DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 83.9 million with more than 1.8 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 20,558,489 and deaths at 350,664.

On December 31, 2020, it was announced that the Governor's Office of Emergency Services and the Health and Human Services Agency have deployed 1,280 medical personnel to healthcare facilities across the state to relieve stress on the medical care system during the current surge in cases and hospitalizations. These personnel are helping to ensure necessary healthcare staffing for hospitals, nursing homes and other medical facilities because of COVID-19. The Deployed personnel come from the California National Guard, California Medical Assistance Teams, Federal Military and Health agencies, California Health Corps and contracted medical providers. California Health Officials announced a Regional Stay at Home Order triggered by ICU capacity. The public health order took effect at 12:59 p.m. on December 5. Under the new order, if a region falls below the 15 percent ICU threshold it will have 23 hours to implement the Stay at Home Order. 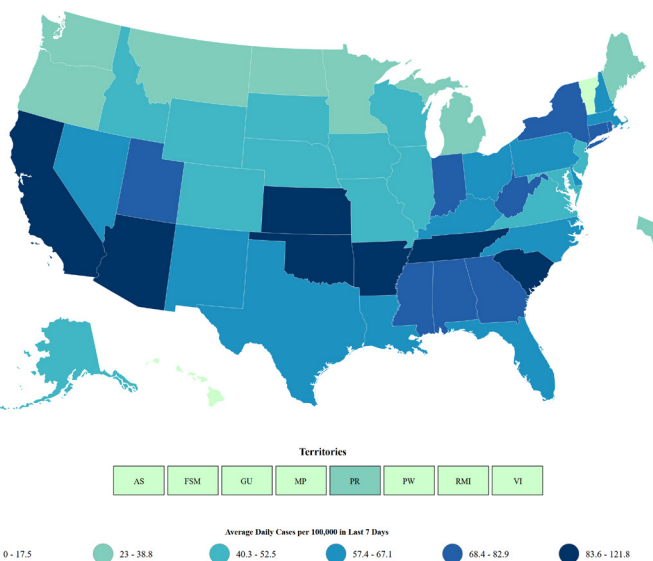
- Total cases: 20,558,489
- Total deaths: 350,664
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

CALIFORNIA

As of January 3, 2020, there were a total of 2,420,894 positive cases and 26,635 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 294,879
- Age 18-49: 1,414,371
- Age 50-64: 459,070
- Age 65 and older: 251,000
- Unknown/Missing: 1,574

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 1,225,955
- Male: 1,158,092
- Unknown: 36,847

Lab tests reported statewide: 34,127,013

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

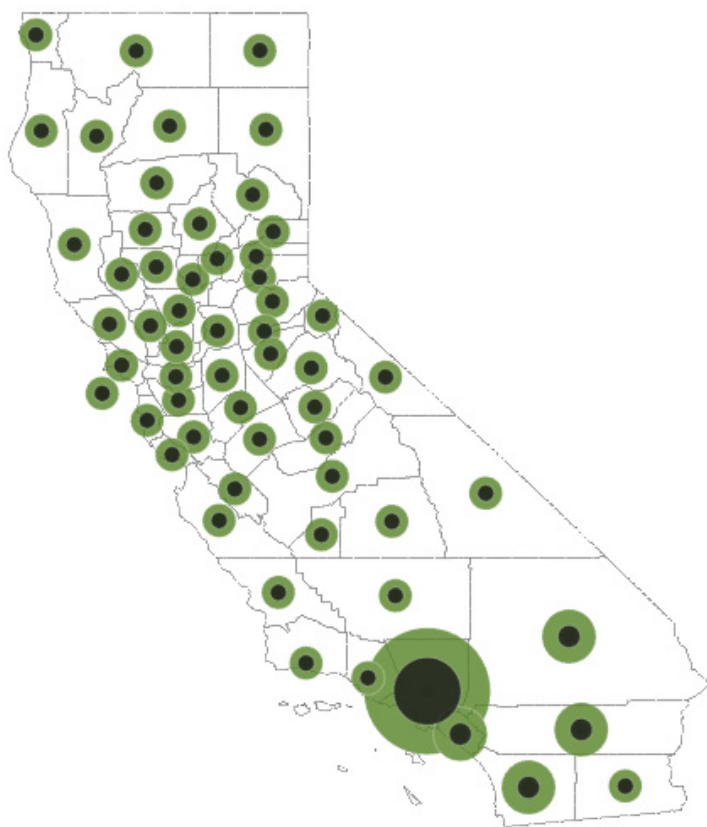

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

53,960 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 1/2/2021.

Of these, 4,566 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 46,855 have tested negative for COVID-19.

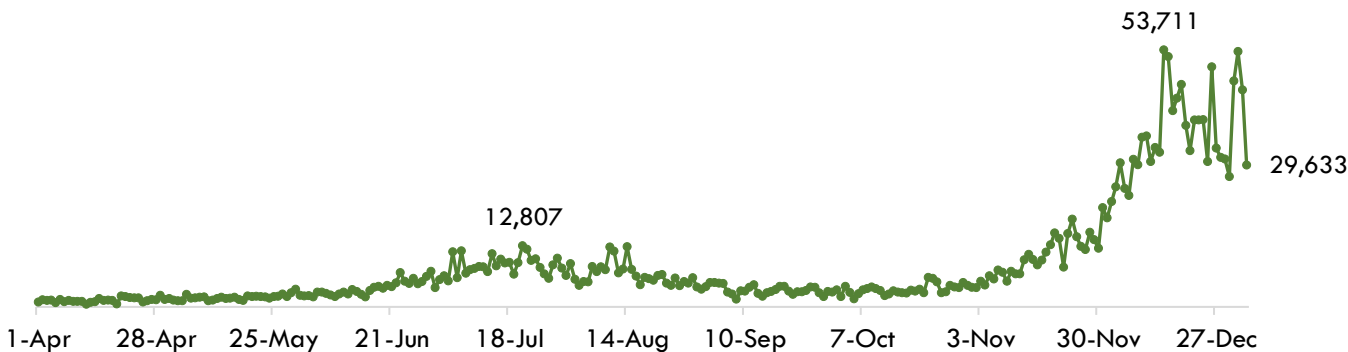

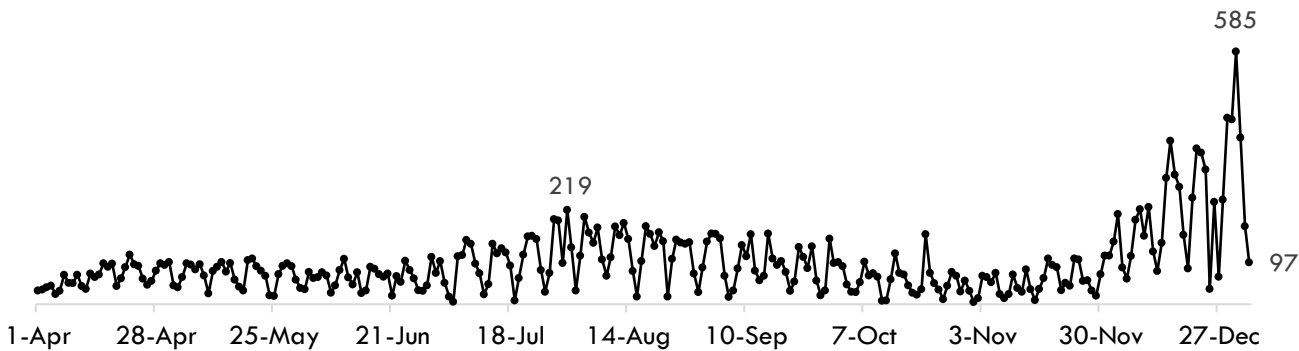

New Confirmed Cases in California by Date



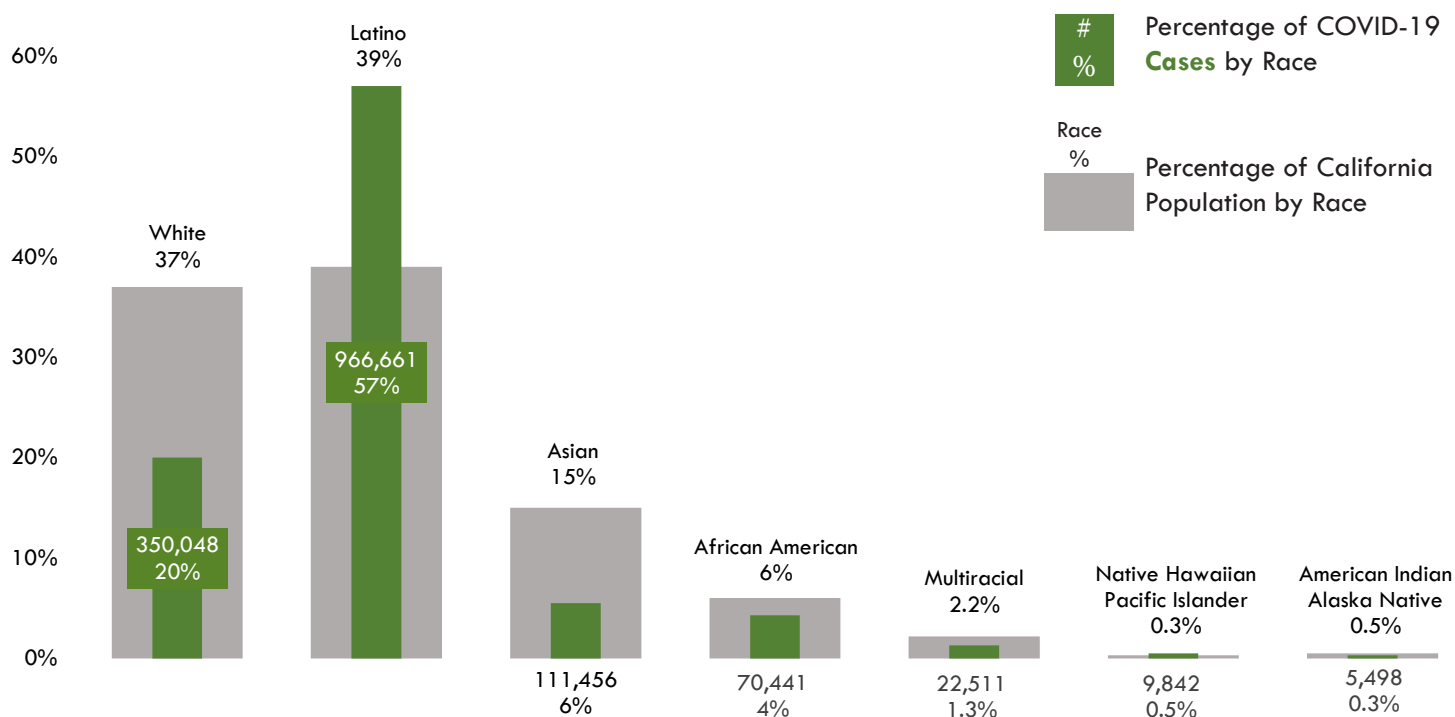
New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date



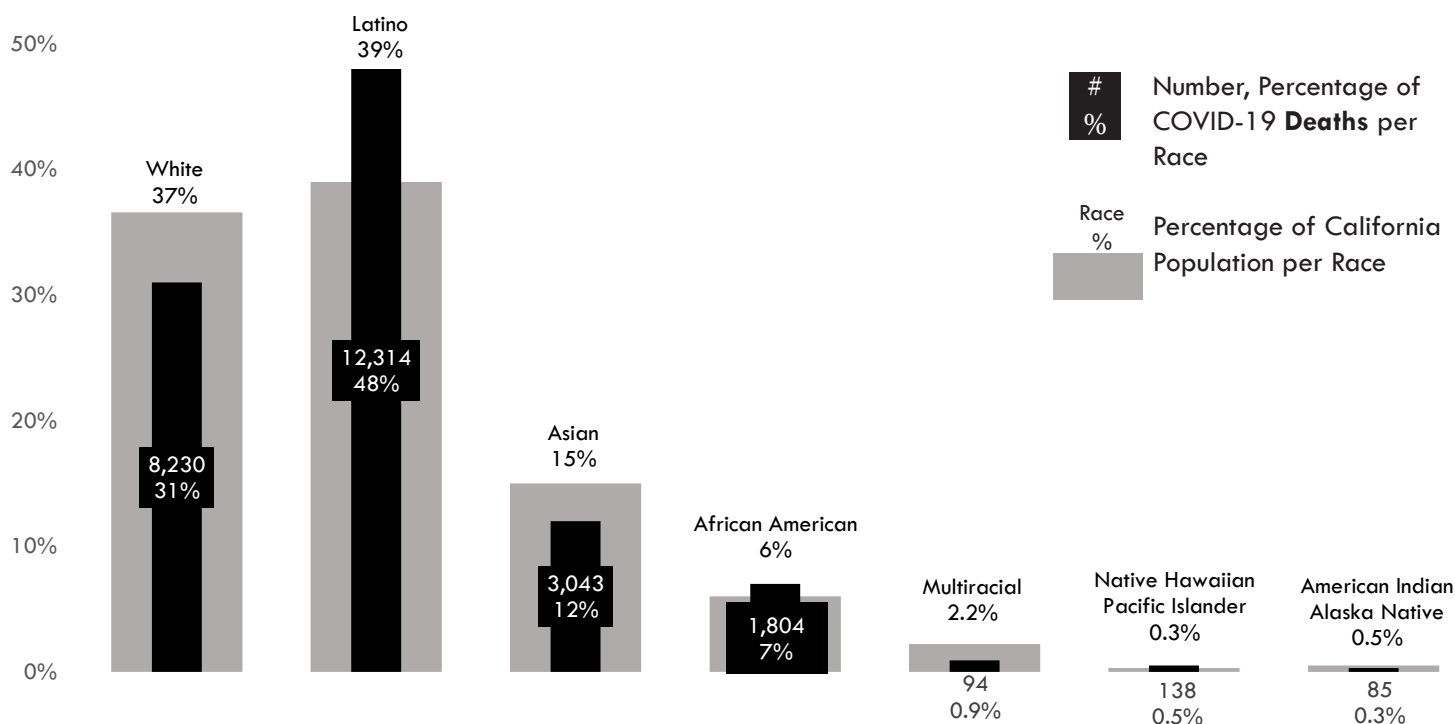

Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.3% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.3% of deaths** in California. This includes a total of **5,498 cases** and **85 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



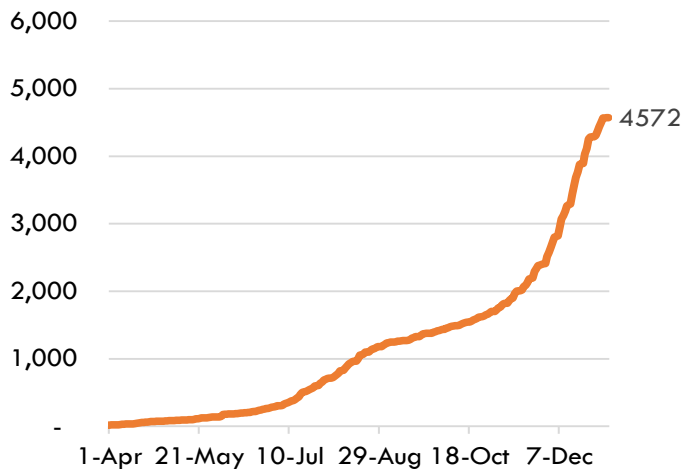
California Department of Public Health has nearly complete data on race and ethnicity for COVID-19 deaths, and are reporting the following trends: Latinos, African Americans and Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are dying at disproportionately higher levels.

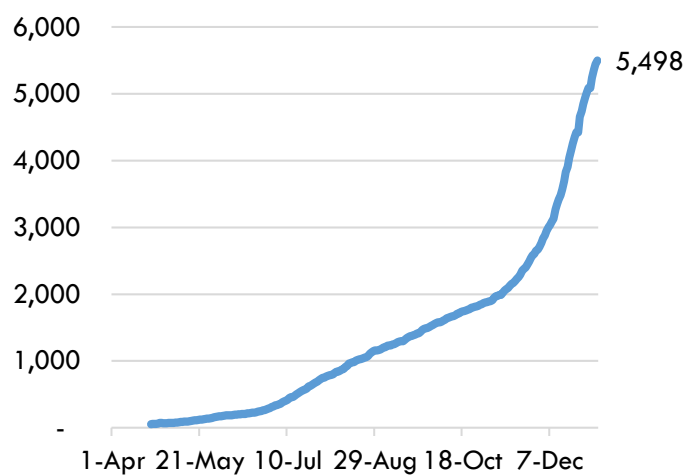

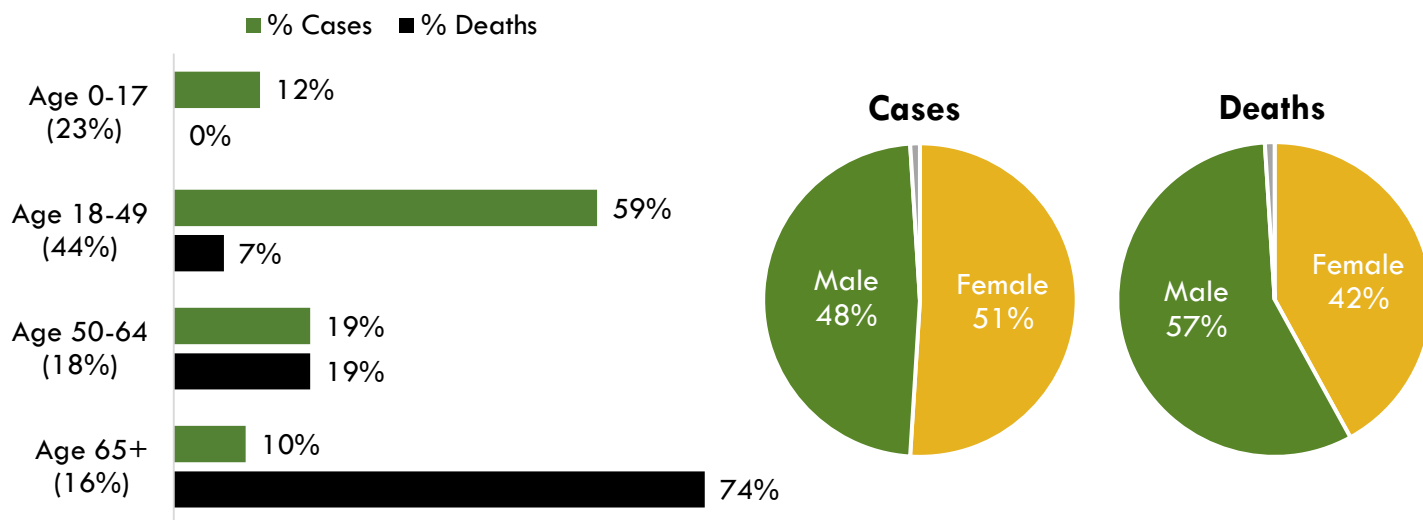

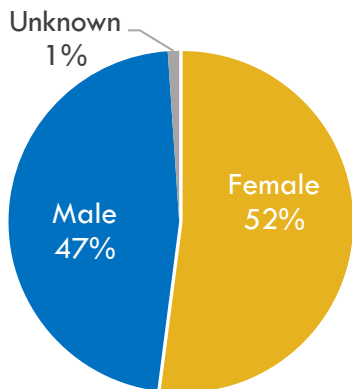
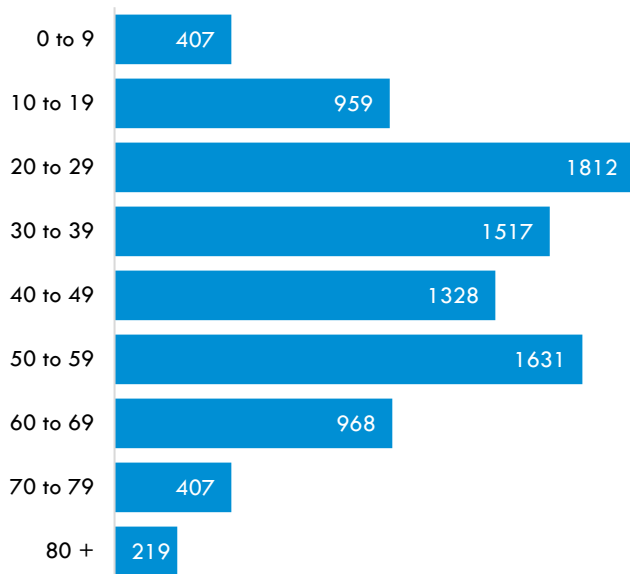

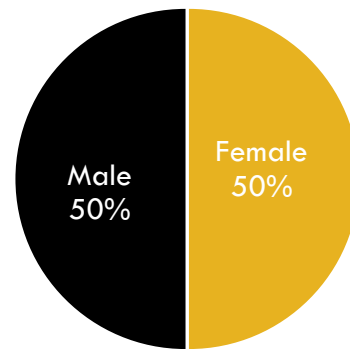
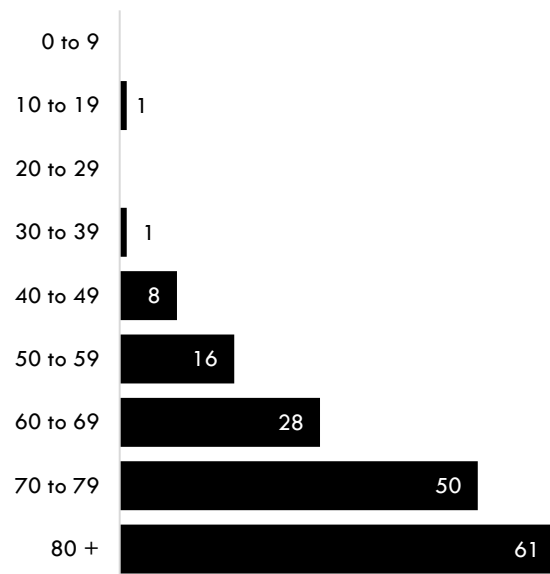

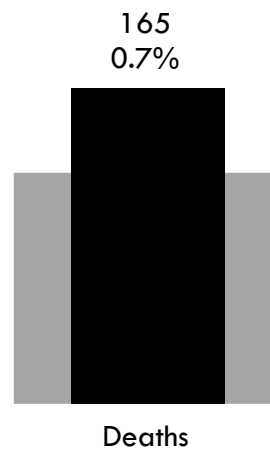
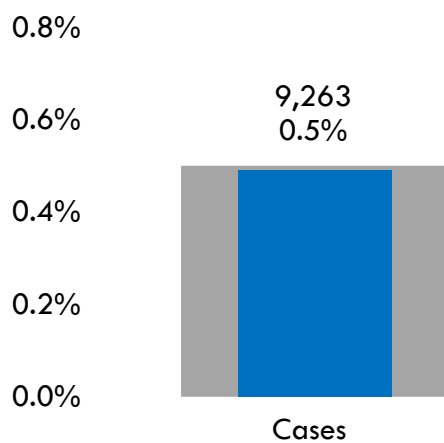
Positive COVID-19 cases among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender

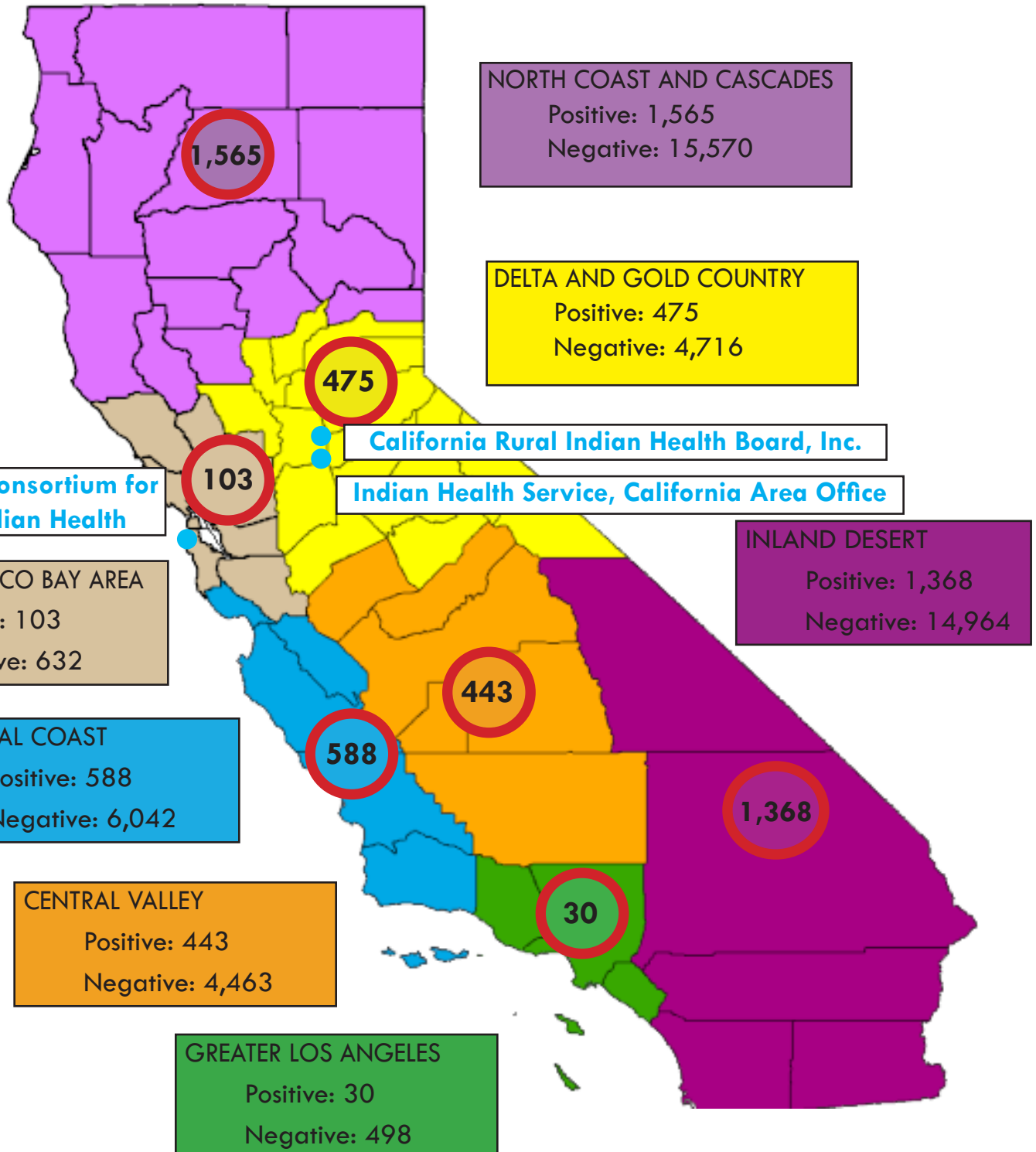

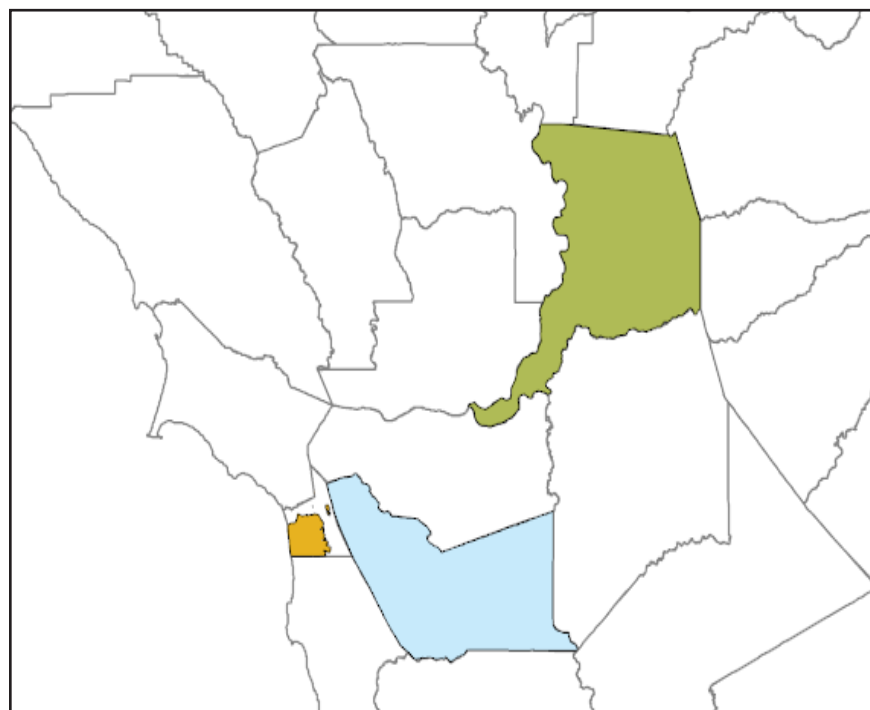

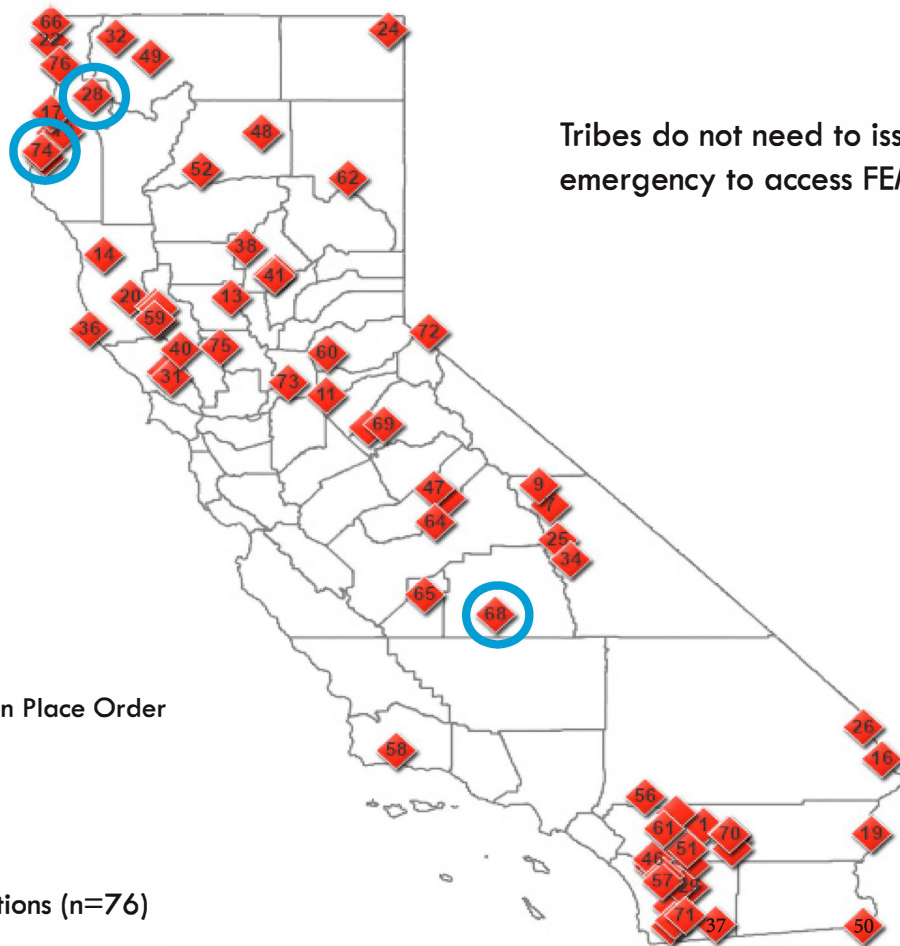
