

DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 89.7 million with more than 1.9 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 22,522,749 and deaths at 375,124.

The Tribal Self-Governance Advisory Committee (TSGAC), will host a Webinar on Wednesday, January 13, 2021, from 1:00 pm to 2:30 pm (ET) on an overview and use of the funding included in the most recent COVID-19 legislation. The Coronavirus relief provisions were part of a larger 5,593-page bill under the “Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021”. 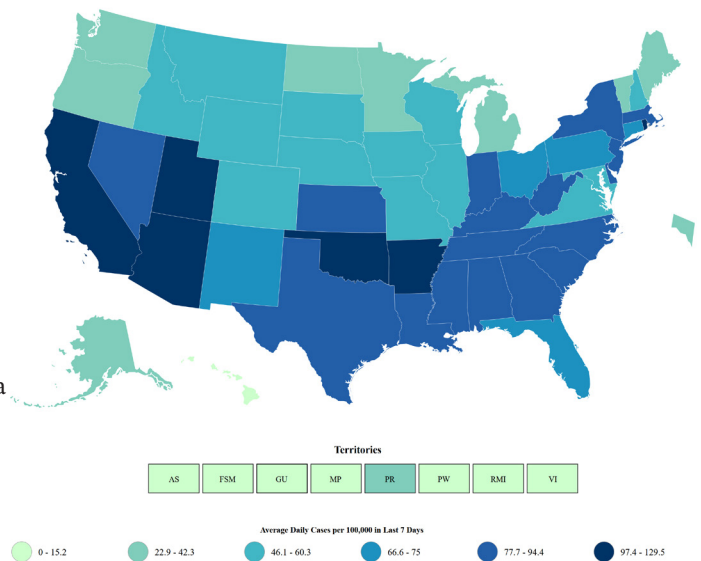
- Total cases: 22,522,749

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

- meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or
 - meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or
 - meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19.
- State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

CALIFORNIA

As of January 11, 2020, there were a total of 2,747,288 positive cases and 30,513 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 339,927
- Age 18-49: 1,598,547
- Age 50-64: 521,163
- Age 65 and older: 285,832
- Unknown/Missing: 1,819

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 1,395,192
- Male: 1,310,582
- Unknown: 41,514

Lab tests reported statewide: 36,170,528

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

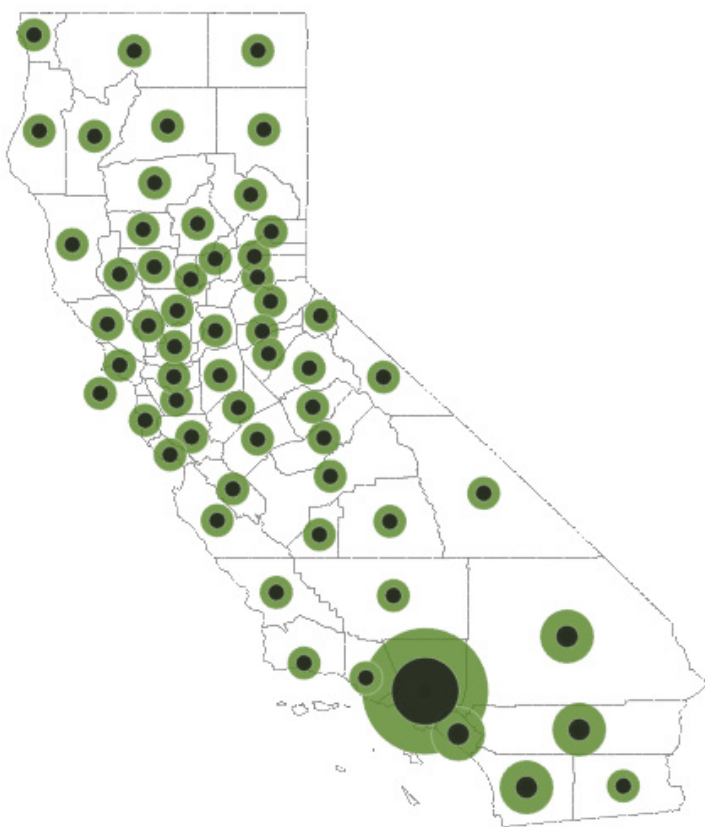

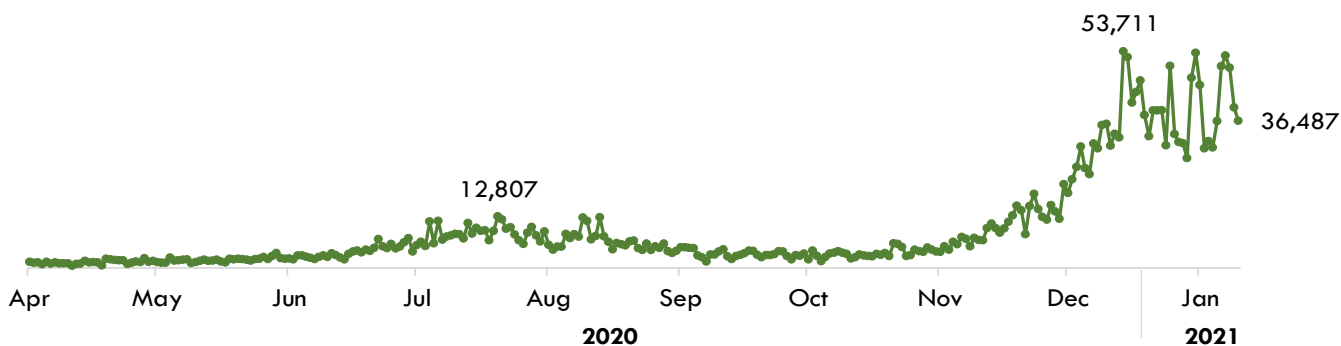

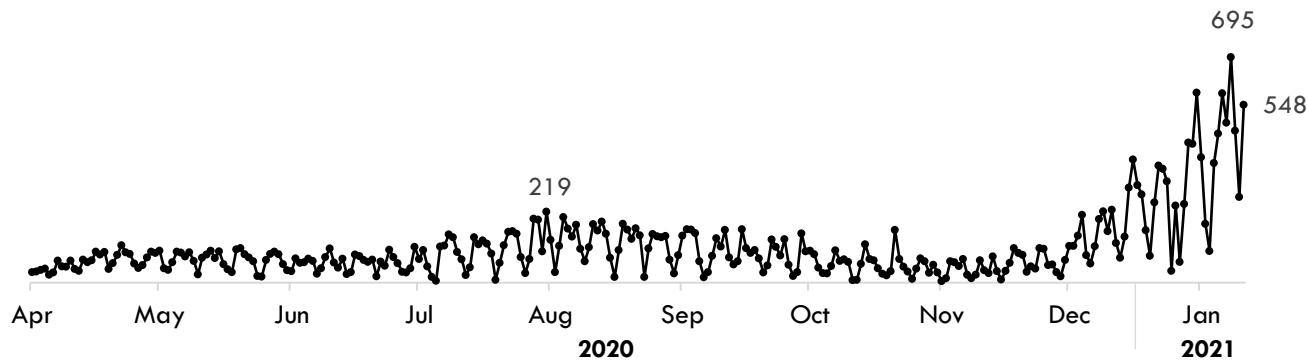

New Confirmed Cases in California by Date



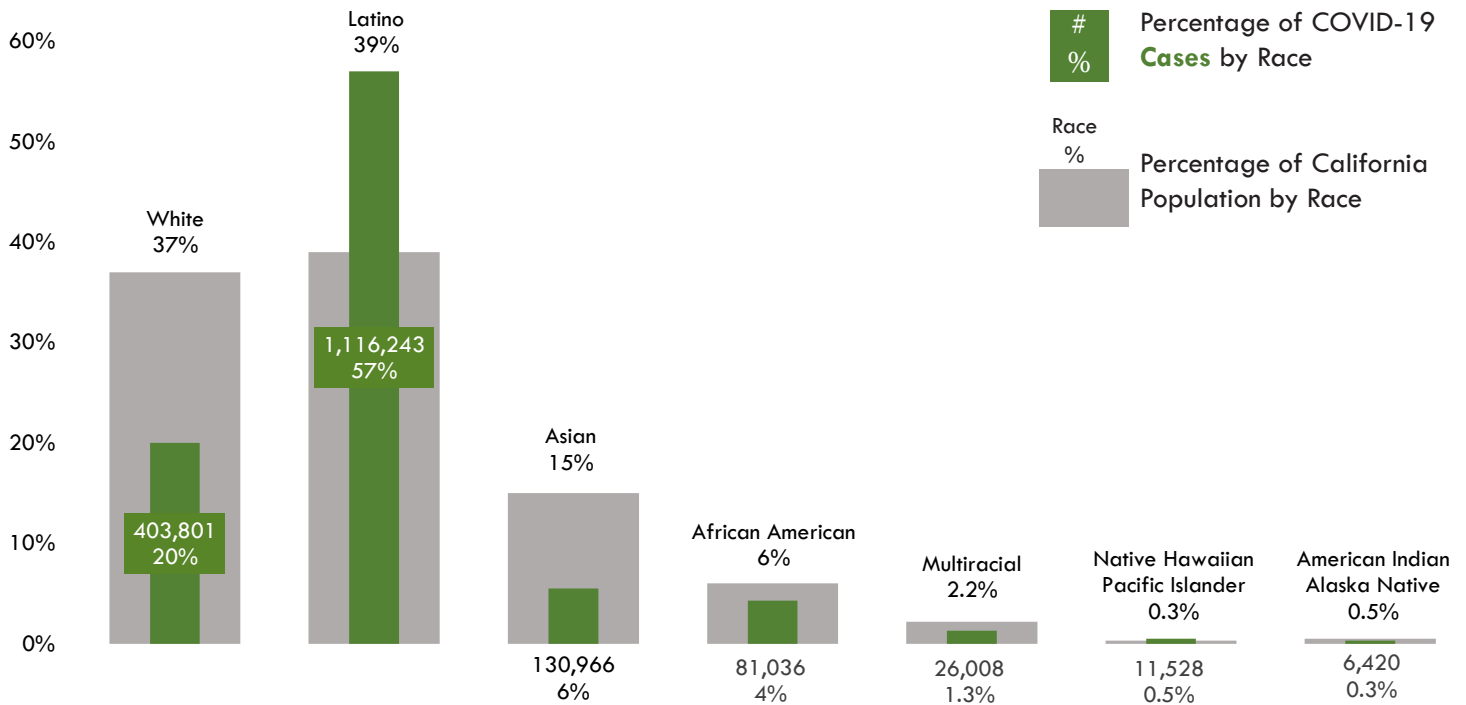
New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date



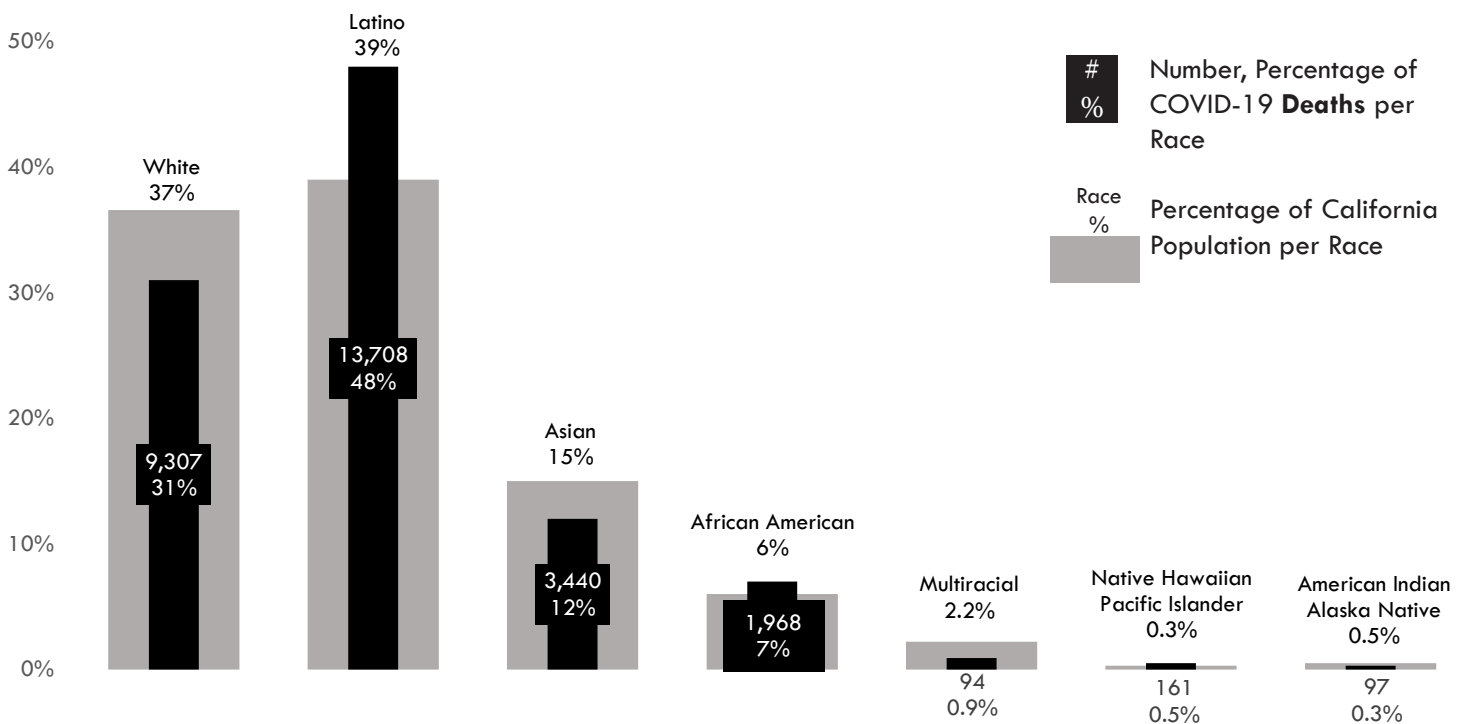

Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.3% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.3% of deaths** in California. This includes a total of **6,420 cases** and **97 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



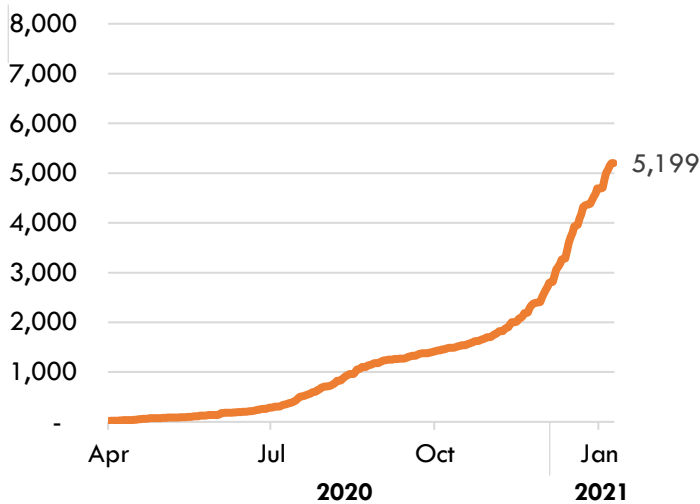

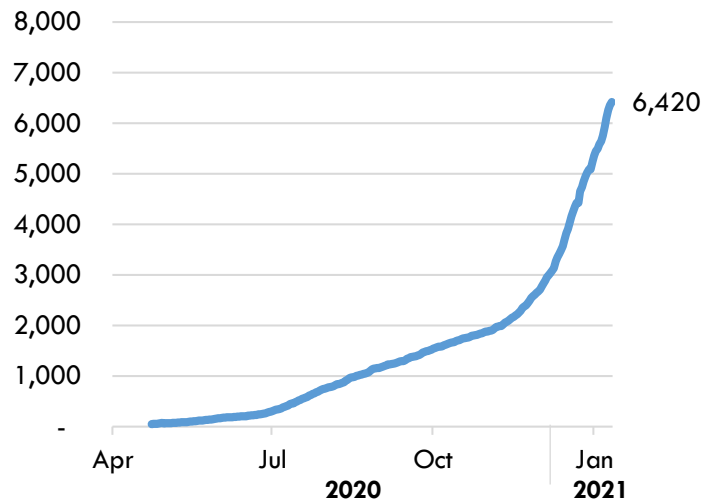

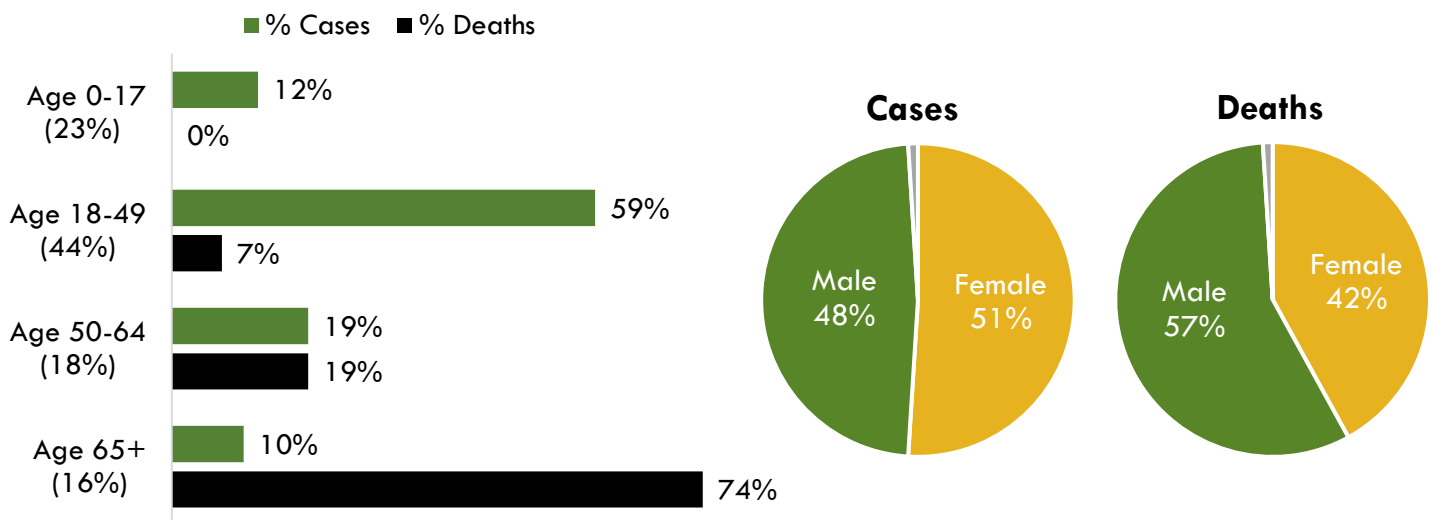

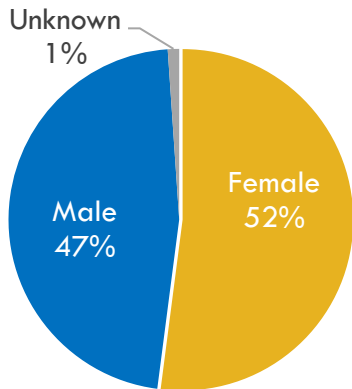
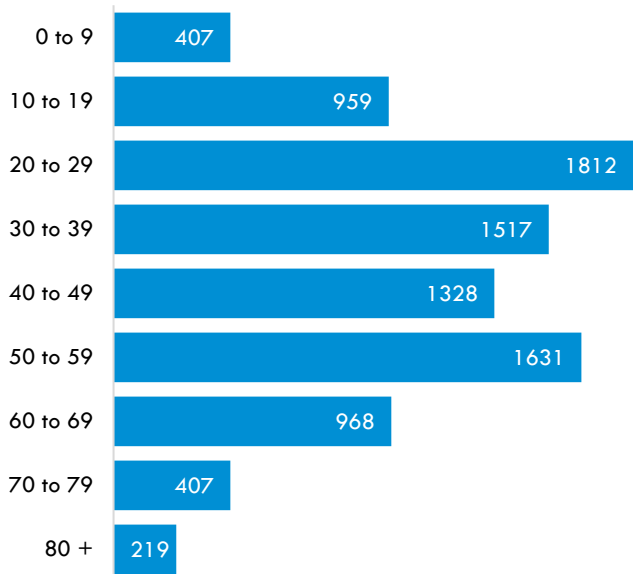

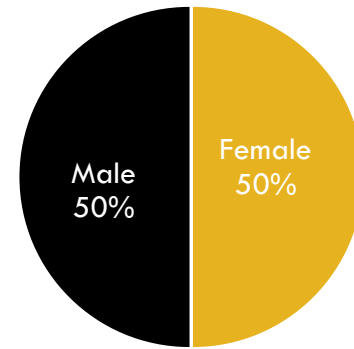
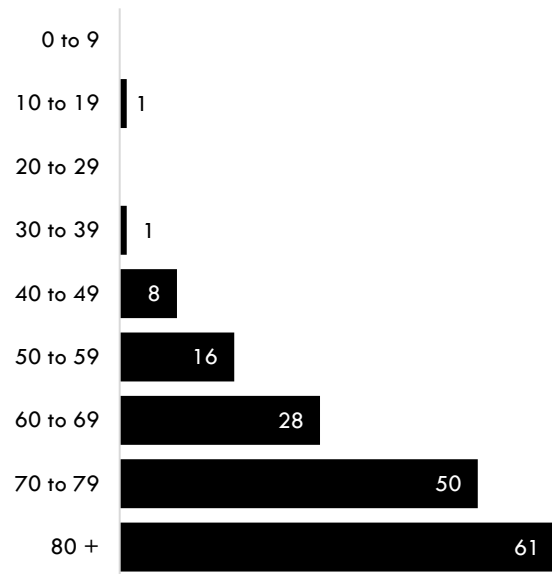

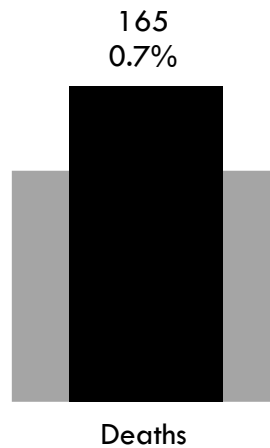
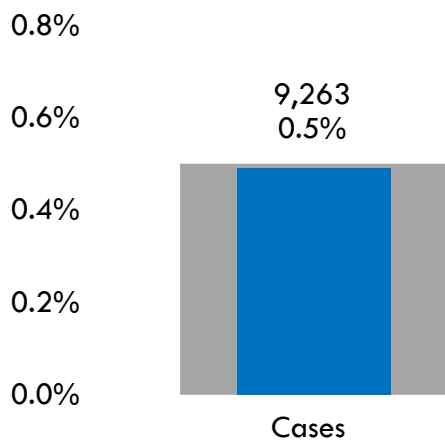
Positive COVID-19 cases among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender

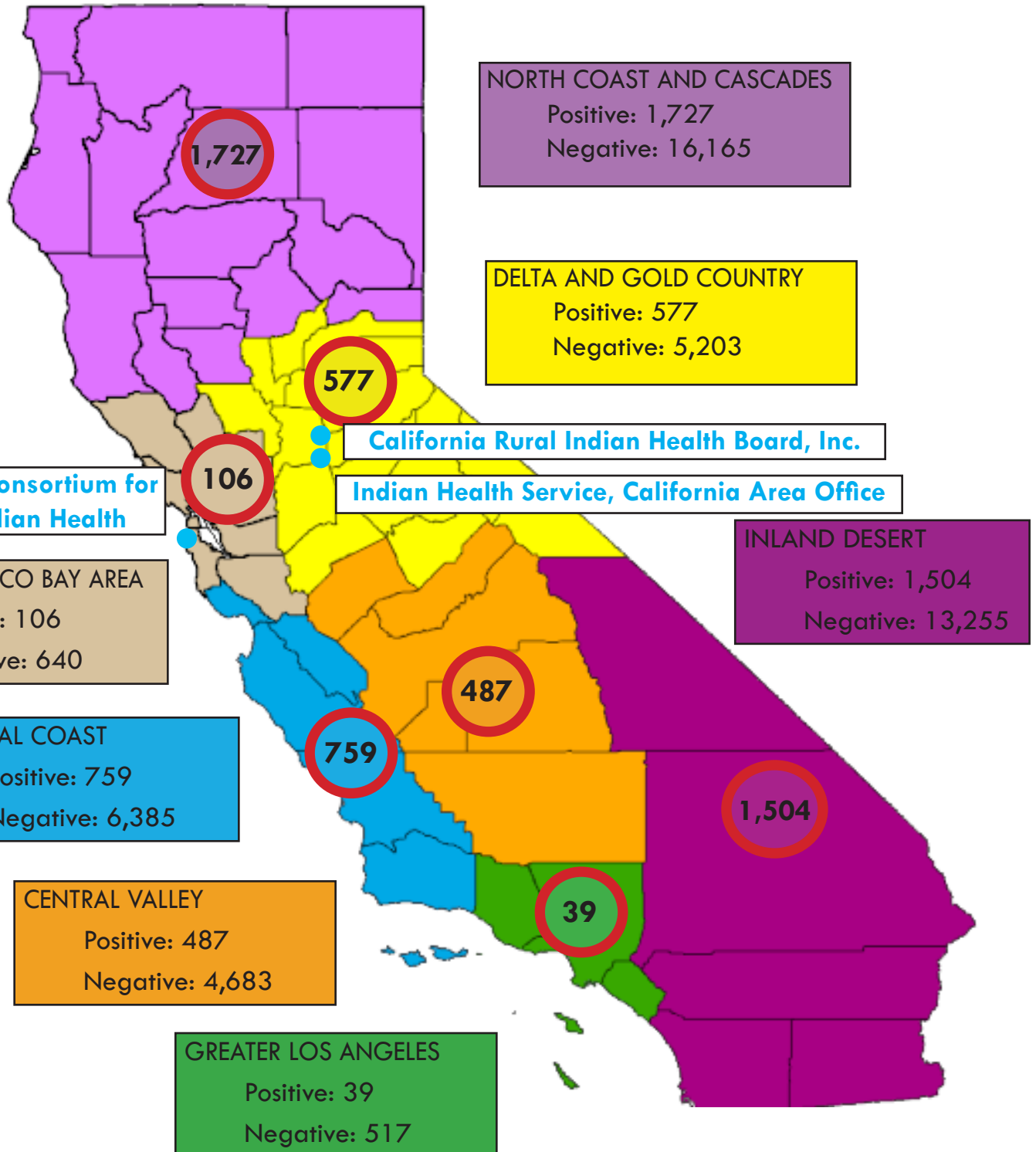


COVID-19 testing information from patients seen at a Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program in California
