DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 84.7 million with more than 1.8 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 20,960,096 and deaths at 356,005.

On January 7 from 2:00-3:00 PM EST, Dr. Faucci will sit down with Indian Health Service (IHS) to discuss clinical readiness and patient care during the time of COVID. The Coronavirus relief provisions were part of a larger 5,593-page bill under the "Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021". 

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to



CALIFORNIA

As of January 5, 2020, there were a total of 2,482,226 positive cases and 27,462 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

• Age 0-17: 303,249

• Age 18-49: 1,448,341

• Age 50-64: 471,057

Age 65 and older: 257,996Unknown/Missing: 1,583

Lab tests reported statewide: 34,548,621

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

• Female: 1,257,880

• Male: 1,186,641

• Unknown: 37,705

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.



INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

54,400 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 1/4/2021.

Of these, 4,651 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 47,152 have tested negative for COVID-19.






New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date





Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.3% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.3% of deaths in California. This includes a total of 5,646 cases and 87 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.






Two sources for tracking American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) cases reported in California

Data from the Indian Health Service (IHS) include positive cases reported by Tribal and Urban Indian Health Programs.












American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) data reported by California to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)








CDC data show that AIAN in California are testing positive for COVID-19 at rates that are proportionate to their population in California but dying at rates that are higher. This includes a total of 9,263 cases and 165 deaths.






