected ICU capacity meets or exceeds 15%. This will be assessed on a weekly basis after the initial 3 week period. The state released a map of five regions and their current ICU capacity, as well as projected dates when regions will fall below the 15 percent threshold. 

\*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidémiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.



#### **CALIFORNIA**

As of December 10, 2020, there were more than 1.48 million positive cases and a total of 20,622 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

• Age 0-17: 171,218 cases

• Age 18-49: 882,580 cases

• Age 50-64: 278,211 cases

• Age 65 and older: 152,545 cases

• Unknown/Missing: 1,149 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 26,572,343

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

• Female: 752,554 cases

• Male: 716,500 cases

• Unknown: 16,649 cases

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

#### INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

41,556 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 12/9/2020.

Of these, 2,990 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 36,525 have tested negative for COVID-19.






#### New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date





#### Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.3% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.3% of deaths in California. This includes a total of 3,270 cases and 66 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.












# American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) data reported by California to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)




CDC data show that AIAN in California are testing positive for COVID-19 at rates that are proportionate to their population in California but dying at rates that are higher. This includes a total of 5,335 cases and 107 deaths.

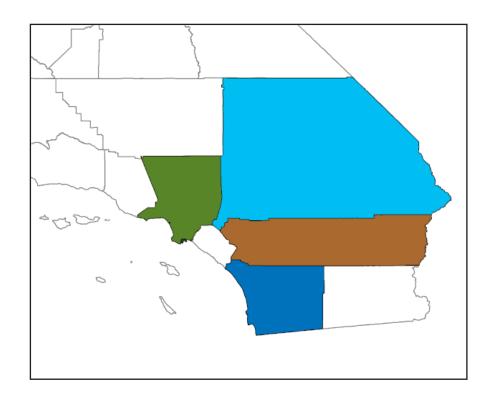



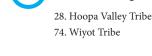
