DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 100.2 million with more than 2.1 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 25,456,670 and deaths at 427,626.

Urban Indian Health Institute (UIHI) administered an online survey to better understand COVID-19 vaccine attitudes, knowledge, and perceptions among American Indians and Alaska Natives nationwide. Some key findings include that the primary motivation for participants who indicated willingness to get vaccinated was a strong sense of responsibility to protect the Native community and preserve cultural ways, 75% of participants were willing to receive a COVID-19 vaccine, and 72% of participants wanted evidence that the vaccine is safe right now and in the long term. The California Department of Public Health (CDPH), in coordination with Santa Clara County and the University of California San Francisco (UCSF), announced that an L452R variant of COVID-19 is increasingly being identified by viral genomic sequencing in multiple counties across the state. 

A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.








New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date





Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, 0.3% of COVID-19 cases, and 0.3% of deaths in California. This includes a total of 7,719 cases and 120 deaths among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



California Department of Public Health has nearly complete data on race and ethnicity for COVID-19 deaths, and are reporting the following trends: Latinos, African Americans and Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are dying at disproportionately higher levels.




Two sources for tracking American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) cases reported in California










