DAILY HIGHLIGHTS

Globally, COVID-19 cases have surpassed 106.5 million with more than 2.3 million deaths.

In the United States, the total number of cases stands at 27,030,549 and deaths at 466,465.

COVID-19: U.S. at a Glance*

- Total cases: 27,030,549
- Total deaths: 466,465
- Jurisdictions reporting cases: 55 (50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)

*As of April 14, 2020, CDC case counts and death counts include both confirmed and probable cases and deaths. This change was made to reflect an interim COVID-19 position statement issued by the Council for State and Territorial Epidemiologists on April 5, 2020.

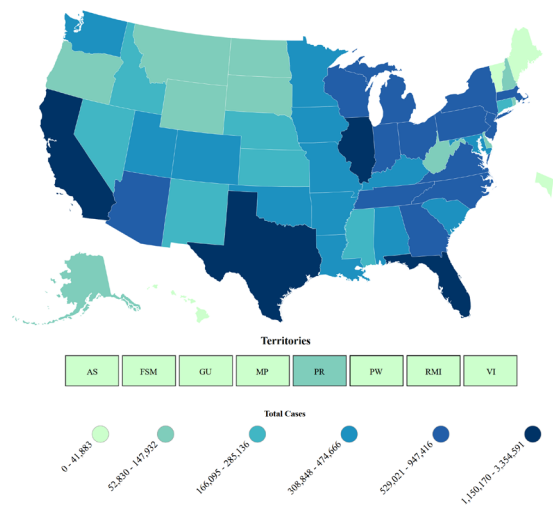
A confirmed case or death is defined by meeting confirmatory laboratory evidence for COVID-19.

A probable case or death is defined by:

i) meeting clinical criteria AND epidemiologic evidence with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19; or ii) meeting presumptive laboratory evidence AND either clinical criteria OR epidemiologic evidence; or iii) meeting vital records criteria with no confirmatory laboratory testing performed for COVID-19. State and local public health departments are now testing and publicly reporting their cases. In the event of a discrepancy between CDC cases and cases reported by state and local public health officials, data reported by states should be considered the most up to date.

- Percent of positive tests: 9.2%

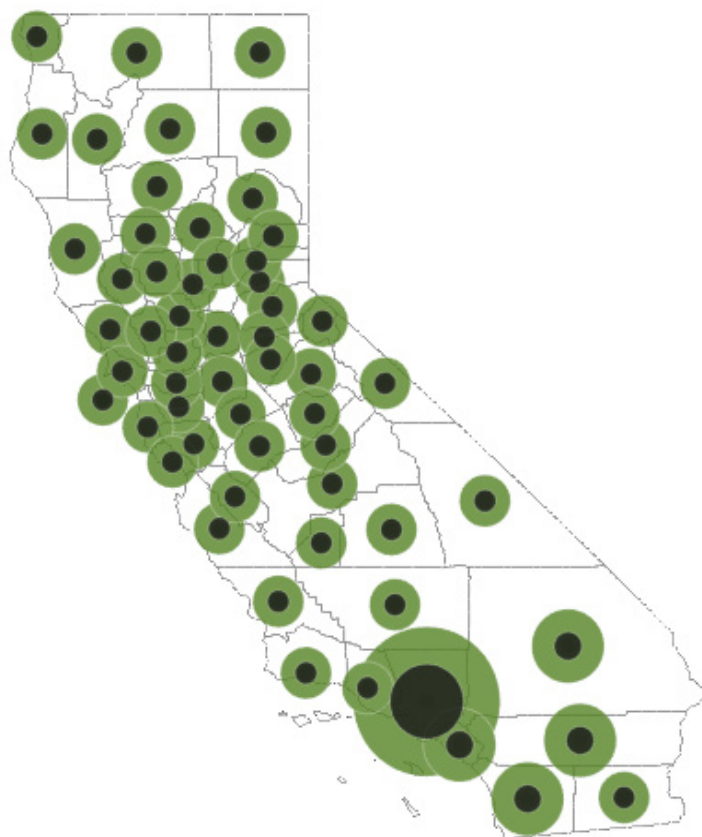

Of these, 6,863 patients have tested positive for COVID-19 and 55,079 have tested negative for COVID-19.

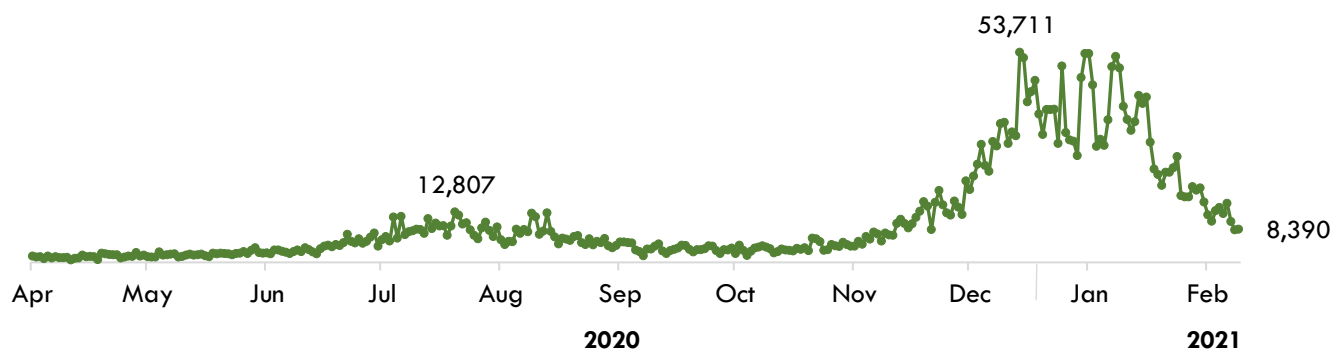

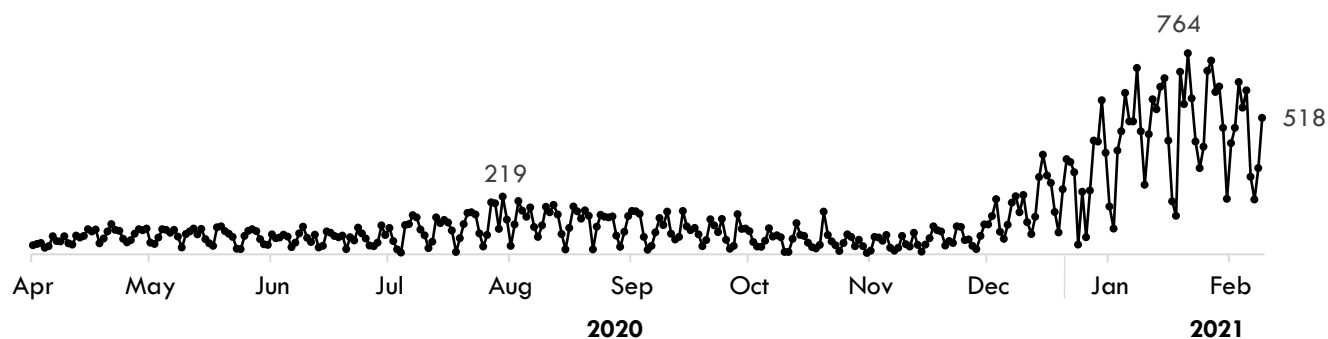

New Confirmed Cases in California by Date



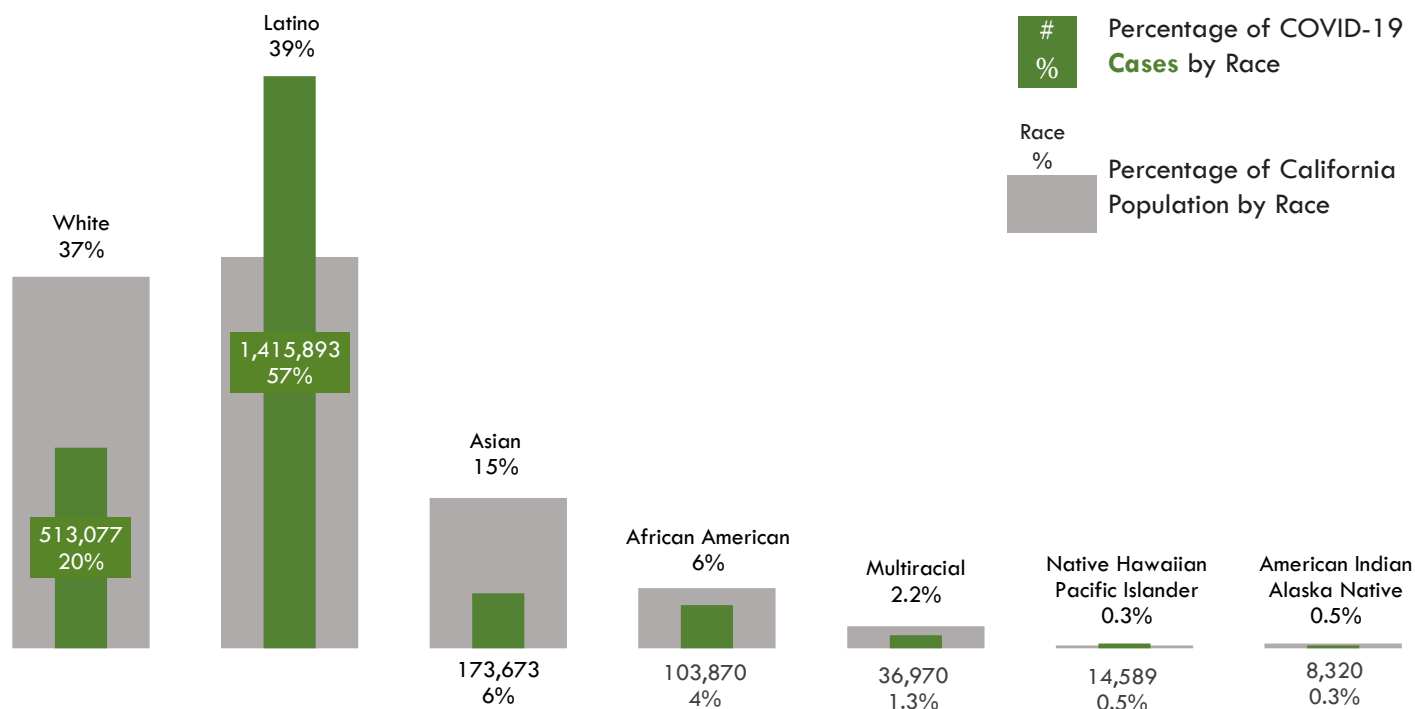
New Confirmed Deaths in California by Date



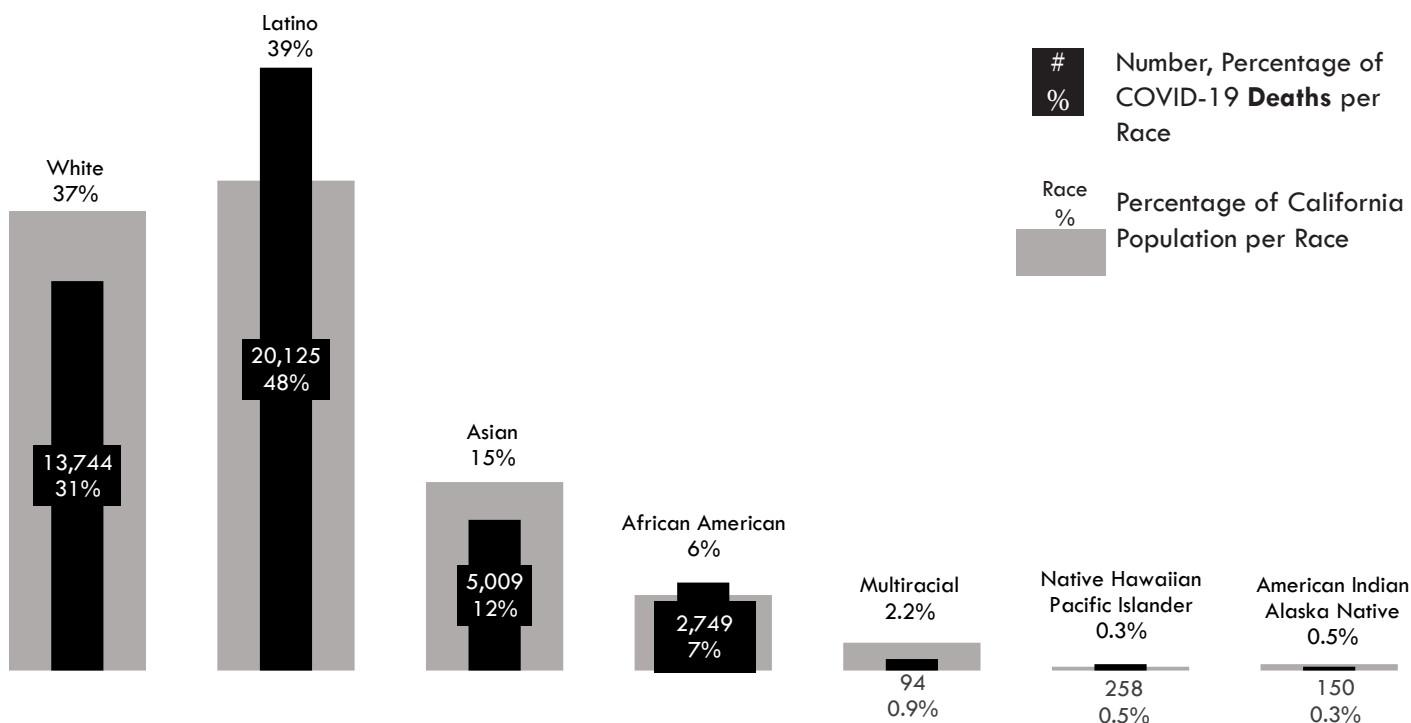

Racial distribution of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths in California

American Indians and Alaska Natives account for 0.5% percent of the population, **0.3% of COVID-19 cases**, and **0.3% of deaths** in California. This includes a total of **8,320 cases** and **150 deaths** among American Indian and Alaska Native people in California.



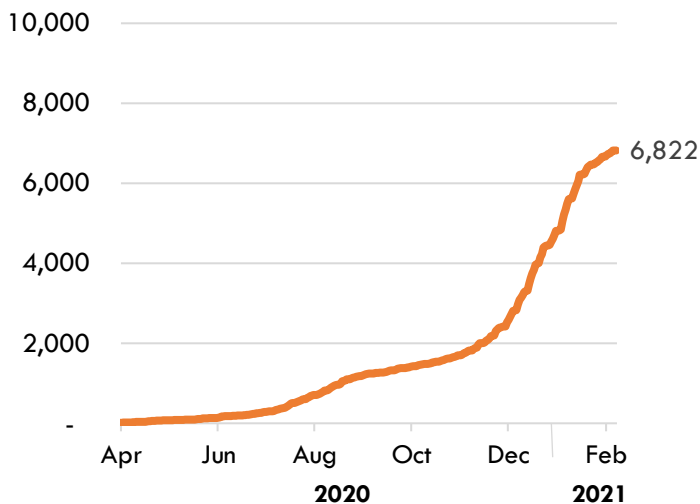

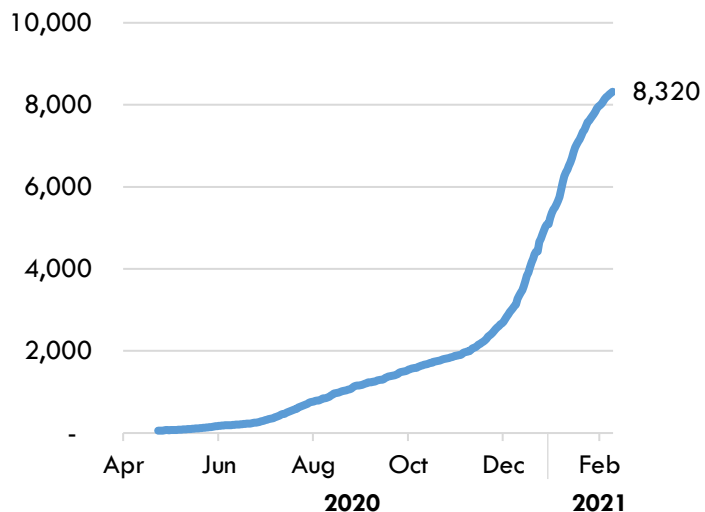

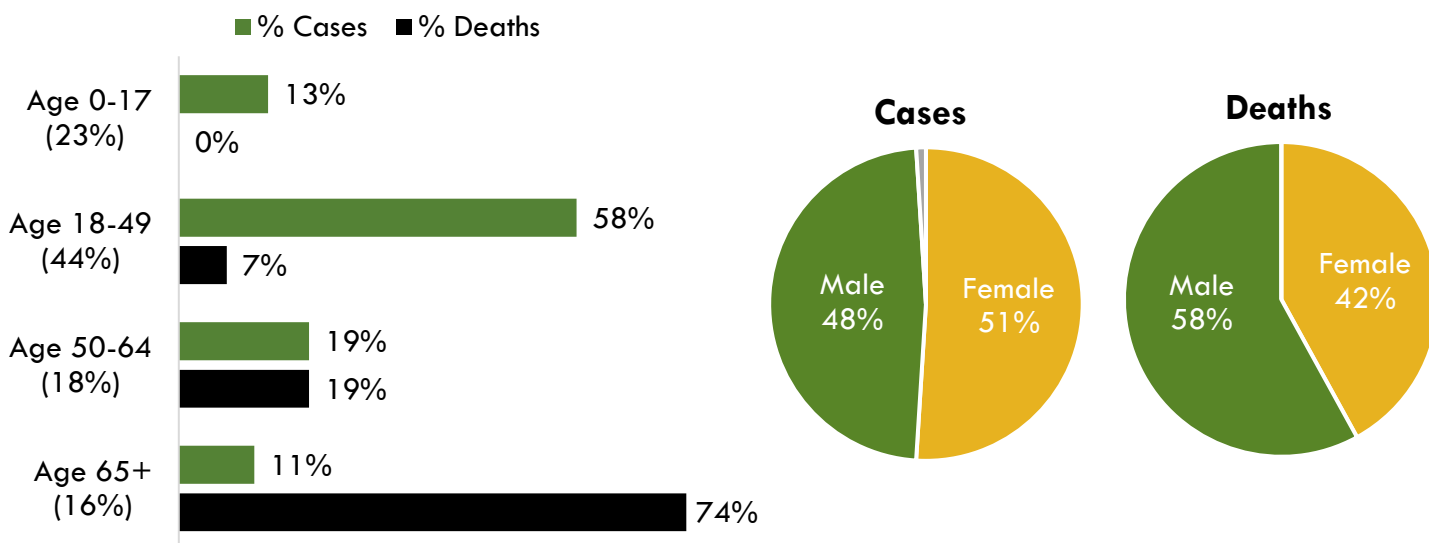

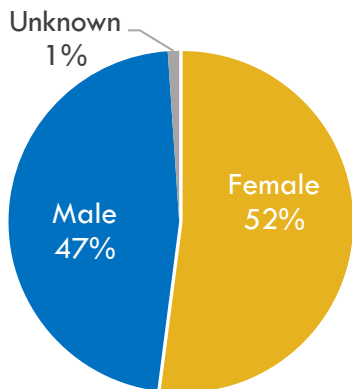
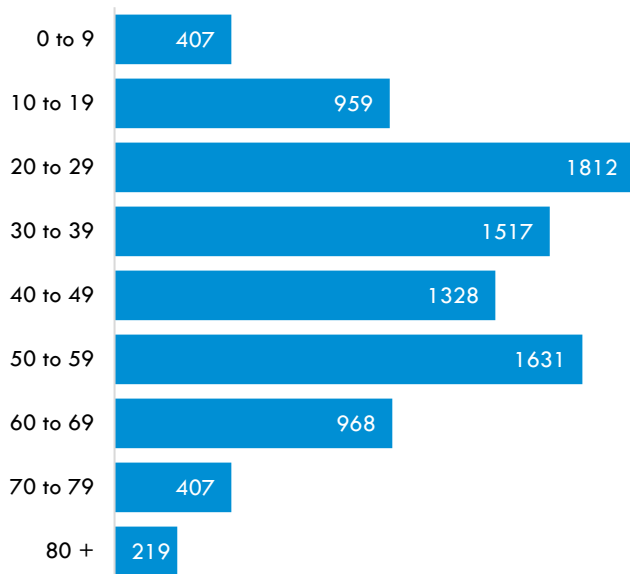

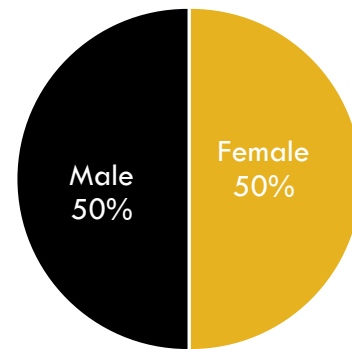
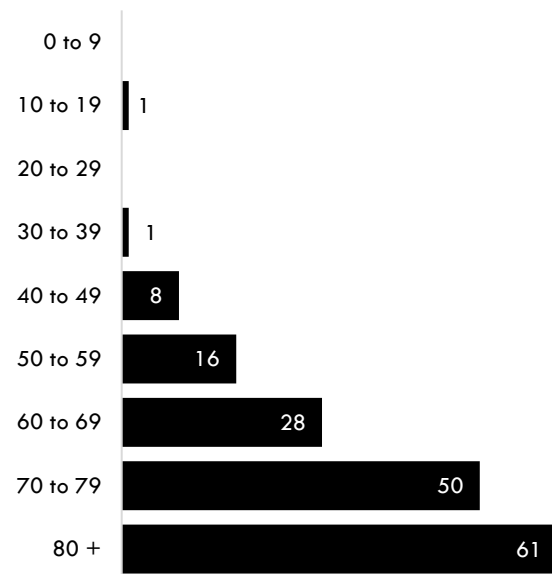

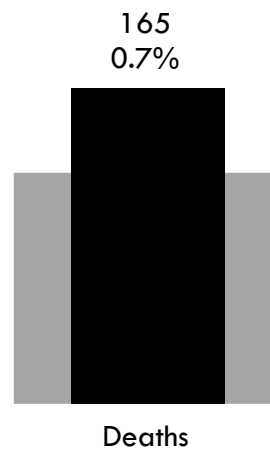
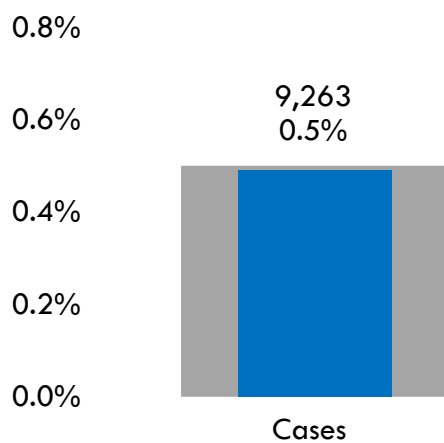
Positive COVID-19 cases among AIAN people in California by Age Group and Gender

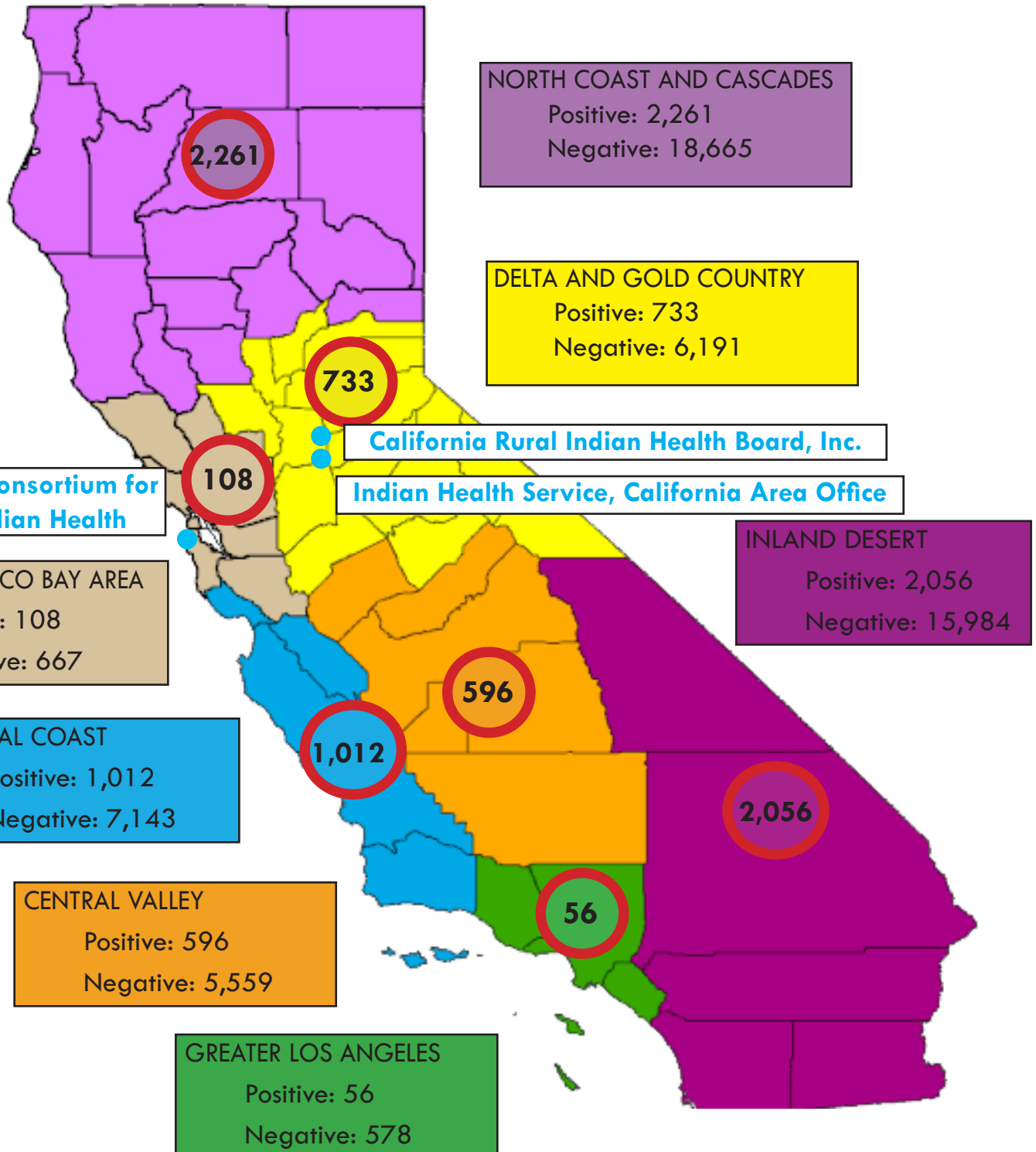

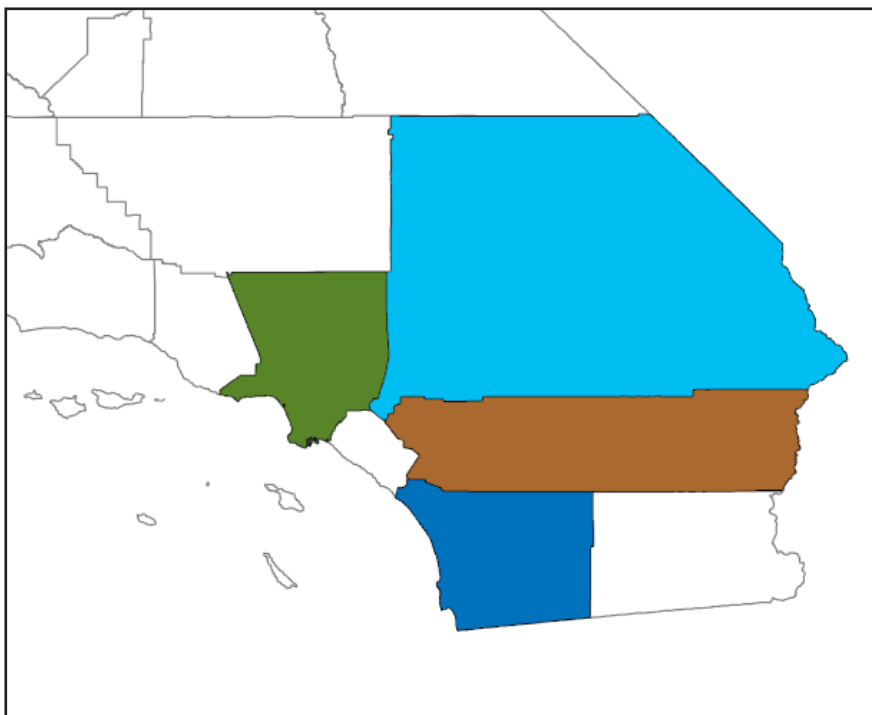

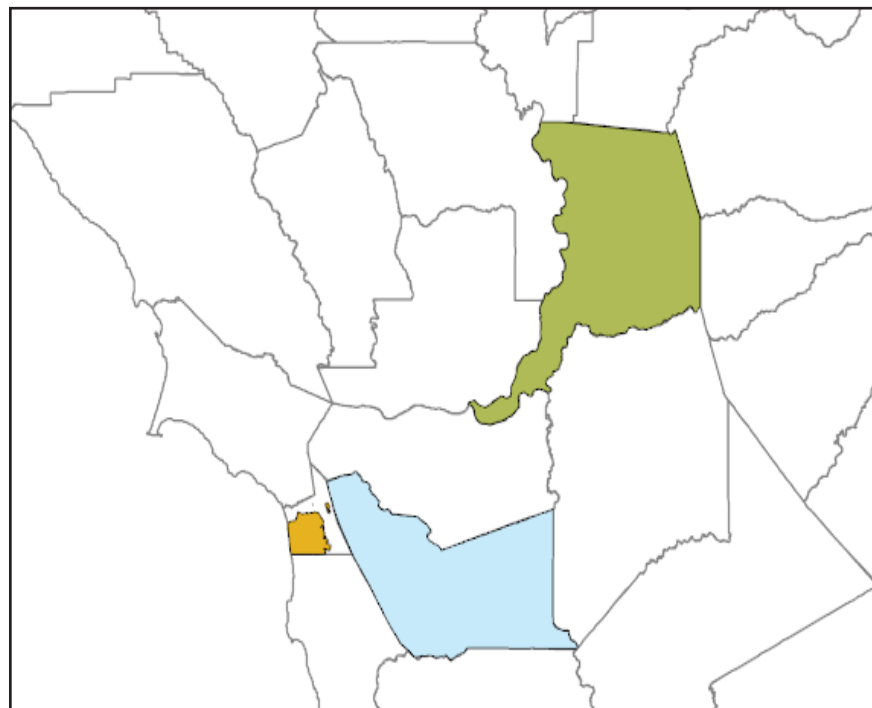

Tribes Issuing Shelter in Place Order

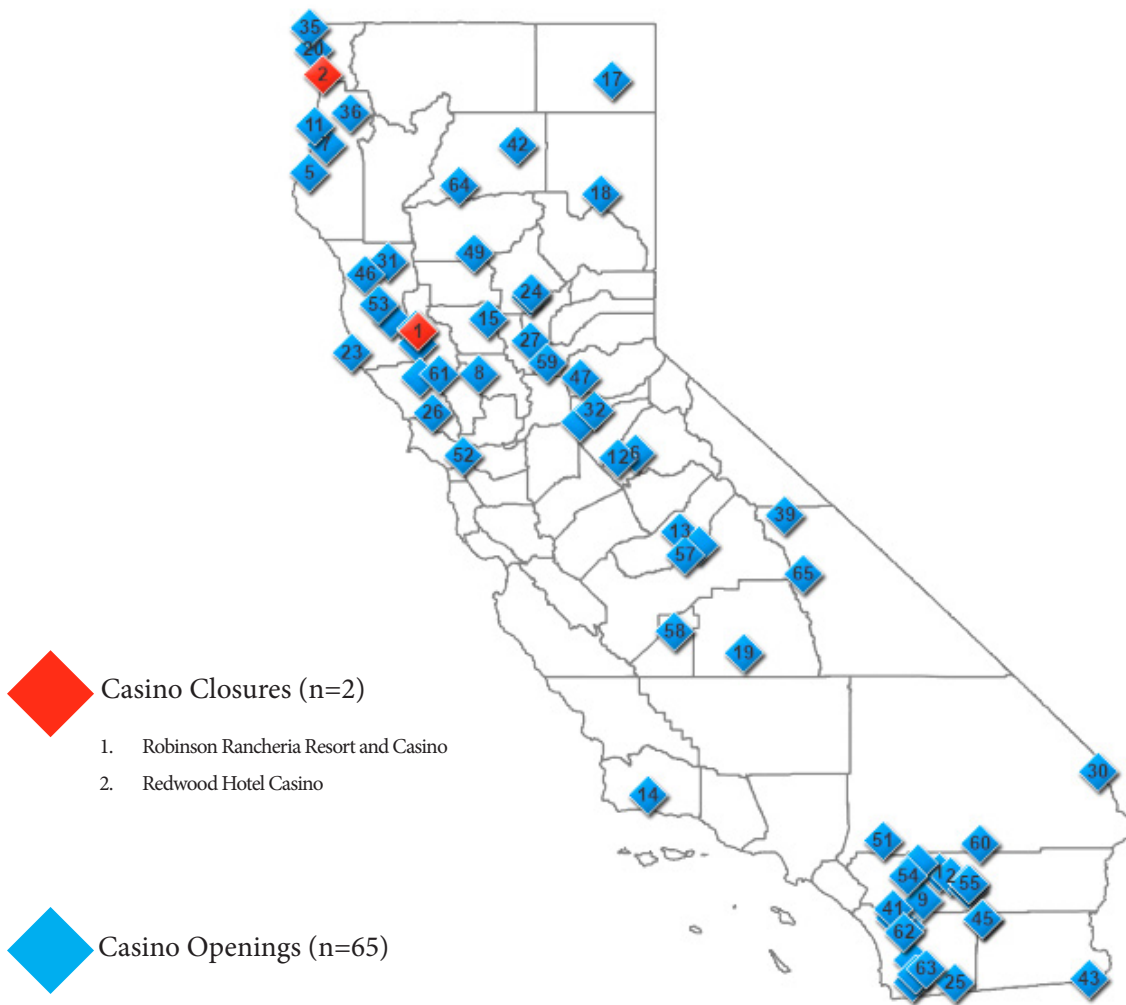
