## DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 90 million with more than 1.9 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 22,740,142 and deaths at 375,124.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is expanding the requirement for a negative COVID-19 test to all air passengers entering the United States. Learn more about this travel requirement [HERE](#).

As California continues its health first approach to fight the COVID-19 pandemic amid an unprecedented surge, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) today issued a new public health order to reduce pressure on strained hospital systems and redistribute the responsibility of medical care across the state so patients can continue to receive lifesaving care. ### COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance\*

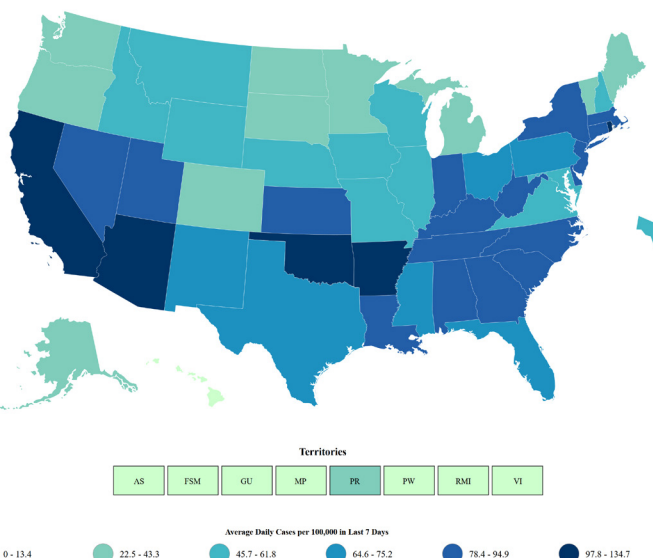
- Total cases: 22,740,142
- Total deaths: 379,255
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

\*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

## CALIFORNIA

As of January 12, 2020, there were a total of 2,781,039 positive cases and 31,102 deaths in California.

Ages of all confirmed positive cases:

- Age 0-17: 344,861
- Age 18-49: 1,617,300
- Age 50-64: 527,510
- Age 65 and older: 289,522
- Unknown/Missing: 1,846

Gender of all confirmed positive cases:

- Female: 1,412,663
- Male: 1,326,329
- Unknown: 42,047

Lab tests reported statewide: 36,842,651

Twenty-five public health labs in California are testing samples for COVID-19. These labs include the California Department of Public Health's Laboratory in Richmond, Alameda, Butte, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Imperial, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Monterey, Napa-Solano-Yolo-Marin (located in Solano), Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sonoma, Tulare and Ventura County public health laboratories. The Richmond Laboratory will provide diagnostic testing within a 48-hour turnaround time. This means California public health officials will get test results sooner, so that patients will get the best care.

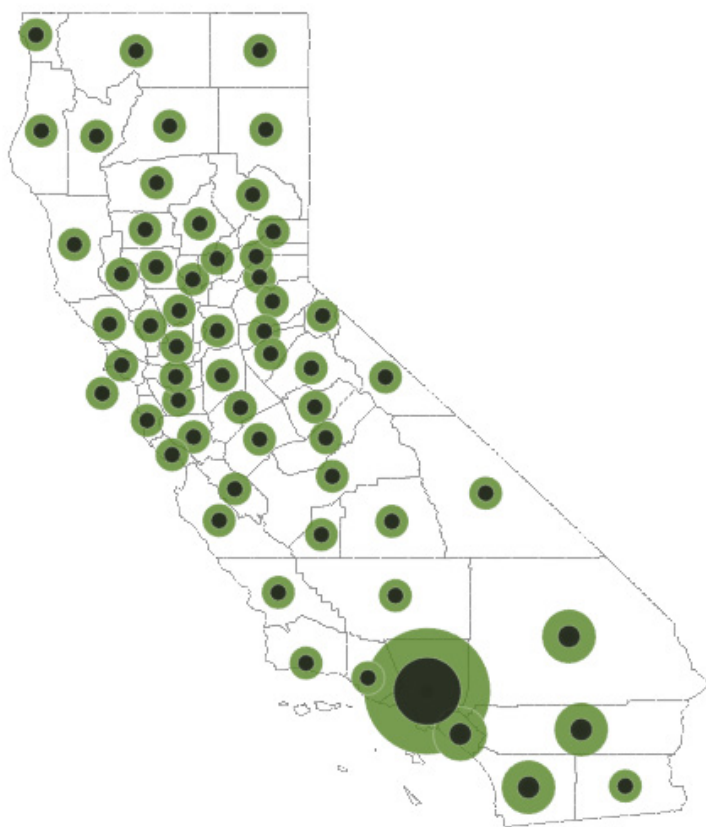

## INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE CALIFORNIA AREA

55,570 Tribal or Urban Indian Health Program patients in the California Area have been tested for COVID-19 as of 1/11/2021.

Of these, 5,280 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 47,137 have tested negative for COVID-19.

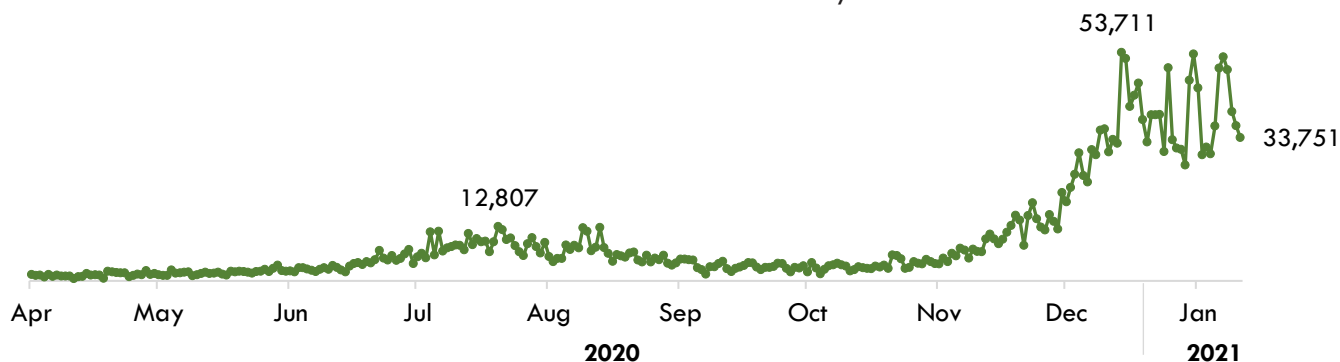

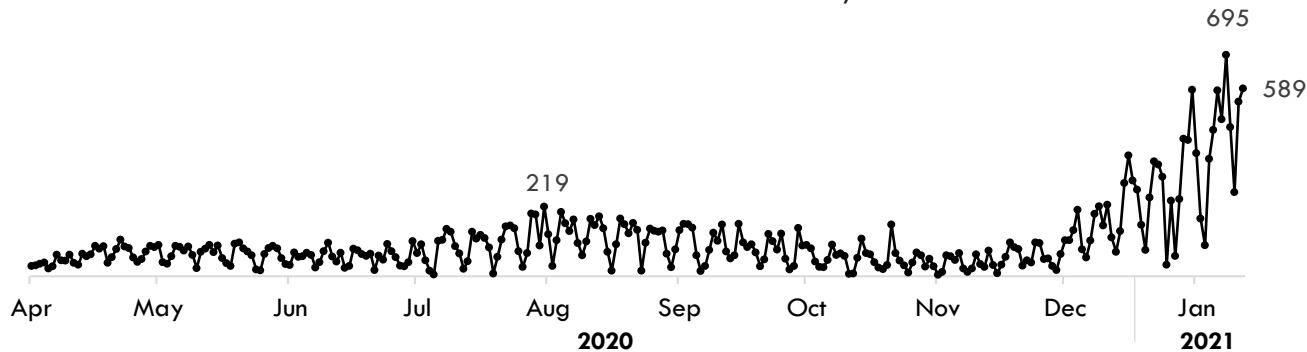

### New Confirmed Cases in California by Date



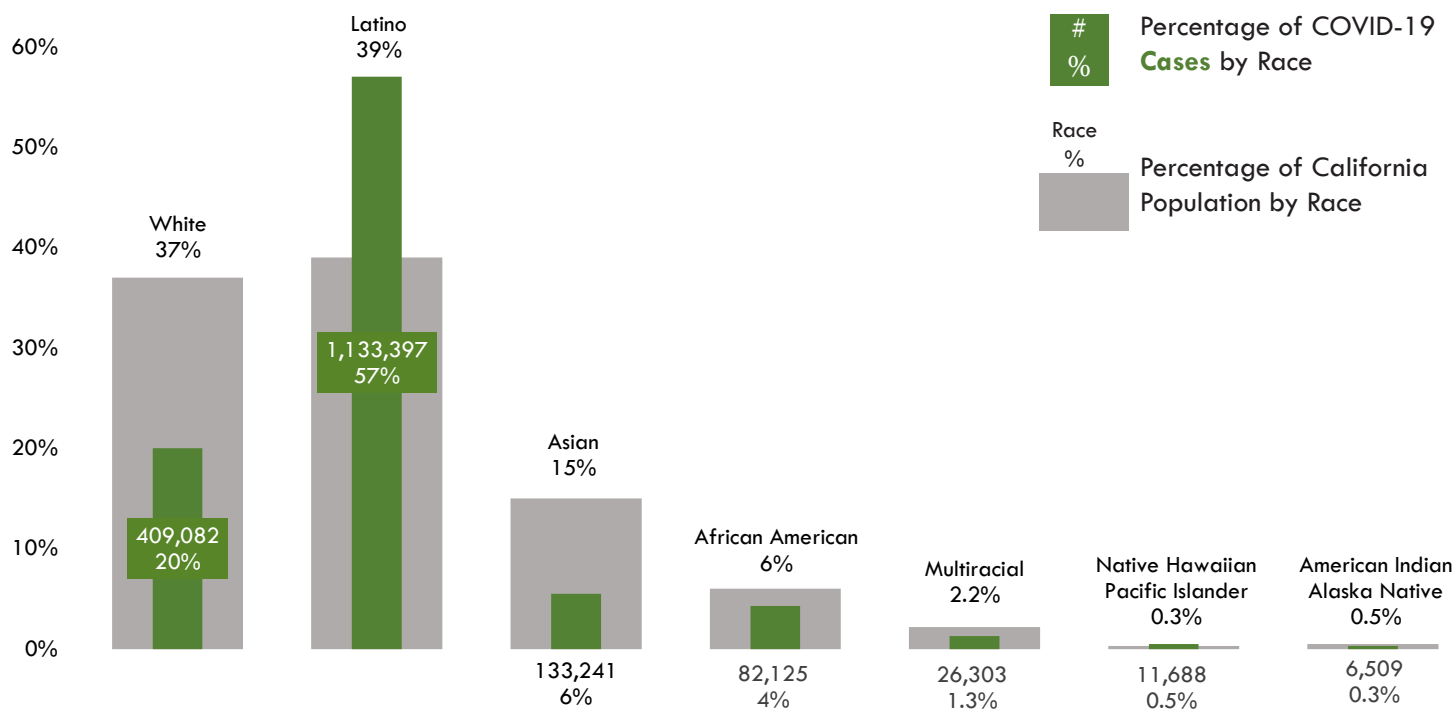
### New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date



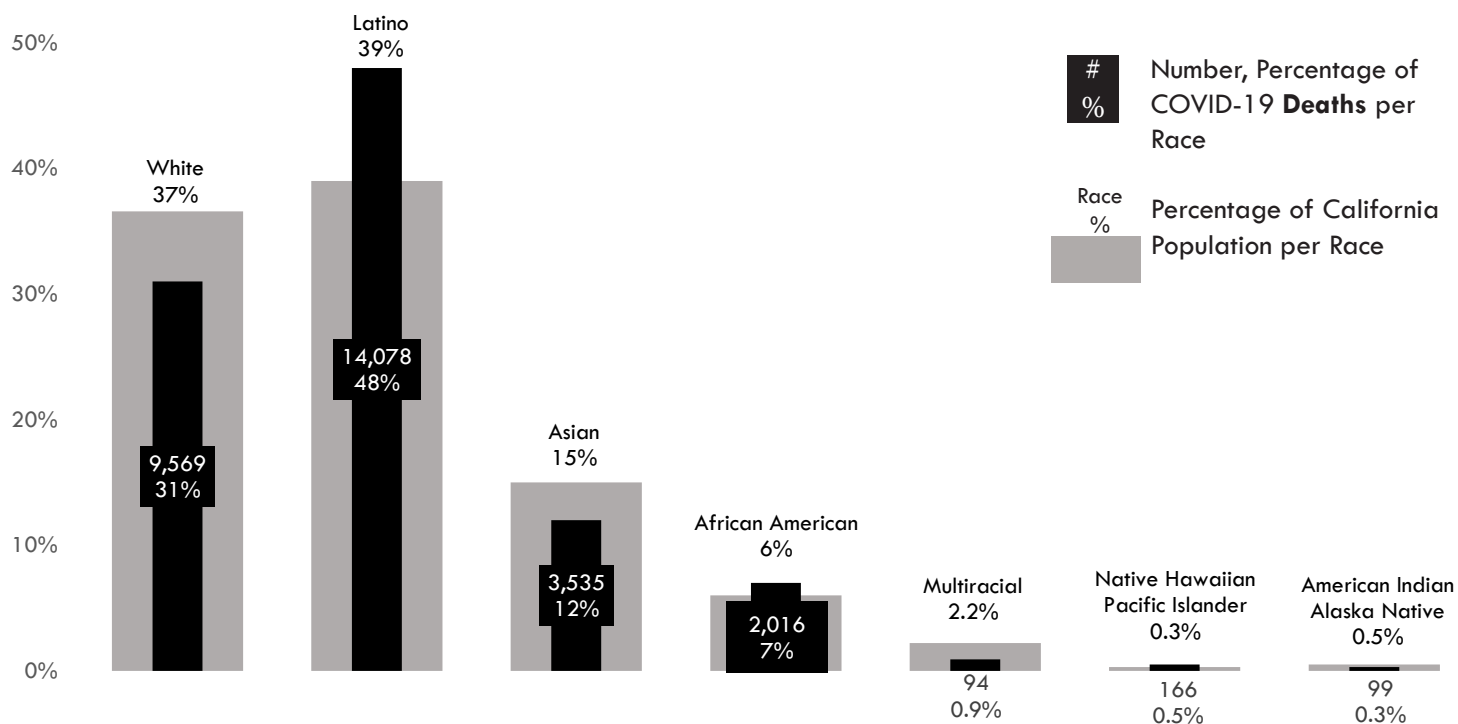

## Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.3% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.3% of deaths** in California. This includes a total of **6,509 cases** and **99 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



California Department of Public Health has nearly complete data on race and ethnicity for COVID-19 deaths, and are reporting the following trends: Latinos, African Americans and Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are dying at disproportionately higher levels.

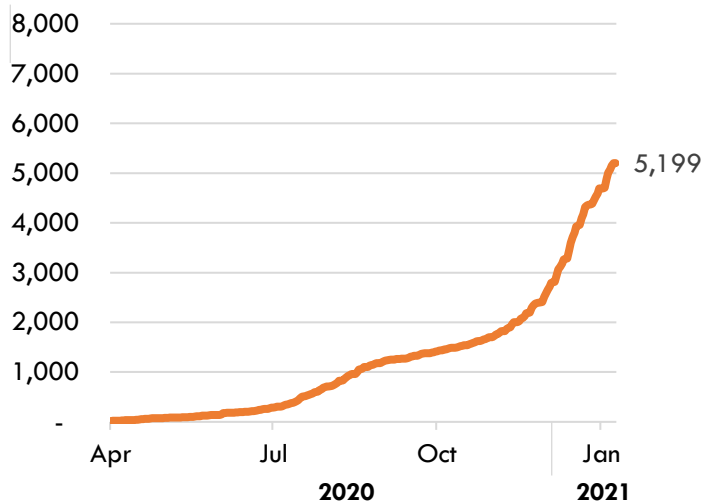

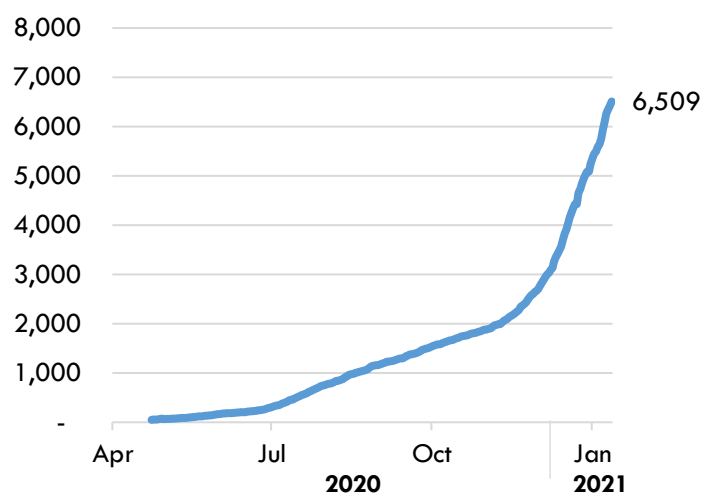
## Two sources for tracking American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) cases reported in California

Data from **California Department of Public Health (CDPH)** include all positive cases of AIAN diagnosed in California.

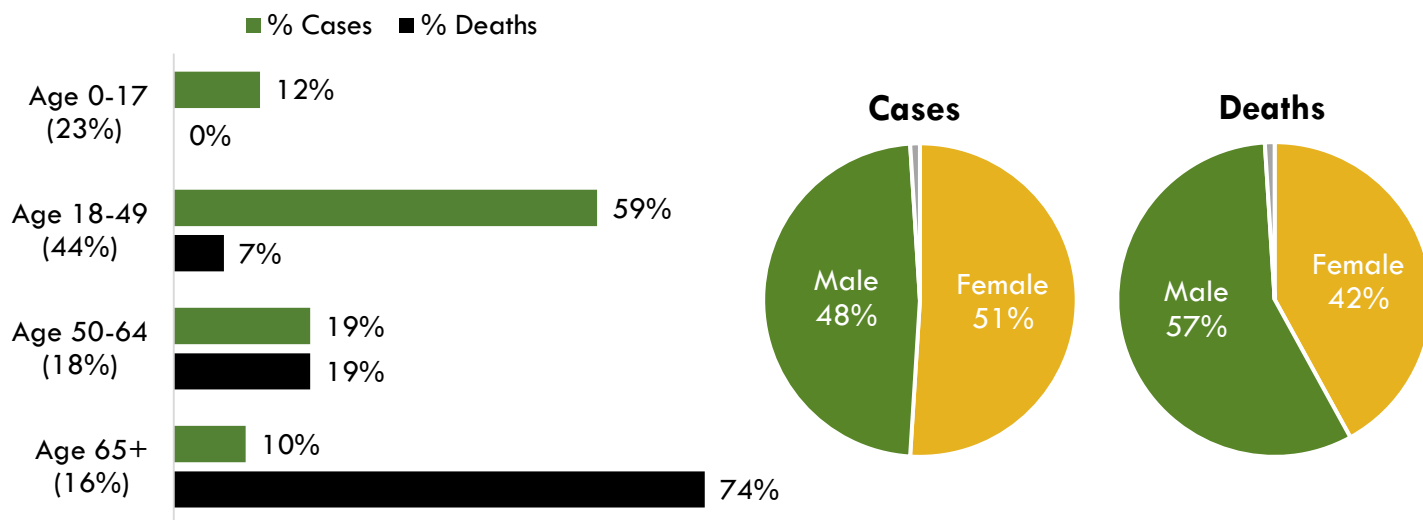

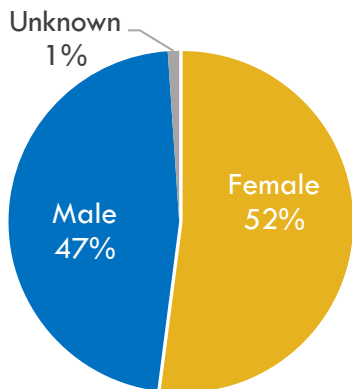

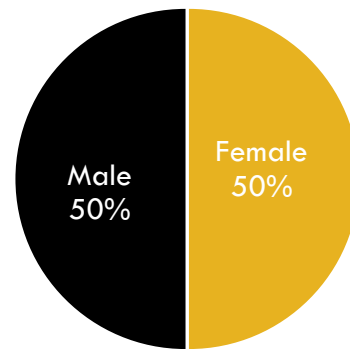
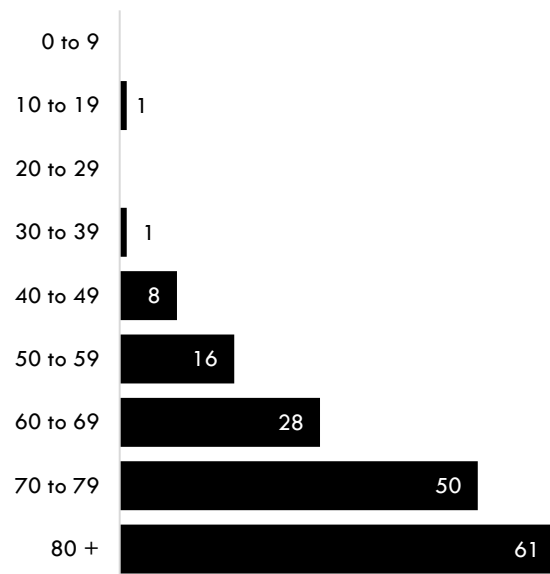

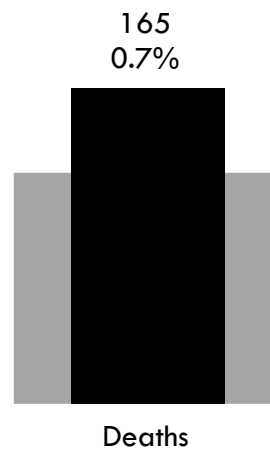
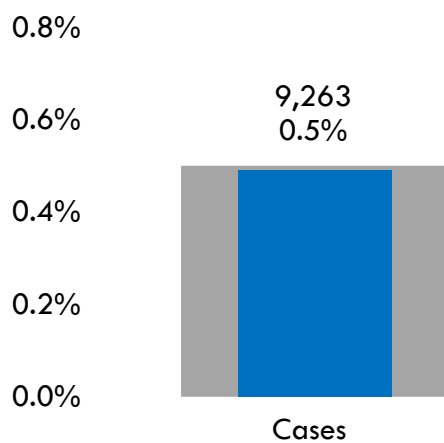
Positive COVID-19 cases among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender

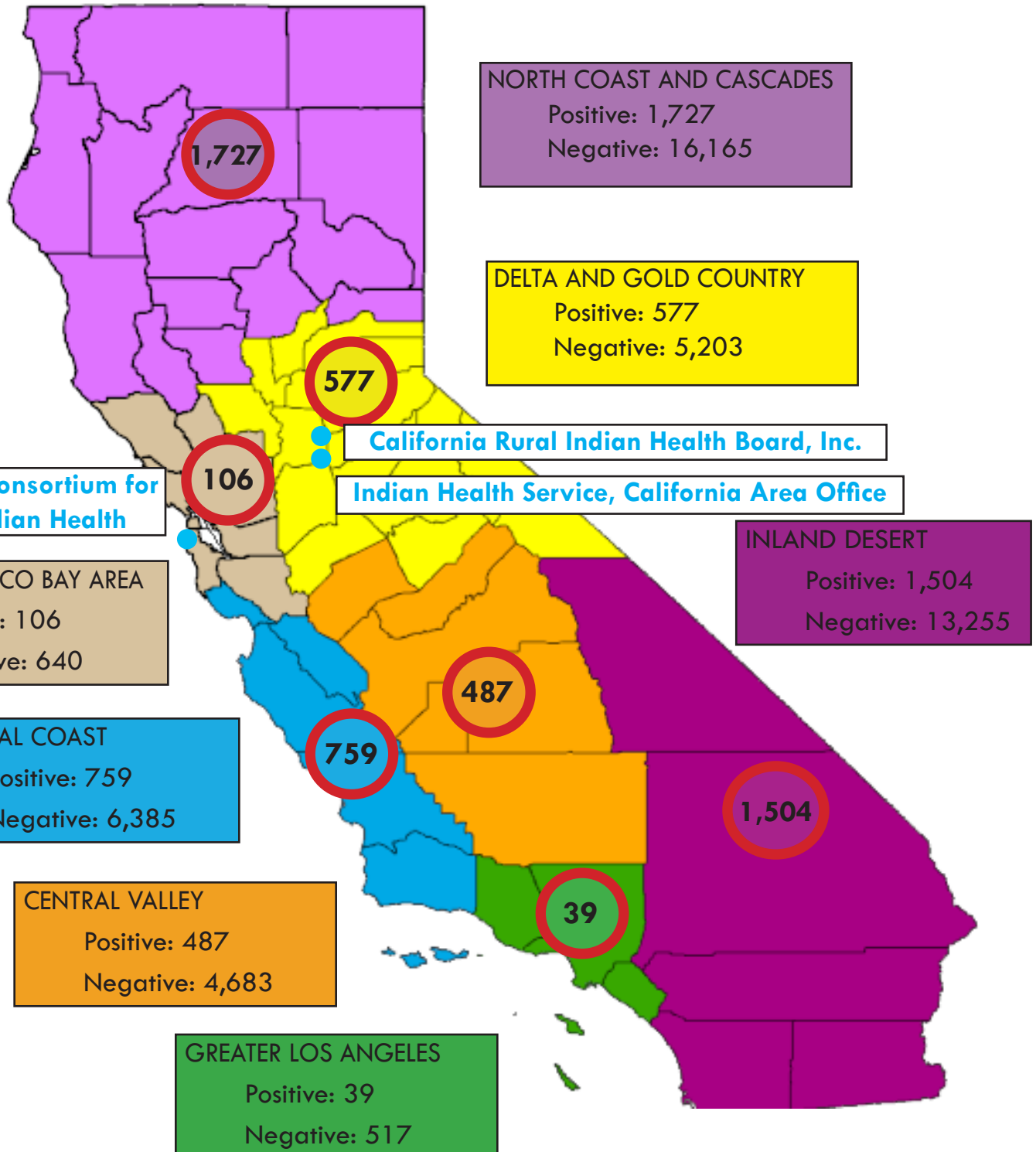

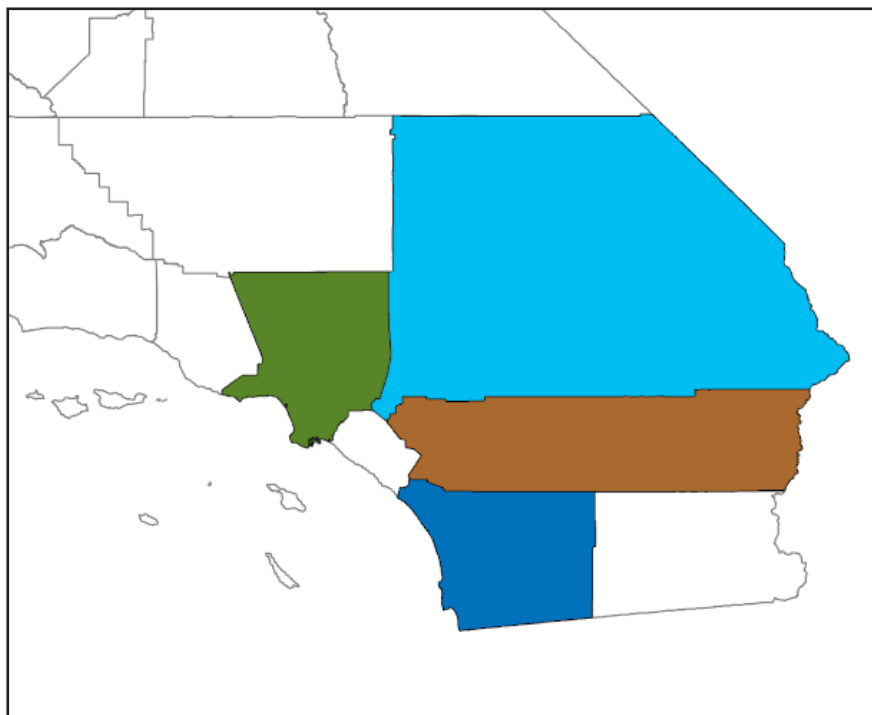

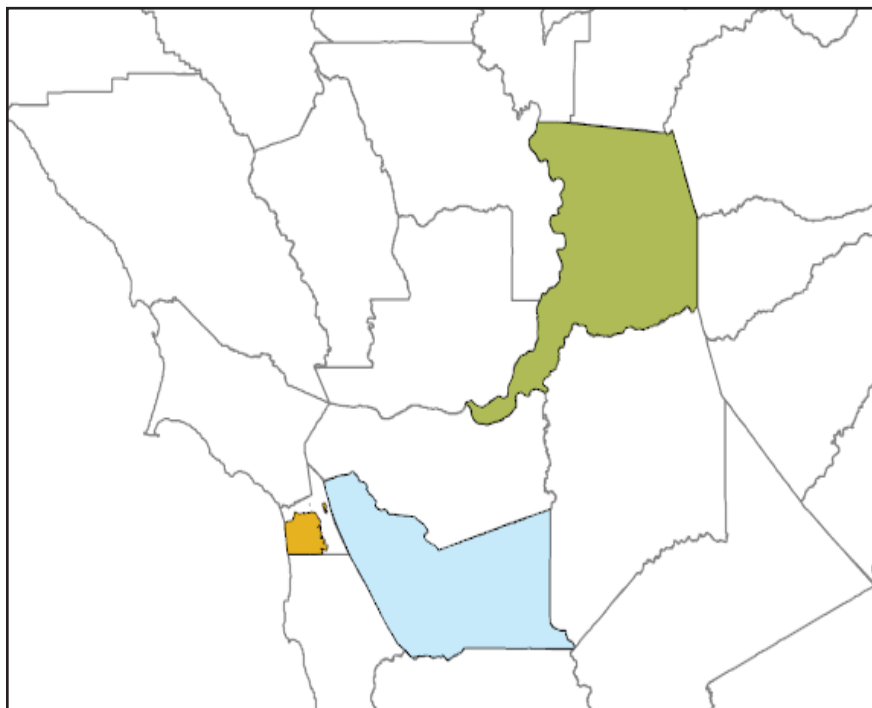

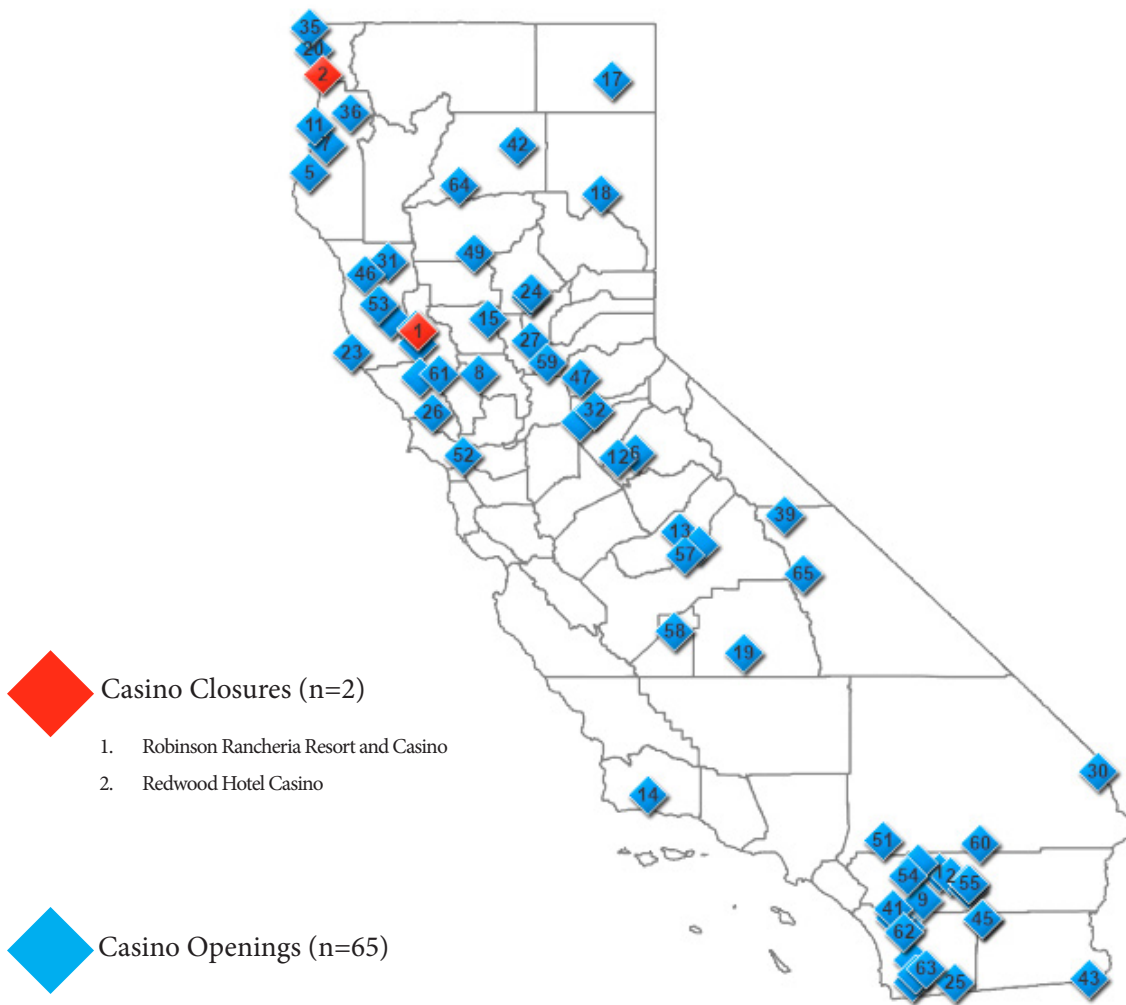
