DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 72.19 million with more than 1.63 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 16,519,668 and deaths at 302,992.

The Indian Health Service is expecting to receive an initial allocation of 68,425 doses of COVID-19 vaccines. IHS supports CDC and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices recommendations for vaccine release, including prioritization of health care workers and residents of long-term-care facilities. California Health Officials announced a Regional Stay at Home Order triggered by ICU capacity. The public health order took effect at 12:59 p.m. on December 5. Under the new order, if a region falls below the 15 percent ICU threshold it will have 24 hours to implement the Stay at Home Order. 

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidémiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.



CALIFORNIA

As of December 15, 2020, there were more than 1.67 million positive cases and a total of 21,481 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

• Age 0-17: 195,429 cases

• Age 18-49: 989,940 cases

• Age 50-64: 313,464 cases

Age 65 and older: 171,018 casesUnknown/Missing: 1,230 cases

Lab tests reported statewide: 28,149,590

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

• Female: 845,211 cases

• Male: 806,004 cases

• Unknown: 19,866 cases

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.








New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date





American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.3% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.3% of deaths in California. This includes a total of 3,691 cases and 67 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.













American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) data reported by California to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)





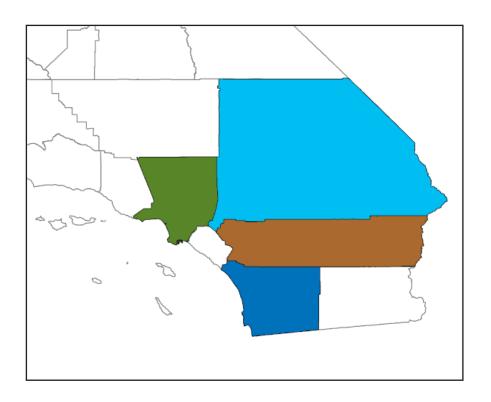
